

BUDGET OVERVIEW

The 2020/2021 Annual Budget for the Shire was adopted by Council on 23rd July 2020.

This years' budget totals \$12 million, representing \$6.5 million in operating expenditures and \$5.5 million in capital expenditures. The Shire's Community Strategic Plan 2018-2028 and Corporate Business Plan 2018-2022 provide the strategic direction for Council and the Community. The budget process takes into consideration the strategies included in these plans, as well as the Strategic Resource Plan (asset management/long term financial planning) and Workforce Plan.

Despite all of our Planning and Strategies, this year's budget is a necessary diversion from our long term financial planning and previous budgets as we, as a community and as a Local Government, deal with the fallout of the 2020 Coronavirus pandemic. For the first time we have achieved a budget with no increase in the Shire's rate revenue. This will assist ratepayers to deal with the financial impacts of COVID19.

We are fortunate to be in a State and Nation that has responded and adjusted to COVID19, however, the impact of this pandemic needs to be accommodated. We will also need to be nimble and agile enough to respond and adjust if the situation changes dramatically.

As well as capital project costs, every year we experience increases in operating costs, as all households and businesses do, from insurance and power to increased commodity costs, and rate increases are required to address these increased costs. No increase in rate revenue results in significant constraints on our ability to meet community expectations, and results in decreased capacity to service the community.

The constraints influencing Council budget this year are however offset by two new funding streams that will, at least temporarily, ameliorate lost revenue.

Drought Communities Program

In January 2020 Council was advised that it is eligible for Drought Communities Program funding (DCP) as it meets specific criteria for this program that is now offered to Western Australia. This funding, targeted at economic stimulus rather than drought resilience, offers the opportunity to undertake development identified in our Strategies and long term planning that currently remain unbudgeted.

Using our Community Strategy as the driver, and after further community consultation, a number of projects have been identified in Broomehill and Tambellup. Listed below, these projects offer a unique opportunity to improve the amenity and impression of both towns:

- Holland Track Interpretive Centre
- Broomehill Complex Access Upgrades
- Holland Park Nature Play Area
- Broomehill Streetscape upgrades

- Tambellup Town Square Redevelopment
- Tambellup Youth Centre Upgrade
- Tambellup Streetscape upgrades
- Water efficiency improvements

Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program

Council was notified in June that it is eligible for Local Road and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Program funding; a new funding stream in response to COVID19. Using the same eligibility and funding arrangements as Federal Assistance Grants, the Shire is eligible for up to \$441,000.

Given the significant achievements in housing development the previous financial year and the proposed community focussed projects under Drought Communities Program funding, Council has resolved to allocate all LRCI funding towards roads and road projects.

The majority of this funding will be allocated to road re-sheeting projects; though a new footpath linking the Broomehill Post Office with the Caravan Park, as well as improvements to kerbing in both towns are included.

Roads planned for re-sheeting include:

- Beejenup Road from slk 6.20 to 7.44
- Birt Road (2-3kms)
- Paul Valley Road (2-3kms)

- Yetermerup Road (2-3kms)
- Stirling Access Road (2-3kms)
- Flat Rocks Road (2-3kms)

It is also planned to repair and extend culverts along Etna Road and Nymbup Road, utilising LRCI funding.

OTHER KEY PROJECTS

Water Resources and Efficiency

Council has allocated funding to improve the availability of water for domestic, stock and firefighting use in both Broomehill and Tambellup.

Additional tanks with a volume of 360 Kilolitres will be constructed in each town, providing a total of 720 kilolitres of stored water on top of existing stand pipes and dams. This builds on existing initiatives to harvest water from the shed roof at the Shire Depot and to improve water harvesting off the CBH site in Broomehill.

Importantly, water stored in tanks is available without electricity during a fire, and these projects will contribute substantially to community safety.

Broomehill Fire Shed

The Broomehill Fire Shed, largely completed, will be completed by the end of September. This \$460,000 project will further enhance the proposed Streetscape upgrades.

Great Southern Housing Initiative

The Shire has finished construction of four Independent Living Units in Broomehill and four houses in Tambellup as part of this project. Two cabins and two houses in Broomehill should be completed by the end of August, completing this significant project.

Road Construction and Maintenance

A road construction program of \$1,893,000 is planned for the coming year. Council is fortunate to receive funding from the Regional Road Group, State Black Spot and Roads to Recovery programs, which assists in meeting the costs in completing the planned projects. Regional Road Group and Black Spot funds are allocated on the basis that 2/3 in funding is provided by Main Roads WA and Councils are required to contribute 1/3. Roads to Recovery is delivered by the Federal government funding does not require a matching contribution.

