

#### PRESIDENTS REPORT

February marks the formal start of the Councillors calendar year with our first meeting being held on 24<sup>th</sup>. It is an exciting time in local government but also one that I believe will carry with it much change. The State Government is flagging legislative changes and depending on the shape of those changes perhaps a stronger push in their reform agenda. The Western Australian Local Government (WALGA) has on all Councils behalf, taken a proactive approach and is seeking to have more input to gain a clearer understanding of the Governments objectives. So at this stage it is still a case of watch this space.

One issue that is arising is that many Council's, including ours are suffering from "reform fatigue". WALGA have bought this to the attention of the Minister for Local Government and highlighted the frustration of the lack of direction and the time that the process is taking. All Councils are affected by it.

Our Royalties for Regions projects are still progressing but have slowed due to funding delays. The delays are being caused by the difficulties in meeting the ever changing guidelines along with slow turnaround time by the Dept of Regional Development and Lands. It appears that there seems to be a push to reallocate funds into large regional projects. Whilst they are important I don't believe that was the original intention of the fund. Having said that it still remains a great boost for our Shire and surrounding region and along with the Minister for Regional Development's announcement of the "super towns" policy we hope to see much more emphasis on rural issues and services.

The summer rain has brought some relief to the pressure on water supplies. The current weather pattern has highlighted how vulnerable we are in a severe dry season. We must ensure that we do the best to address the issues to be better prepared for the next inevitable dry even.

Given the events in east and north of Australia and those of New Zealand it reminds us that Broomehill - Tambellup is a great place to live.



#### DISTRICT NUMBER PLATES – BH and TA

Council has recently been advised by the Department of Transport advising that they will no longer be issuing the district plates BH and TA.

The Department of Transport which controls all licensing matters including the approval and distribution of number plates, state that they have recently received legal advice on the matter. As the former districts of Broomehill and Tambellup no longer exist in terms of the Local Government Act 1995, it means that now under the relevant Road Traffic (Licensing) Regulations 1975 the Director General of the Department of Transport has no power to continue to issue district plates for districts that no longer exist under the relevant legislation. They have asked Council is it wishes to consider a new district plate series that reflects the Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup.

The current practice of issuing the old BH & TA district plates will cease on 11 April 2011.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN – for people who currently have BH and TA plates?

If you currently have BH or TA plates on a vehicle you are able to keep them and continue to do so until such time as you choose to get rid of them. However after the 11 April 2011 you will not be able to get new number issues of BH or TA plates.

This change does not affect the special series plates that have the number first then BH or TA – they will still be available after 11 April 2011.

Council is pursuing the matter with the Department of Transport. If you require any further information please don't hesitate to contact the Shire office.





#### Grazing Systems Field Walk

A field walk in response to both the FarmReady project and Caring for Our Country was developed to look at perennial pastures in the scheme of overall grazing system for properties. Gillamii in conjunction with DAFWA Albany and Katanning hosted it on the 15th Feb. The perennials focussed on the day included kikuyu, tall wheat grass, a tall wheat grass mix paddock and Lucerne. The landholders involved on the day provided participants with some great insight into what was and wasn't successful, and how they have best utilised their pastures. Representatives from DAFWA were on hand to provide information on economics, FOO, animal health and loads more, along with answering the variety of questions locals put forward. We had a good number of participants, needing several vehicles and the shire bus to ferry us all around. Response from participants was positive, that there was some good information gleaned from the day. #### Cleaning debris from dams

All the recent rain may have washed debris, such as manure, stubble and dried vegetation, into farm dams. This material can cause a problem if left to sink to the bottom of the dam. For information on cleaning debris from dams, contact Kelly, 0417 837 983 or kelly.hill@agric.wa.gov.au

#### Summer rain & animal health issues

Given the dry season & now the wet weather, there are some animal health issues to be mindful of regardless of whether your livestock are grazing in the paddock or are in a confinement feeding situation. For more information or should you suspect your livestock might be ill, contact Kelly.

#### **Erosion – don't push the limits**

Be aware of the amount of groundcover in your paddocks. The germination of pastures after the rain will be useful for your animals, but don't compromise the soils in your paddocks. The rule of thumb to protect your soils is you need at least 50% groundcover or about a feed on offer (FOO) level of about 1000kg DM/ha – if it gets below this grazing shouldn't be continued.

