Claim a maximum of \$150 back on a native tree

Helping expand WA's urban tree canopy.

Treebate is available to Western Australian residents aged 18 years or older
who have purchased a native tree from a retailer located in WA on or after 28
July 2025. Rebates will be equal to the amount spent on the tree, up to a
maximum of \$150. *(maximum 1 claim per person.)*

What you need to claim Treebate

- ✓ **A photo** of the plant label from your new native tree
showing the tree name (species name and/or common name)
- ✓ **An itemised tax invoice**

*Note: The tax invoice must not be handwritten or have handwritten
additions such as a date or ABN.*

Claim via the ServiceWA app (fastest and easiest option)

Alternative ways to claim Treebate

If you can't use the ServiceWA app, you can claim using a paper form.
Download, complete and post with:

- Copies of your identity documents to meet
100 points of ID
- A photocopy of your valid tax invoice
- A photocopy of the tree tag

MANAGING FUEL SHORTAGES

To make sure fuel is used where it matters most, we have put practical plans in place to guide our work during this period comprising:

- Services that support community safety and wellbeing, such as road maintenance, waste collection, drainage works and urgent repairs, will remain our top priority;
- Continuing to progress important and time-critical projects;
- Smarter scheduling - works will be planned together and coordinated to reduce travel and fuel use, helping us make the most of available resources; and
- Delaying or postponing non-urgent work.

As part of our fuel management plan, all private works requests have been temporarily paused. This allows available fuel to be directed toward essential services and priority works that support the safety and needs of the wider community. Private works will resume once fuel supplies return to more stable levels.

The Shire is staying in close contact with fuel suppliers and contractors and will continue to adjust plans as needed. We will keep the community updated if there are any changes that may affect services or project timelines.

We understand that delays can be inconvenient, and we truly appreciate everyone's patience and understanding.

We remain committed to supporting our community and implementing temporary measures to help ensure essential services remain reliable during this challenging period.

UPGRADES AROUND OUR SHIRE

We have recently completed a couple of great upgrades around town, improving both how our streets look and how safe our roads are to travel on.

Crowden Street is starting to look greener with the installation of new Liquidambar trees. While they're still young, these trees will grow to provide a cool, shady canopy in the years ahead and give the street a whole new feel. With their changing colours through the seasons, they'll add character and charm as they mature.

The trees have been planted in specially designed planters that include an internal watering system to help them thrive. Cast iron grates have been fitted for durability and safety, and rustic hard wood bollards have been installed to protect the trees and complete the streetscape.

Upgrades have also been completed at the Nardlah Road and Broomehill-Gnowangerup Road intersection as part of the Black Spot Program.

The works were focused on improving safety for everyone using this busy intersection and included:

- A new asphalt surface
- Rumble strips to alert drivers as they approach
- New warning signs
- Clearer line marking
- Additional guideposts for better visibility

These improvements will help make journeys through this area safer and more comfortable for residents and visitors.

The Shire appreciates the community's patience while these works were carried out and looks forward to continuing to deliver practical improvements that make our towns safer, greener and more enjoyable places to live.

We will be conducting a Bulk Waste Collection for Broomehill and Tambellup townsites from **Monday, 18 May – Wednesday, 20 May**.

This service is for items not normally collected as part of the weekly wheelie bin service.

Who Can Participate

All residents within the Broomehill and Tambellup townsites who receive a rubbish collection service are eligible.

When to Place Items Out

Residents are invited to neatly place bulk waste items on their verge from **Monday 11 May 2026**. Items must be stacked at least 1 metre from the verge.

Please ensure waste is safely and tidily arranged.

PLEASE NOTE:

Late requests cannot be accommodated and items placed out after this time will not be collected.

Assistance and Large Items

Please contact the Shire on (08) 9825 3555 by Monday, 11 May 2026, if you:

- Are a senior resident;
- Have a disability and require help moving heavy items; or
- Have car bodies or other large items you would like collected.

What Can Be Collected

- General bulk household items;
- Clean green waste (must be separated from other rubbish); and
- Refrigerators only if they have been de-gassed and the doors have been removed.

Items That Will NOT Be Collected

- Household or food waste
- Chemicals or hazardous materials
- Paint tins
- Refrigerators that are not de-gassed or still have doors attached