Along with the LRCI funded works, the road program includes the following projects:

Regional Road Group

- Tambellup West Rd pavement repair and reseal
- Pootenup Rd pavement repair and reseal
- Toolbrunup Rd pavement repair and reseal
- Broomehill-Kojonup Rd pavement repair and reseal
- Gnowangerup-Tambellup Rd pavement repair and reseal

State Black Spot

- Flat Rocks/Greenhills South Rd intersection improvements
- Tieline/Moulyerup Rd intersection improvements
- Tieline/Norrish Rd intersection improvements

Roads to Recovery

- Pallinup Road seal
- Warrenup Road stabilise and seal failed section

Upgrade of footpaths in the Broomehill and Tambellup town sites will continue during the year, and will be undertaken in stages over the coming 4-5 years.

Plant Replacement

The Shire strives to maintain a modern fleet of vehicles and equipment, and maintains a 10 Year Plant Replacement Program to achieve this objective. Optimum use and changeover times have been identified for plant and equipment, ensuring the Shire receives best value for money and to minimise the impact on annual budgets.

Funds are held in the Plant Reserve which is used to achieve all changeovers and purchases included in the Plant Replacement Program. Any savings realised throughout the year on plant and equipment changeovers is retained in the Reserve for future requirements. Along with changeover of the light fleet, a grader is scheduled to be changed over. This represents a significant cost, however, to achieve the consistent high standard of roads in our shire it is imperative to maintain this fleet.

Tambellup Caravan Park

Council purchased the former bowling club in Tambellup in 17/18, and has agreed to sell the land to a private developer to convert this site into a new caravan park. Sale of the land should occur in September, with development commencing shortly afterward.

FROM THE COUNCIL MEETING

Council endorsed an amended Purchasing Policy, in response to a regulatory amendment to support local governments in responding to the COVID-19 pandemic. The WALGA model policy was considered and endorsed.

Council granted a rates concession to the Tambellup Golf Club for the 2020-2021 financial year.

Council endorsed amendments to the locations of new water tanks to be installed. These tanks will provide additional water security for emergency and community use. Locations are:

- Installation of a 250 kilolitre water tank at Donald Street Tambellup on existing 40mm meter as originally proposed;
- Installation of a 250 kilolitre water tank at Broomehill Shire Depot with existing 50mm meter to replace proposed tank on Broomehill-Kojonup Road;
- Installation of a new 110 kilolitre tank to replace the existing 90 Kilolitre tank at Donald Street and connect to a new 25mm meter;
- Installation of a new 110 kilolitre tank on existing 25mm meter at Broomehill Town Dam as originally proposed.

WORKS

The construction crew has undertaken a minor program of works during August, prior to the commencement of the budgeted works program. Jobs were completed on Beejenup Rd – reshaping and gravel sheeting of a 2km section, and heavy winter grading, and Toolbrunup Rd – grading of bitumen edges and cleaning drains. The task of renewing broken kerbing in various areas of the townsites has commenced.

Roadside vegetation pruning has been undertaken just west of the Broomehill townsite on Broomehill-Kojonup Rd, and roadside spraying has been completed.

The maintenance crew has again been active across the Shire, repairing pot holes and road failures, attending to fallen trees, installing guide posts, and signage maintenance and renewal.

Recent rains have improved the dam levels in Broomehill, with the Town Dam, Bignell Dam and CBH Dam all overflowing. The solar pump system on the CBH Dam is working, however the overcast days we have experienced have reduced the continuity of water transfer to the Complex Dam, which is about one third full. The Shire intends to source a diesel generator for the CBH dam to assist in transferring available water to the Complex Dam. Unfortunately the rain did not reach Tambellup in the same quantity, and the Jam Creek Dam level is quite low.

The parks and gardens crew has completed seasonal tasks, including weeding, spraying, mowing, mulching of garden bends and pruning in recent weeks. New plantings have been undertaken at the information bay at the northern entrance to Tambellup, and a mass planting of kangaroo paws next to the railway tank stand in Norrish St. These are already flowering, and will look impressive as they grow to fill the space.

The maintenance graders have been working on the following roads during late July and August: West Peringillup Rd, Pallinup Rd, Brassey Rd, Greenhills South Rd, Etna Rd, Beejenup Rd, Simpson Rd, No Name Rd, Peter Valley Rd and Witham Rd.

