SHIRE OF BROOMEHILL-TAMBELLUP

The next Council meeting will be held on Thursday 17 September 2009, commencing at 4.00pm at the Tambellup Chambers. Members of the public are welcome.

WHATS GOING ON IN YOUR TOWN?

Broomehill:

Planting is continuing in gardens around the Broomehill townsite. Community workers have been active in Holland Park, with one rock garden being ready for replanting. The completion of the paving in front of the Broomehill Administration building has been held up due to staff illness.

The Holland Park playground is the spot to watch at the moment, with the new play equipment due to be installed early in September. Unfortunately this has necessitated the removal of the trees in the playground yard, however a shade structure will be installed over the equipment prior to summer.

Water from the town dam has been pumped during wet weather to the recreational dam which is filled up to the inlet pipes. Pumping between the two dams will continue if wet weather sets in, to ensure there is enough water to maintain facilities at the Rec Complex through the summer months.

Tambellup:

Works at Diprose Park are continuing, with the installation of the new BBQ and picnic shelters, and the marking out of pathways. Concreting will be completed, with pads being laid under the shelters, a pathway around the gym equipment, and the hardstand surface. Trees on Henry St have been lopped to encourage regrowth which can be more easily managed in the future. New equipment will be installed in the older children's play area early in September, and pathways will be asphalted when the weather has warmed up. An application has been submitted to Lotterywest for funding to install new swings and some stand alone play equipment in the small children's area, and a shade structure will be installed in this area.

The Crawford St court has also received a facelift thanks to funding received from the Office of Crime Prevention. Community workers have installed new railings around the court, and the surface of the court, backboard and post have been painted. New court lines will be marked in the near future.

We have received advice the skate park will be complete and ready for installation by mid-September and works have been undertaken in the area around the Youth Centre and court to enable the installation and landscaping to be completed.

There will be opportunity shortly for community members to be involved in the creation of various public art works for Diprose Park. As yet no firm plans have been made, but if you are interested in being involved, please contact Pam at the Shire on 98253555.

FROM THE MEETING

- The damaged footpath on Lathom Street, Broomehill between Lavater and Lavarock Streets will be taken up and replaced with a compacted gravel path. Detailed costings for the full replacement of the path will be obtained for consideration in the 2010-2011 budget.
- Permission was granted for the Tambellup Agricultural Society to hold the 2009 Tambellup Show in Norrish St. Council will make application for the closure of the road on this day.

Council will continue to negotiate with the Water Corporation to obtain access to the water from the No 1 Dam on Jam Creek Road for utilisation by the Shire and the Tambellup Primary School.

WORKS

The construction crews have been working on Tambellup West Rd clearing in preparation for the widening. Unfortunately the recent rains have made the road shoulders too soft to continue with gravel works. Until the area dries out, the crew have moved to Broomehill-Kojonup Rd and commenced clearing for the widening of the next 3.7km section.

The maintenance graders have been steadily working their way across the shire, with the following roads being graded during late July and August: Punchmirup Rd, Chillicup Rd, Brassey Rd, Greenhills South Rd, Nardlah Rd, North Greenhills Rd, Norrish Rd, Moulyerup Rd, Curnow Rd, O'Neill Rd, Beejenup Rd, Holly Siding Rd, Pindellup Rd, Palomar Rd, Birt Rd, Warrenup Rd, Sorrento Rd, Paul Valley Rd, Toolbrunup Rd, Crosby Rd, Pallinup South Rd, North West Rd, White Rd, Johnston Rd, Stirling Access Rd, Watergarrup Rd, Yetermerup Rd, Hankinson Rd,

Hilder Rd, Hamilla Rd. If the graders have not visited your part of the world yet, we ask for your patience. The maintenance crew have continued signage works in all areas of the shire and are now focusing on bitumen pothole repairs.

The gardening crew have been short on numbers this month, with the result that all members have been working in both Broomehill and Tambellup to keep up with seasonal tasks. Fertiliser will be spread on both ovals in the next few weeks to encourage strong spring growth. Council has recently taken delivery of a new mower specifically for use on the ovals, which should improve the finish of the grassed areas.

RESTRICTED AND PROHIBITED BURNING PERIOD

All residents of the Broomehill-Tambellup Shire are reminded that the **RESTRICTED** burning period commences on **19 SEPTEMBER 2009** and continues until **15 APRIL 2010** inclusive. During this time you are required to obtain a permit to burn before lighting any fires.

The **PROHIBITED** burning period commences on **1 NOVEMBER 2009** and continues through until the **14 FEBRUARY 2010** inclusive. The lighting of fires during this period is prohibited, however if residents need to do **PROTECTIVE BURNING** during the Prohibited Burning Period they must first obtain a permit from a Fire Control
Officer and then observe all the conditions of the permit. **PROTECTIVE BURNING** is to be carried out between
the hours of 6.00pm and midnight on the same day. No Protective burning is to be carried out after December
20 2009.