#### Info for your 2011 Crops

The Dept has a new booklet titled '2011 Planning Ahead: A guide for your cropping program'. Included in the FREE booklet are sections on taking stock of your finances, key success factors for 2011, tables outlining how dry conditions during 2010 will impact on the 2011 season (e.g. Weeds, diseases, nutrition, etc.), three scenarios for 2011 (e.g. summer rain, an early break and a late break) and the issues you will need to consider with each of these scenarios, wheat on wheat for 2011, plus more. #### Consider a feed test

By testing your feed, be it hay, cereal grains or mixed rations, you will get an assessment for the nutritive value of your livestock feed (nutritive value includes crude protein and metabolisable energy, plus other assessments). Knowing the value means you will be able to decide which feeds are best fed to different classes of stock, mix rations for best animal performance, and buy feeds based on nutritional value. For a kit to have your feed tested, contact Kelly.

#### Moonies Hill Energy and The Flat Rocks Wind Farm

The geographic location, and the reasons for this far reaching proposal, are being overlooked in this debate. It demands some injection of common sense.

In 1887 the Government of Western Australia engineered a rail line linking Albany and Perth, which in the following 114 years has kick-started massive wealth for our Great Southern and to Australia, from Agriculture. It has been accompanied by change along the way in all directions.

Now, one of those changes, is directed toward creating and energy hub, to kick start the development of our undoubted resource wealth. We do all of these things for posterity, and the future well being of our communities.

Tambellup was chosen to be part of this rail link, because of its close accessibility to fresh water for the steam engines and is geographically half way between the major centres of Albany and Narrogin.

Similarly the Flat Rocks wind farm, because of its elevated topography, and now proposed power line to Wellstead, and its proximity to existing power infrastructure, north and south. It also has the potential for Geo Thermal energy production, and Bio Mass into the future.

Agriculture needs energy, to move to the next stage, if desalination technologies, are to provide us with adequate fresh water and sustainable farming practices, are to develop our full potential.

Resource wealth, at this stage is untouched, both in the Great Southern and along the South Coast, because it has little infrastructure, - just as it was when the rail network was first planned.

The agricultural wealth created, and largely unpredicted at the time; - the railway the catalyst, to get things moving. The energy hub will be the catalyst for the next, for both resources, and agriculture this time.

History records that there were issues of concern raised, when the rail lines were constructed. Fire risk and safety, health, relating to noise and soot, crossing safety, chooks going off the lay. Well we may laugh, but the overlying advancement for us all, can be seen all around.

The proponents of this proposal should be given a rousing "three cheers", and more especially, our own local entrepreneurs, a dam good "pat on their backs".

#### **Broomehill Historical Notes**

Quite a few years ago Shirley MacDonald began to work through the diaries of her Grandfather, Thomas Norrish (TN) which he wrote when he first came to Eticup to take up farming and the diaries of William Henry Graham (WHG) who was also one of the first pioneers of the Eticup district. Shirley collated all the information both in alphabetical and chronological order. There are many wonderful pieces of information and anecdotes in these diaries and we are proud to share them with the community each month

Page, Frederick – On 17<sup>th</sup> May 1862 Fred Page was at Eticup to borrow beef and returned on 23<sup>rd</sup> to work for WHG. On 3<sup>rd</sup> June he was ploughing at Eticup. On 17<sup>th</sup> July at Nannamillup, Page and the natives fetched more boards from the sawpits. On 15<sup>th</sup> March 1863 Page came to Eticup with Peter Broker, "a little on the spree" and was at Nannamillup on 1<sup>st</sup> November with Solomon Drolf and Clarke.

Palmer, Edwin – In October 1880 Edwin (assumed Palmer) was shearing at Goblup and went to Carmody's to shear for one day. In November 1881 he came up from Albany for some sheep killing for Mr Wray (probably Mrs Norrish's brother) but TN had none ready and Van Zuilecom had none. On 24<sup>th</sup> June 1883, Edwin Palmer arrived with William Thomas's party to start to build TN's new house Sunnyside. He boarded at Goblup.



#### WHAT IS A REGIONAL WATER PLAN?

A regional water plan aims to provide a complete picture of the current water situation.

It aims to identify the different water issues, challenges and opportunities that exist within the region.

The plan provides a road map for future management of water resources, to meet our social, economic, cultural and environmental needs.

#### WHAT DOES IT DO?

The regional water plan will provide an accessible, holistic picture of the current water situation within the region. This includes the current and future water usage for:

- Agricultural sectors
- Industrial sectors
- Urban water demands

The regional water plan will provide opportunities to identify and enhance the ecological, cultural and social values of estuaries, waterways and water bodies.