WORKS REQUESTS

All residents and contractors are reminded that any works requests must be made through the Shire office to ensure they are able to be recorded and tracked for completion and invoicing. ITS NEARLY BUSHFIRE SEASON AGAIN......

As we move into spring, all residents are reminded the **RESTRICTED** burning period commences on **19 SEPTEMBER 2020**. From this date you are required to obtain a permit to burn before lighting any fires, and all conditions of the permit must be complied with. Permits to burn can be obtained from your Brigade Fire Control Officer, or the Community Emergency Services Manager, Cindy Pearce. Contact details for permits are as follows:

THE IMPACT OF THE KATANNING FIRE

In February this year, the Katanning community experienced a devastating fire that impacted properties on the edge of the townsite. Thankfully, due to the efforts of volunteer brigades, the impact within the townsite was limited to the loss of only one house and damage to neighbouring properties. However, the broader impact on community members was far more widespread and long lasting.

The Katanning incident serves as a wakeup call to all communities in our region, that if the conditions are right for a bushfire, we are all vulnerable. So – if you live in the townsites, or in Special Rural/Rural Residential areas of Broomehill or Tambellup, you need to act now, to ensure your property is prepared for the upcoming fire season. Your actions now could save your life, that of your neighbours and fellow community members, and your property and assets.

All landowners in the Residential, Special Rural and Rural Residential zoned areas of the Shire, are required to comply with the following requirements of the Fire Break Order:

1.0 LAND ZONED RESIDENTIAL, TOWN CENTRE, INDUSTRIAL (Townsite land)

During the period from 31st October 2020 to 15th April 2021 inclusive you shall have firebreaks in the following positions:

1.1 On land which is 4000 square metres (one acre) or less in area, you shall remove all flammable material from the whole of the land, except live standing trees.

1.2 Land which exceeds 4000 square metres

On land which is 4000 sq metres (1 acre) or more in area, clear firebreaks not less than **2 metres** completely surrounding and not more than **20 metres** from the perimeter of all buildings, haystacks and fuel storage areas situated on the land.

• The height of all grass on the land is to be less than 150mm in height.

2.0 LAND ZONED RURAL RESIDENTIAL/SPECIAL RURAL (Townsite and Suburban areas)

During the period from 31st October 2020 to 15th April 2021 inclusive you shall have firebreaks in the following positions:

2.1 Clear firebreaks not less than **2 metres** completely surrounding and not more than **20 metres** from the perimeter of all buildings, haystacks and fuel storage areas situated on the land.

Minimise fire hazardous material to the satisfaction of the Chief Fire Control Officer by stocking, slashing or other means.

- The height of all grass on the land is to be less than 150mm in height.
- Properties will be inspected and orders may be issued.

Over the past few years the management of a number of Special Rural and Rural Residential blocks by owners/ occupiers to ensure compliance with this requirement has resulted in less than satisfactory outcomes. This year the Shire will be conducting inspections once again to ensure all Special Rural and Rural Residential zoned properties comply and maintain compliance throughout the required period.

If compliance is not achieved, the Shire has the power under the *Bush Fires Act 1954* to issue infringements, and/or have the work required undertaken by a contractor at the owners expense. We encourage all owners with land in Special Rural and Rural Residential areas to assess now what they need to do to be compliant, undertake these works and monitor their land for bushfire hazards during the fire season. UPDATE FROM THE TAMBELLUP POLICE



Welcome to the month of sprouting yellow flowers and green pastures! Josh is away so I have been tasked to write this month's TOPICS.

While some of our motorbike enthusiasts still continue to break Tambellup's serene ambience with the sounds of back-firing off road bikes, we've noticed an improvement in less on-road use and some riders now wearing helmets. Stay safe and ride to your

limitations.

Speaking of motorcycles: Many of the intersecting side roads along Great Southern and Albany Highways are 'give-way' sign controlled. This means 'Slow down and prepare to stop.' I don't know about you, but a quick glance left and right to check if 1+ tonnes of metal is barrelling towards me at 110km/hr just doesn't feel safe sometimes. If you're on a motorbike, its even more precarious. Certainly, you'd have succeeded in abiding to the give-way sign requirements, and the legislation would be on your side in the event of a crash, but you would possibly be far worse off than the other road occupier. So, you can and sometimes should, stop even if the minimal law requirements state 'give way'.

Carefully layered intersections, coated with bright coloured LED traffic control signals and reflectively marked warning signs exist at most junctions in hubs like Perth. We also have them in the country, however us country folk must also rely on our personal accountability, common sense and proactivity which can save a life on the road. Stay safe and well done on reporting hoons and keeping our roads safe so far this year – Thank you!