Permits to burn can only be issued by the designated Fire Control Officers in each brigade as listed in the Firebreak Order each year, or the Chief or Deputy Fire Control Officers.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REFORM

Confusion appears to be surfacing as the main issue in the Government's current Local Government Reform process. Despite a recently expressed view, there is no "fait accompli" or "yes Minister" agenda. Your Council is focusing on addressing and answering the questions required of this community by the Minister for Local Government.

The main point of confusion surrounds the question of amalgamation and the perception of being forced. At this point in time the Council has resolved that it has a willingness to <u>investigate</u> amalgamating with the member Councils of the VROC (Broomehill-Tambellup, Cranbrook, Kojonup and Plantagenet). This is a far cry from imposing something without due process.

Rather than doing nothing Council has been proactive and taken the responsible path of identifying where our future Regional links may lie and explore the many issues that surround amalgamation. All these issues including employment, representation, social values, community expectations and financial implications will be worked through and if the result is positive then the community will decide.

There is no part of this lengthy process that will be decided without the community having their say and any "conspiracy theories" are unfounded. Some say that we are giving the Minister "ammo" by suggesting our preferred partners, but Council believes that not to indicate our regional preference would be failing on our duty. Council has been given a directive from the Minister to look at the issue of amalgamation and the members are doing so taking into consideration the best interests of the entire community.

Will the State Government force us to amalgamate? We don't know, but if they do we need to have indicated which direction the community is most comfortable in going. If they don't force us then surely investigating the benefits and negatives of an amalgamation will give us answers to the questions being asked.

Either way your Council and staff need your support, as they work through the issues that have been put upon us. If you want to know more information please contact myself, your local Councillor or the CEO who can provide the correct information and alleviate the confusion that is occurring.

Recently arboricultural work was carried out for the Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup. Part of the work entailed reducing the size of some large trees at Diprose Park in Tambellup. The trees were not cut down to 3 meter stumps, to avoid the most harmful tree pruning practise known as Topping. Here are some reasons why we decided against Topping.

What is Topping?

Topping is the indiscriminate cutting of tree branches to stubs or lateral branches that are not large enough to assume the terminal role. Other names for topping include "heading," "tipping," "hat-racking," and "rounding over."

The most common reason given for topping is to reduce the size of a tree. Home owners often feel that their trees have become too large for their property. People fear that tall trees may pose a hazard. Topping, however, is not a viable method of height reduction and certainly does not reduce the hazard. In fact, topping will make a tree more hazardous in the long term.

Topping Stresses Trees

Topping often removes 50 to 100 percent of the leaf-bearing crown of a tree. Because leaves are the food factories of a tree, removing them can temporarily starve a tree. The severity of the pruning triggers a sort of survival mechanism. The tree activates latent buds, forcing the rapid growth of multiple shoots below each cut. The tree needs to put out a new crop of leaves as soon as possible. If a tree does not have the stored energy reserves to do so, it will be seriously weakened and may die.

A stressed tree is more vulnerable to insect and disease infestations. Large, open pruning wounds expose the sapwood and heartwood to attacks. The tree may lack sufficient energy to chemically defend the wounds against invasion, and some insects are actually attracted to the chemical signals trees release.

Topping Causes Decay

The preferred location to make a pruning cut is just beyond the branch collar at the branch's point of attachment. The tree is biologically equipped to close such a wound, provided the tree is healthy enough and the wound is not too large. Cuts made along a limb between lateral branches create stubs with wounds that the tree may not be able to close. The exposed wood tissues begin to decay. Normally, a tree will "wall off," or compartmentalize, the decaying tissues, but few trees can defend the multiple severe wounds caused by topping. The decay organisms are given a free path to move down through the branches.



as new wood is produced. Normally it will compartmentalize any internal decay.



Topping Can Lead to Sunburn

Branches within a tree's crown produce thousands of leaves to absorb sunlight. When the leaves are removed, the remaining branches and trunk are suddenly exposed to high levels of light and heat. The result may be sunburn of the tissues beneath the bark, which can lead to cankers, bark splitting, and death of some branches.

Topping Creates Hazards

The survival mechanism that causes a tree to produce multiple shoots below each topping cut comes at great expense to the tree. These shoots develop from buds near the surface of the old branches. Unlike normal branches that develop in a socket of overlapping wood tissues, these new shoots are anchored only in the outermost layers of the parent branches. The new shoots grow quickly, as much as 20 feet in one year, in some species. Unfortunately, the shoots are prone to breaking, especially during windy conditions. The irony is that while the goal was to reduce the tree's height to make it safer, it has been made more hazardous than before.



