SHIRE OF BROOMEHILL-TAMBELLUP

The next meeting of Council will be held on Thursday 18th February 2010 commencing at 4.00pm in the Tambellup Council Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend all Council meetings.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REFORM UPDATE

The Minister for Local Government, the Hon John Castrilli, advised local governments in early December that he had considered all the submissions from Local Government and determined that Councils would be categorised into one of three groups.

- Those Councils that had agreed to amalgamate (nine only)
- Regional Transition Groups these groups will work together under a formal no-opt out agreement, with a view to forming a single new entity by 2013
- Regional Collaborative Groups there are a small number of local governments in regional areas, which due to their remoteness and size, mean that amalgamations are not a priority. These Councils are to work collaboratively on a regional basis. These groups will still be bound by a formal agreement.

Broomehill-Tambellup has been classified in the Regional Transition Group. Initially Broomehill-Tambellup has been grouped with Cranbrook, Kojonup and Plantagenet Shires.

Department of Local Government representatives will be meeting with members of the four Councils on 19 February 2010 to provide further information on what is proposed by the Minister and the State Government.

Further information will be provided as it comes to hand.

FROM THE DECEMBER COUNCIL MEETING

- A request from the Tambellup Family Playgroup for Councils support in their application to Lotterywest for funding to purchase outdoor play equipment was approved.
- The Standard Operating Procedures for Bushfire Brigades was reviewed. People receiving SMS alerts of harvest bans will now receive a message advising when the ban has been lifted.
- Council agreed to utilise \$30,000 funding received from the Federal Government RLCIP Program toward fencing of the Broomehill Landfill site, and will investigate manning of the Landfill site as part of the 2010/11 Budget process.

ROADWORKS – BROOMEHILL-KOJONUP ROAD & TAMBELLUP WEST ROAD

The construction crew has works in progress on both the Broomehill-Kojonup and Tambellup West Roads widening sections of the roads in readiness for sealing. It is not anticipated that these sections will be sealed until mid March. **Council urges all road users to be mindful of these works and courteous to other drivers when travelling, slow down and drive to the conditions of the road.**

WORKS

- The construction crew are continuing the works to widen the section of the Tambellup West Road starting at the Gordon River bridge.
- Work is also continuing on the upgrade of Diprose Park. It is anticipated at this stage that it should be completed by the end of March.
- Countryside Homes have commenced building a new staff home on Henry Street Tambellup. This project has been possible with the assistance of Royalties for Regions funds.



Developments and Projects been implemented or planned

- a. We welcomed the Shire of Kojonup to the Hidden Treasures Partnership in August.

Rural Group Tours Development Project *This has been an ongoing 2 year project funding \$100,000 AusIndustries, \$15,000 Great Southern Development Commission, \$7,000 from Shires and over \$100,000 in-kind from HT working Group, Shires and communities.* We are getting closer to reaching the outcomes of this project, now due to be completed in May 2010

TOOLS FOR TOURISM TREASURE

A new Hidden Treasures tool kit is set to encourage small communities in the Great Southern to develop their tourism assets by promoting group tours.

Brand MHR Gary Gray launched the Hidden Treasures Rural Group Tours Toolkit in Gnowangerup on Wednesday January 20.

Development of the Hidden Treasures tool kit was funded by the Federal Government's Australian Tourism Development Program, along with contributions from local governments and funds from the State Government's Regional Development Scheme through the Great Southern Development Commission (GSDC).

GSDC Chief Executive Officer Bruce Manning said the tool kit would help smaller communities in the region to identify and promote their lesser known tourism attractions.

"Many hidden gems are out there in rural areas," Mr Manning said.

"The tool kit will encourage local communities to develop group tours without necessarily having in place the usual infrastructure and personnel associated with higher profile tourist attractions.

PASTA NECKLACES –

macaroni or pasta tubes, assorted food colouring, water. wool

- Colour the pasta by quickly dipping it into a bowl of coloured water.

Remembering a man of great compassion

The West Australian 26 December 2009

As per the recent article we remember a local Broomehill boy Len Hayward and his extraordinary life. Len passed away on Christmas day in 1981at 52 but in those short years his sporting achievements included playing league

football for South Fremantle, but it was his role as the Wiluna School Principal that showed how a single individual can change lives.

Len and his wife Grace Joy went to teachers college at Claremont in 1950 & 51, and in 1979 he moved to Wiluna where he set about turning the local school into the centre pride of the town. With his undying devotion, energy and resourcefulness it was an early turnaround and by 1980 the school was thriving.

Len was inducted into the Aboriginal Education Hall of Fame in 2002.



Broomehill Historical Notes

Quite a few years ago Shirley MacDonald began to work through the diaries of her Grandfather, Thomas Norrish (TN) which he wrote when he first came to Eticup to take up farming and the diaries of William Henry Graham (WHG) who was also one of the first pioneers of the Eticup district. Shirley collated all the information both in alphabetical and chronological order. There are many wonderful pieces of information and anecdotes in these diaries and we are proud to share them with the community each month.

Manson, Rev – Anglican Minister, conducted a

service at Goblup on 7th February 1895. **Manubert, George** - On 18th January 1895, TN got things in Broome Hill for Aborigine George Manubert who was taking a flock of sheep and on 21st started for Slab Hut (near Tunney's) with the flock staying

overnight the first night at Oak Farm and the second at Donaldson's. He arrived at the Sheep Wash at Slab Hut on 23rd and made a brake for the flock. He wrote "splendid feed and water". On 14th February TN started again for Slab Hut with rations for the native.