I wanted to speak briefly about domestic violence and mental health. Two separate areas but they go hand in hand:

If you or anyone you know suffers in a relationship, ask them to reach out to a support agency. Despite some rumours, support agencies do remain confidential about things you discuss. Some are made to comply with confidence under law! The only reason confidentiality would ever be breached is if you or someone else are in imminent danger as the result of your information, a homicide has taken place, the information comes under mandatory child abuse legislation, or the court orders a release of the agency's records for a specific case.

If you pop down to speak with Josh or myself about issues at home, we will likely submit a domestic incident report which then goes to a data base. From there, depending on your permission being granted, someone may call you privately to offer help.

Please remember that staying in painful situations, no matter how hopeless they seem, are not your only options. Often, the bully in the relationship will use tactics like blocking calls, mail, email, public information opportunities like news etc to keep the other person disempowered and hopeless.

Human beings have a wonderful ability to 'adapt' to almost any situation. Please don't wait until you have to call 000 before reaching out. If it feels wrong, it usually is. If it's a 'probably' instead of a 'yes', then it's usually a 'yes' in disguise.

"Is my partner abusive?" "Sometimes, probably = Yes." Reach out, 9854 9800 is our land line and we will help. Take little steps towards a direction you want to go.

It was really great to meet with some folks at Lynthia's place last month. Thanks to May, Kerry, Sherma, Margaret and all the welcoming locals last Tuesday for having me for coffee and for the catch up.

With the sun shining, please look out for our kids and be aware of the morning blindness on the roads. This can be caused by wet windows with frost or just awkward angles between bends in the road. Slow down or stop, wipe the window and move on safely.

A reminder that police don't do 'learner' permits and that the local shire can help with those.

Have a lovely September and look after one another and yourself.

Stories by Vicki Brown - Glimpse into the past

Telecentres were the new big thing, Rod Hilton (CEO) wanted one before we really knew what they were, he lobbied hard and with Shire Council support along with Gay Short, who was the Telecentre network powerhouse and Fay (?) from the WA Libraries, we got one of the first Telecentres. It was located in the Old Station Masters House, along with the Wool [Foundation] front two offices, CGS Business Enterprise Centre had the right hand side and the Telecentre had the left side, it didn't take long to realise this was going to grow fast and more space was required.

So, the Shire purchased Snowy's shop and we scrubbed, sanded floors, and ground away the billiard table supports, creating enough dust it was billowing out of the doors and windows. Anyone my age or older will remember Snowy Wilson, if you took him something to repair after a few months when you dropped back in to see if he'd finished, he'd try to sell you your own iron, tv or washing machine back.

With Gay and Fay we had negotiated the library being moved from the reception area of the shire offices to the new building. The library was popular now the computer netowork gave us access to the encyclopaedias on disk - and the very beginnings of the World Wide Web (Yahoo and Altavista back then). The kids used to pile in, and the school said the quality of the assignments went up, the kids just liked using & playing on the computers I think. Not many homes at that time had computers in them. It was one of the selling points that rolled out the network and we used it (and not just to the kids).

We had a reasonable crowd on the bit opening day, in front leaning on the walking stick is Snowy Wilson it was his shop for many years before it became our community hub. In fact it was more, also the barbershop, the billardroom Club and where the office section is was his wife Dixie's shop.


Many of us had a go on the committee. Here Kay Herbert was the President, I was vice-

Tambellup 1980 C.G.S.N.F.L Premiership

40 years ago, on the 21st of this month Stubbs Park Dumbleyung was the dry, dusty venue for the 1980 Central Great Southern National Football League grand final. On that day long time rivals Kojonup and Tambellup, both teams loaded with home grown players, faced off in the big dance.

Kojonup had been the dominant football team in the Central Great Southern throughout the 1970s and came into the 1980 season as the reigning premiers having gone through the entire 1979 season undefeated

In 1979 Tambellup, under the guidance of coach Rowland Sprigg, were very much a team on the rise before eventually bowing out in the preliminary final to Katanning team Australs.

By 1980, under new coach James Allan, Tambellup was a team ready to go further and as a group possessed a strong mindset to truly test the Koji Magpies.