Topping Makes Trees Ugly

The natural branching structure of a tree is a biological wonder. Trees form a variety of shapes and growth habits, all with the same goal of presenting their leaves to the sun. Topping removes the ends of the branches, often leaving ugly stubs. Topping destroys the natural form of a tree. Without leaves (up to 6 months of the year in temperate climates), a topped tree appears disfigured and mutilated. With leaves, it is a dense ball of foliage, lacking its simple grace. A tree that has been topped can never fully regain its natural form.

Topping Is Expensive

The cost of topping a tree is not limited to what the perpetrator is paid. If the tree survives, it will require pruning again within a few years. It will either need to be reduced again or storm damage will have to be cleaned up. If the tree dies, it will have to be removed.

Topping is a high-maintenance pruning practice, with some hidden costs. One is the reduction in property value. Healthy, well-maintained trees can add 10 to 20 percent to the value of a property. Disfigured, topped trees are considered an impending expense.

Another possible cost of topped trees is potential liability. Topped trees are prone to breaking and can be hazardous. Because topping is considered an unacceptable pruning practice, any damage caused by branch failure of a topped tree may lead to a finding of negligence in a court of law.





Gardening tips for the month from the WA Floral Art newsletter: Take advantage of the damp soil for weeding, unless you have excessive clay weeds pull out more easily and if you don't mind a light drizzle it's a good time to put in new plants, they hardly notice the transplant shock.

Sprinkle your used tea leaves around the base of acid loving plants including roses and tomatoes, tea leaves

Broomehill Historical Notes

Quite a few years ago Shirley MacDonald began to work through the diaries of her Grandfather, Thomas Norrish (TN) which he wrote when he first came to Eticup to take up farming and the diaries of William Henry Graham (WHG) who was also one of the first pioneers of the Eticup district. Shirley collated all the information both in alphabetical and chronological order. There are many wonderful pieces of information and anecdotes in these diaries and we are proud to share them with the community each month.

McGuire, Arthur – Fourth son of Philip and Mary. In July 1864, 16 year old Arthur played cricket for the Eticup Cricket Club and in august practiced for the match against Kojonup.

McGuire, Thomas – Third son of Philip and Mary. In October 1883 brought a mare to Goblup to be served and was there again on 18th to play cricket with the shearers. In July 1884 he played cricket with the Eticup Cricket Club and in august practiced for the match against Kojonup. On 7th September he played cricket at Goblup and stayed overnight at Sunnyside.

In July 1890 he worked for TN at Goblup, collecting rails from Old Eticup (Ettakup) carting fencing, fencing and carting manure. In 1894 a list of Broome Hill residents included Thomas McGuire, manager of Pallinup Station. On 19th December 1895 he was elected to the Broome Hill Road Board. On 31st

December 1898 he returned from the cricket in Brome Hill with Richie Norrish, remained overnight and stayed all day on 1st January 1899. On 6th February 1907, Tom McGuire accompanied Rich Norrish (who had replaced his father on the Road Board) to see about some new roads. On 14th March he bought 100 imported rams at Holley's sale and on 4th July he visited Sunnyside with Mr Knight and brought his little girl to stay for a few days. Thomas McGuire had married the school teacher Brigid Roche on 5th September 1901 and renamed the new homestead from Moorelup to Fermoy.

McGuire, John – Eldest son of Philip and Mary of Moorelup. TN makes several references to him; on April 14th 1882 arranging with TN to let him Pootenup Farm for that year for a rent of 3 tons (3.6 tonnes) of hay; on 11th January 1883 TN saw him at Pootenup with his father and in November brought his mare to Goblup to be served; and in 1884 he was ploughing at Pootenup, practicing cricket for the match against Kojonup and bringing in a colt to be castrated.

McKail, John –Merchant and Agent of Albany. In 1852 he made the first selection of land at Eticup, B Class Grazing Lease 113 of 4 000 acres (1620 ha) at Ettakup Pool followed in 1855 with a grant of 10 acres freehold (Hay Location 1) whose datum point was the center of the Pool and which cost him €10 sterling. His daughter Emma

married William Henry Graham (WHG).

McKail sold Hay Location 1 and the B113 lease to

Solomon Drolf, who in turn, after adding two small blocks
to Hay Location 1 sold the freehold land and his interest in

Lease B113 to Richards Norrish Snr for £100 sterling.

John McKail supervised the transaction and was possibly

Drolf's mortgagee.

John McKail died in 1871 but McKail & Co. continued. Most settlers did business with them and many were in their debt. In 1884,Patrick Carmody was dunned (sic) by them for a considerable sum. He went to TN for advice as he could get no satisfaction from the Co. and to pay £60 a year and provide for his family he could not do. McKail & Co later became Drew Robinson & Co.