By gaining a complete picture of the current water patterns and requirements, the regional water plan will determine:

- How climate change will impact different areas and different sectors
- The necessity of water efficiency measures.
- The necessity of developing new potable water sources
- The role of alternative water sources as fit-for-purpose water use

#### WHY GET INVOLVED?

Everyone has a different perspective and understanding of water use and the needs for water planning. By getting involved you can share your knowledge and views on various issues raised through the consultation process. By being involved, you help ensure the proposed strategies and actions are workable and reasonable.

#### **Works in February**

A number of road construction jobs were completed through February. Works were completed on Broomehill-Kojonup Rd, resealing on Paul Valley Rd, Flat Rocks Rd, and Tie Line Rd, with resheeting works continuing on Pallinup South Rd.

The storm experienced in January saw significant tree damage in parts of the shire. The Works crew spent time clearing trees off Brassey, Etna, Greenhill South and Tambellup West Roads. The accompanying rains put much-needed water in the oval dams, with the result that watering has been stepped up to twice a week once again.

A number of staff members have been working in the Cranbrook shire recently assisting with their resealing program. This work is almost complete. The Jet Patcher bitumen truck has been put to good use, with a number of councils in the region interested in hiring the machine for their programs.


Researchers from Murdoch University have been actively involved in the Red Card for Rabbits & Foxes 2010 culling program – a multi-stakeholder program involving community, industry, and government. During culls carried out in February and March 2010, we collected samples from over 500 red foxes and 50 feral cats, covering a total of 18 geographic locations. Our successful survey relied heavily on the assistance of a great many voluntary hunters and coordinators throughout southwest WA.

These samples were examined to determine the animals' diet (from stomach contents), parasite load (from analysis of the intestines and ectoparasites) and skull morphology (which will tell us, amongst other information, the animal's age). Although collecting the samples proved to be an olfactory challenge, that experience paled by comparison with subsequent close-up examinations. Five brave Murdoch University students are currently involved in analysing these samples.

#### "PESTS UNDER FIRE"

Over the weekend, landholders across the southwest land division spent the night culling vermin on their properties as part of the fourth annual Stockbrands Community Foxshoot.

Foxes, wild cats, rabbits and other introduced vermin were targeted by landholders from Mingenew in the northwest to Ravensthorpe in the southeast, in a bid to protect livestock, crops and biodiversity assets.

While results are still coming in as to the total number of pests culled, it appears that the conditions were favourable and a solid result is expected.

Significant culls have been reported from Cadoux Traders who attracted 16 teams to cull 253 foxes, 16 wild cats and 400 rabbits, while West Midlands Group recorded 137 foxes, 4 wild cats and 89 rabbits.

19 teams involved in the Boyup Brook Pistol Club shoot achieved 136 foxes, 21 wild cats, 212 rabbits, 3 wild pigs and 9 feral deer.

"Twenty eight groups registered to take part in the event, which involves a local coordinator organising a venue for the tally and promoting the event to local landholders, who organise their own teams and shoot on their own properties." Program Coordinator Sally Thomson said.

"Along with the value of removing these destructive pests from the landscape, Stockbrands Co sponsors registered shoots by donating five dollars for every fox and wild cat culled to the Royal Flying Doctor Service - it's a fantastic contribution," she added.

"The success of the foxshoots is also due to the huge commitment by local businesses, coordinators and landholders, who organise and participate in the events.

"The coordinators have strong local networks and know what works for their local area, and the farmers generally spend their day working and then head out at night to take part in their local shoot."

Landholder efforts now turn to the coordinated baiting program which runs from the 1st March to the 15th April.

Baiting is an effective landscape-scale method to cull pests, especially foxes and rabbits, and many local groups have sourced funding to offer an incentive to landholders to take part.

"For the first time, PAKS baits purchased by agricultural retail outlets during the month of March will see 5% sales being donated to the Flying Doctors, on behalf of David Grays Aglink, Ms Thomson added.

"The Department of Agriculture and Food undertakes a property risk assessment and landholders gain poison safe use and handling accreditation before 1080 baits are authorised, so it's just a matter of contacting your closest DAFWA Office and speaking with the Biosecurity Officer to start the process," she said.

Many local groups are also turning their sights to the final Stockbrands Community Foxshoot, which is scheduled for the weekend of 25-27<sup>th</sup> March.

The newly established website www.redcard.net.au has a wide range of information, including 1080 baiting forms, research results and a volunteer register of experienced shooters willing to assist landholders.