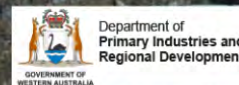

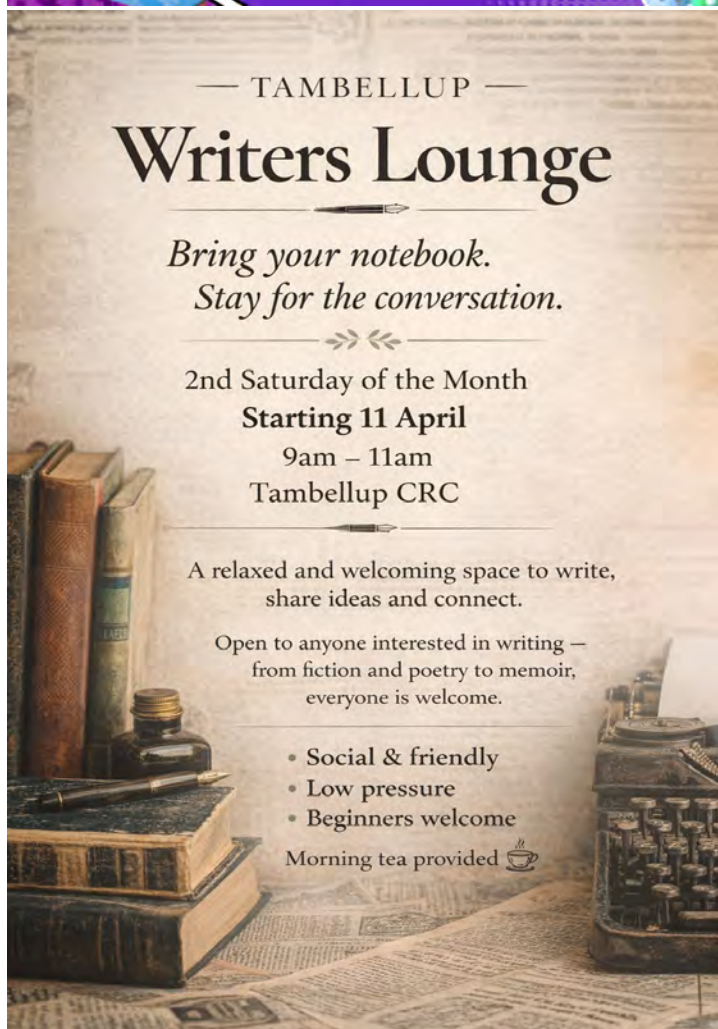

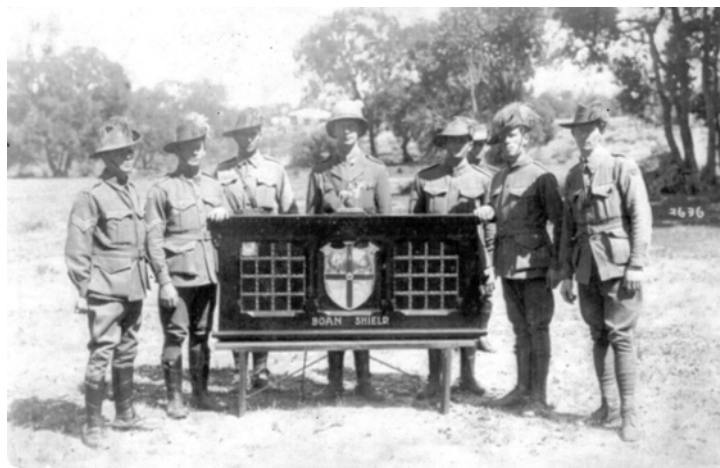

"Light Horse. 1924

A social was held recently, and the trophies won by the Tambellup Troop at the recent Guildford encampment were presented. Col. Birt, who made the presentations, congratulated the troop for their excellent performance on winning almost all the prizes.

The following cups were presented: - Cpl. Abernethy tent pegging, alarm and rush): Tpr. 1. MCRae (440

yards): Tpr. G. Flower (220 yards): Tpr. T. Hull (heavyweight boxing):

Tprs. R. and S. Sagers (lightweight boxing): Tpr. R. Sagers (three furlong gallop).

The Boan Shield, which is competed for annually and presented to the best all-round troop in the Regiment was also won by Tambellup.

This shield is now on view at Boans Ltd., Perth., from whence it will go to Regimental Headquarters for one month, then to Squadron Headquarters at Katanning, for another month and then be presented to the Tambellup Troop, who are entitled to hold it until better troop can be found.

The Tambellup boys say they have it permanently."

Tambellup Light Horse also won the Boan Shield in 1931 with the time of 10min:49secs. The competition was over a course of 2.4 kilometres and in the time of twelve minutes the troop had to gallop part of the course, jump a hurdle, gallop another 275 metres to the first firing position of 275 metres range, engage in fire action, gallop around once again, jump the hurdle, gallop to the second fire position at 365 metres and engage in fire action.

After the completion of the second fire action two lines of prone dummies were engaged by sword action.

A WEEK IN TAMBELLUP

A reflection by Hannah Hull

During camp week, I had the opportunity to reconnect with my roots by travelling up to spend a week in the small town of Tambellup where I grew up. I stayed for five days and four nights at my aunt and uncle's house, living independently away from home. Throughout the week, I had three different work experience placements around town, which gave me a look into the work behind the services in rural and regional communities. It helped me to reflect on the impact these services had on me growing up and what kinds of career opportunities I might like to pursue in administration.