The match itself was a wonderful game of Aussie Rules footy played before a huge vocal crowd. Veteran commentator of the day Geoff Holmes considered it the best of the ten grand finals he had covered for radio 6WB! Indeed this match would not be out of place as the best contested grand final of the 30-odd year history of the Central Great Southern league. A highlight was the tremendous one-on-one duels played out all over the ground. Key to this was the fact that Tambellup either won or at least broke even in those duels. The backlines of both teams were on top all day but it was the Demons' forwards who proved more efficient and effective with their opportunities in front of goal.

There were tremendous scenes of joy upon the final siren as Tambellup supporters (deprived of grand final success since 1962) rushed onto the ground. In the midst of it all, Greg Parnell calmly goaled after the siren to make the final margin 8 points in Tambellup's favour. Final scores were Tambellup 15.3 (93) to Kojonup 12.13 (85).

Of those pictured on the front cover ...

<u>Mal Anderson</u> – Possessed of genuine pace, his link up work across half forward was crucial particularly in the second quarter when Tambellup piled on 6 goals to Kojonup's 1.

<u>Greg Pick</u> – Bustling player who started on the bench, impacted the Tambellup forward line when moved onto the ground.

<u>Murray Bowman</u> – Competed hard firstly at centre half-forward then in defence when moved there as cover for the injured Hams. Played his best footy when moved back into attack in the tense last quarter.

Norman Herbert – Another outstanding duel with his long-time rival Stephen Hill. Won his share of the ball and linked up well with Schlueter to clear out the ball from the full-back line. Solid all day.

<u>Kim Woods</u> – Fast talking helmeted character. Coped well with the pressure of Kojonup's big bodied half-back line. Sprang to life in second half kicking two crucial goals and provided impetus when contesting centre bounce downs.

<u>Doug Williams</u> – *Mr Perfection* himself as described by commentator Holmes. Kicked 5 goals for his team. Legend has it he moved himself into the backline in the thrilling final minutes, twice repelling Kojonup attacks.

<u>Ned Parnell</u> – Tough, determined character. Magnificent game in the centre gave his team great drive out of the middle, chased and tackled hard. Kicked a vital third quarter goal.

<u>Bruce Trevaskis</u> – Would have been a worthy winner of best-on-ground honours had it fallen his way. Brilliant on a wing in an absorbing duel with Fleay. Linked up well with his defenders and used his left-footed kicks very effectively.

<u>Leo Kelemanis</u> – Came into the team as a result of injury to the unlucky Wayne Green. Positioned at half-back, the TPS chalkie played a wonderful game. Used his bulk willingly and effectively clearing the ball out of defence many times with great dash and purpose.

<u>Ray Williams</u> – Tambellup's number one ruckman. Lead the following division in an exciting battle against their Kojonup opponents. Split the points with Plietner in the air but more effective around the ground gathering many possessions. Mobile, balanced footballer with superb two-sided kicking skills.

<u>George Hams</u> – Started the game deep in defence. Injured whilst taking a strong mark right on the Kojonup goal line in the first quarter. Spent time off the ground before returning. Strong again in the backline and also in the ruck when giving Williams a spell.

<u>Kevin Roberts (runner)</u> – Gave the Tambellup Football Club great service during his time in the district. Went the extra yard with his assistance to injury recovery for players mid-week. Important.

<u>John Durack</u> – Wonderful contribution, fantastic tustle with Tim Eyres. His size, strength and willing body work matched that of the Magpies backline. Lead and marked strongly all game.

<u>Bruce Gillam</u> – Superb game from Tambellup's centre-half-back. Won almost all his one-on-one duels, tackled hard, marked superbly and gave his team great forward drive. Worthy winner of the South Fremantle award as the best player on the ground.

<u>Greg Parnell</u> – Spent the vast majority of the match on the bench. Had an immediate impact once on the ground, culminating in his long torpedo punt goal after the siren. Special moment.

<u>Darryl Williams</u> – Free flowing two-sided footballer. Kicked two goals for his team to more than play his part in the exciting shootout between the two teams roving divisions. Ball use a highlight.

<u>Jeff Farmer</u> – Like Bowman, found himself moving between defence and attack throughout the match. Most effective when linking up between the two. The very early days of a long, distinguished playing career.

<u>Ken Schlueter</u> – Strong defensive display at fullback. Made the boundary line his friend, often thumping the ball clear with his fists. On that day became Tambellup's first premiership captain in 18 years. Upon retirement, continued giving to local football in his role as a central umpire.

<u>Pascoe Durtanovich (president)</u> – Tambellup's Shire clerk (now CEO) of the day. Retired as a player at the end of 1979 (resuming again in 81). President for a year. Keen sportsman who also made a strong contribution to local cricket.