Marshall, J - Hired by TN on 9th March 1886 to take over O'Brien's flock at Pootenup. Two days later he said his name was Herskewe. On 13th TN counted 758 sheep to him. When TN returned to Pootenup on 11th April he learned Marshall had lost some of his sheep and 9 had been killed by native dogs. TN or Finefellow took rations to him at Pootenup in April and May. On 4th October 1886, J Marshall came in with his flock from Wackenup (for shearing). At Sunnyside over the Christmas period, he did not come to work on 27th, 28th or 29th December – all drinking at Thomas Rogers' place. Marshall came to work on 30th December. The next year's diary is one of those

Marshall, Rev – Anglican Minister. On 16th January 1892 TN's daughter Nora brought the Minister out from Broome Hill and he stayed the night at Goblup. He held the Church Service at Eticup on 28th February and on 12th March 1892 Nora Norrish again brought Mr Marshall out from Broome Hill to stay the night - it was to be his last trip in the district.

Masters - Blacksmith who played cricket for Kojonup in the match versus Eticup Cricket Club on 14th April

Mateu, Father – Catholic Priest from Albany. On 26th October 1882, visited Goblup and the men gave him £3.10.0. He had been (or was going) to Grover's to baptize Eleanor Cronin's baby, Franklin.

Meetings - TN belonged to all societies and groups and was a member of many committees. A part of Road Board meetings (both at Kojonup and Broome Hill), he attended meetings of the Eticup Church and school committees. He attended meetings of the Broome Hill Agricultural Society, the Mutual

Improvement Society, the Broome Hill School Board, the Health Board, the Mechanic's Institute and the Farmers & Producer's League. On one occasion he attended four meetings in one day. On 16th February 1907, TN went to a Ratepayer's Meeting in Broome Hill and the to a meeting of the Political League in Katanning.

Meldoon - Began work at Goblup on 6th December 1897 carting hay at 30/- a week. On 15th he helped TN, Langton and Rogers draft sheep; finished up on 17th December and next day TN paid him £3.

Paddock tree budgeting

Agriculture, like any other business is plagued by the truth that we must make a profit to be sustainable, so the economic bottom line is very important. It is also true that the absolute bottom line of agriculture is ecological. This article explores ecological realities of the benefits of paddock trees that impact on the financial bottom line.

Given the increasing uncertainty of climate change and increasing energy costs, it is very timely to have a good hard look at how we can maximise the resilience of our farming systems by using ecological budgeting side-by-side with our financial budgeting.

This brings up an important question – how do you value ecological services provided by scattered paddock trees? To do this, we need to look at the broader farm ecosystem to see the less direct benefits, as well as the direct more easily measurable benefits.

From a biodiversity perspective, the threshold of 30% cover of pre-clearing extent of native vegetation type has been recognised as the point below which species loss appears to accelerate exponentially at an ecosystem level, and at a level of 10% of the original extent is a level representing "endangered" (taking no account of other land degradation issues). It is also recognised that biodiversity leads to environmental stability, stability leads to resilience, and that resilience is vital to agricultural sustainability.

The latest figures on remnant vegetation extent remaining on private land in Land Conservation Districts in the South Coast Region from DAFWA show that Denmark, Kent River and Walpole are the only districts showing more than the 30% threshold of native vegetation required on private land to maintain species diversity which in turn maintain ecosystem services. Many remnants are isolated and too small to be genetically viable. In these highly fragmented landscapes, paddock trees have a vital role to play as stepping stones for the movement of pollinators to maintain the viability of the fragmented remnants. Old trees are especially important because they provide by far the most habitat niches for invertebrates and vertebrates, including hollows for nesting and roosting.

So back to the paddock tree budget - on the negative side of the balance sheet, we have:

- competition with pasture/crop layer for water, light and nutrients
- inconvenience and cost of having to drive around them at cropping time and cleaning up sticks/limbs

On the positive side of the balance sheet:

- Research has shown that:
 - In open paddocks, strong wind and rain can double the energy requirement for the maintenance of cattle and sheep in hot and cold conditions. Trees can provide protection from extreme cold, greatly increasing survival of young animals and newly shorn sheep exposed to these conditions.
 - In the cropping and higher rainfall grazing areas, the systematic planting of 10% of the land in a net of shelter-belts/timberbelts/clusters could achieve a 50% windspeed reduction, and naturally occurring woodlands with mature, scattered trees, can be just as effective.
- Firewood and farm construction timbers
- Play a vital role as stepping stones to maintain ecosystem services as described above (especially when < 30% native vegetation cover is present on property).

The big problem is that the less paddock trees we have, the more intense is the pressure from stock, pests and exposure to the elements on those remaining. As the paddock trees disappear, the small fragmented remnants become more isolated and vulnerable, the stepping stones that maintain wildlife linkages become less efficient, and the downward spiral of decline is sped up. The end result of this is the need for increased cost inputs from the farmer to replace the ecosystem services provided by nature for free.

In the mid-USA, the biggest cost for alphalpha growers is the provision of beehives for pollination of their crops because the 'free' pollination service that used to be provided by the ecosystems around the fields has declined as a result of loss of natural areas and the loss of insect diversity through pesticide use. It is often not until we lose the services that we take for granted that we realise how valuable they are.



Once trained, the fitting service can be offered to clients or people in your community, either on a voluntary or on a fee for service basis.