<u>Jim Allan (coach)</u> – Became a premiership coach in his first year at the helm. Passionate and with great energy "JAR" lead Tambellup through a golden period playing in three successive grand finals (80, 81, 82) winning two of them. "We shall not be moved".

<u>Mike Batchelor</u> – Wonderful effort from the team's leading defensive utility player. Best on ground in second quarter as Tambellup stormed back into the match. Never shirked putting himself in front of the oncoming pack and pulled down several strong defensive marks.

<u>Brian Aylmore</u> – Along with Gillam and Kelemanis, the third member of the only line of either team that clearly won their positions on the day. From the first to the final whistle had the ball on a string. Tackled hard and spoilt effectively when required.

<u>Ray Trevaskis</u> – Perhaps marked to a higher level than his peerst, 4 goals in any game is a wonderful effort. To do so in a tight, hotly contested grand final was outstanding. Distinguished himself over his direct opponents by his willingness to work back deep into defence running the ball out of danger on several occasions. Along with Doug Williams, a match winner.

<u>Graham Durtanovich (mascot)</u> – In one of those great little life stories, after leaving Tambellup, Graham grew to be a strapping 6 ft 3 inch lad who played First Grade cricket in Perth for Willeton where he was coached by Terry Waldron (who kicked 6 goals for Kojonup in the 1980 grand final!).

<u>Lorne Sprigg (mascot)</u> – Son of Kerry and Solvie. Also grew into an outstanding cricketer, playing and coaching the South Perth Cricket Club in First Grade competition. From 1996 – 2006 distinguished himself as one of the Tambellup Cricket Club's finest ever players. Represented WA's Country XI team that won this state's first ever National Country Cricket Championship.

Information Note

What is a Building Protection Zone?

Key Points

- Fuel loads influence bushfire intensity.
- The lower the fire's intensity the less impact on the building.
- Creating a minimum 20 metre reduced fuel load area (building protection zone) will increase the protection of the building.
- Ember protection is important to protect the building.
- Constructing or retrofitting your home to meet the Australian Standard 3959— Construction of buildings in bushfire-prone areas; and addressing bushfire risks in accordance with the Planning for Bushfire Risk Management Guidelines will ensure your house has the best bushfire protection.

Definitions

- Scrub crown is the green, leaf material on the scrub plants.
- Surface fire is the fire burning the leaves and scrub on the top of the ground.
- Mineral earth firebreak is a firebreak without vegetation.
- Ember attack is where the bark and fine vegetation material is set alight, becomes airborne and is carried forward of the fire.

Managing and reducing fuel loads

Managing and reducing fuel loads for a minimum of 20 metres around a building will increase its likely survival from a bushfire.

Known as the Building Protection Zone (BPZ), the aim of this area is to ensure that there will be no direct flame contact on the building from a bushfire. By utilising fuel management options it will also be possible to reduce the potential radiant heat impact on the building.

If there is little or nothing to burn then the fire's impact will be reduced. This can be achieved by:

- Maintaining a minimum 2 metre gap between trees and the building. Make sure that no trees overhang the house.
- Ensuring tree crowns are a minimum of 10 metres apart.
- Ensuring there is a gap between shrubs and buildings of three times their mature height.
- · Ensuring shrubs aren't planted in clumps.
- Keeping the grass short and prune the scrub so that it is not dense, nor does it
 have fine, dead aerated material in the crown of the scrub.
- · Raking up leaf litter and twigs under trees and remove trailing bark.
- Pruning lower branches (up to 2 metres off the ground) to stop a surface fire spreading to the canopy of the trees.
- · Creating a mineral earth firebreak.
- Having your paths adjacent to the building and have your driveway placed so that it maximises the protection to the house.

- · Storing firewood away from the building.
- Ensuring fences and sheds are constructed using non-combustible materials, but preferably not located in the BPZ.
- · Keeping your gutters free of leaves and other combustible material.
- Ensuring gas bottles are secured and positioned so that they will vent away from the building, if subject to flame contact or radiant heat.

Ember attack

In a bushfire, most homes that are damaged or destroyed are from ember attack. These burning embers get into gaps within the building, such as into the roof cavity, and ignite the material within the cavity. It can take a number of hours before the burning becomes apparent and by that time the building may not be able to be saved.



It is recommended that all homes that may be affected by embers be made ember proof. If a bushfire occurs in the general area, then the roof cavity and other crevices should be inspected to ensure that no embers have caused a fire. Be aware that there are electricity cables in the roof area and the introduction of water will be a safety issue.