DAY ONE: Books, Bunnies and Business Cards

I spent Day One working behind the desk of the Tambellup CRC, or Community Resource Centre. This is a hub that many remote towns have that provides a public library, talks and workshops, school holiday activities and access to technology such as computers, laminators and printers. The CRC also helps to arrange and host a variety of community events.

I kicked off my first day in the library with Melissa, where I learnt just how complicated a library can be! It turned out to be more than just scanning a barcode; it involved reshelving returned books, setting aside books to be exchanged with other libraries, removing older books to be given out for free or sold, and registering new books with the State Library. There were so many different categories that books were put into, from large print adult novels to junior non-fiction, and there were also new audiobooks and DVDs to sort out. It certainly took some time! But it was an enjoyable experience that

made me feel ever grateful for the hard work that goes into providing the people of the community with an amazing selection of books.

My next job for that day was designing the Easter window display, a welcoming and colourful array of egg decorations, paper bunnies and adorable rabbit and Easter-themed picture books. Once we'd taken down what was left of the Australia Day display, I designed the vibrant 'Happy Easter' banner on Canva while Melissa braved a huge spider to track down the box of decorations! From there, we created a truly wonderful display filled with colour and books following the adventures of Bluey, Peter Rabbit, Spot the puppy, a young platypus, a greedy hare and a very exhausted and overworked Easter Bunny during Easter time. I hope that the kids enjoy reading them!

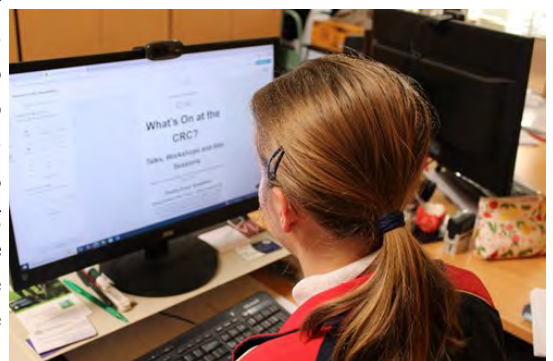
After lunch, I spent the second half of the day working on the computers with Grace. Returning to Canva, I was put in charge of designing two posters to promote upcoming community events. One was for a pickleball "come and try" evening for all ages supported by Tennis West, and the other was for a school holiday movie session (with free popcorn!). I worked hard to make both posters as attractive as I could to appeal to the target audiences, before trying to fit between the window and the noticeboards to pin them up! One thing's for sure; the kids of Tambellup will have some fun things to do during the holidays. Then, to finish off the day, we laminated some pre-made business cards for a lady's local catering service. Laminating was the easy part; cutting around the cards to a reasonable size

was a more difficult task. But we made it!

Overall, I found the day a valuable insight into how libraries work and how community events and services are promoted, and I thank Melissa and Grace for the guidance and support they gave me during my first day in a proper working environment.

DAY TWO: Tales from the \$2 Coin

Day Two was my second and final day at the CRC. That day, TAFE was running a workshop on working safely in high spaces, so the library and meeting areas were out of bounds, and I spent most of my time in the offices. My first job was coming up with some ideas on activities that the CRC could run for primary school-aged children during the April holidays, as so far, the only thing planned was the movie afternoon. I came up with two sessions of baking known as "Junior Chef Club", where kids from Kindy to Year Six could learn how to bake a cake in one and biscuits in the other for them to take home. Cooking and baking are always popular activities in Tambellup! I designed posters for the two events, as well as using Woolworths to calculate the prices of baking ingredients to form a budget. Working on this helped me learn the importance of budget-setting and how to calculate a reasonable budget, which are valuable skills for any sponsored event.





Next, I created a poster advertising the changed meeting days of the Tambellup Community Craft Group, which became the spark of another exciting project:

an introduction to Mailchimp. This complex platform allows businesses to create emails such as newsletters to send to their subscribed customers, and I had the opportunity to play around and draft the March newsletter, including information about upcoming talks and workshops, school holiday activities and monthly/regular activities, events, meetings and get-togethers. Learning how to use an unfamiliar platform expanded my digital skills and taught me about promoting events to different audiences and how to do so in an engaging way. I then printed off my Craft Group poster and switched it around with the TAFE ones on the noticeboard, another squeeze past the window.

Around lunchtime, I went over with Grace to the Tambellup 124 General Store to pick up lunch for those attending the TAFE workshop. We took an array of sandwiches and sausage rolls back to the kitchen, before organising plates and sauce. This gave me an insight into the world of catering and the work that goes into providing food at events. After I had my own lunch, I reprinted the roster for the monthly Seniors Lunch volunteers and then took on a more financial-based role, working behind the till. There, I learned about the concepts of float and deposit, and the importance of giving back the right amount of change. A troublesome extra \$2 coin was soon caught out and found a new home in the donations box. Then, to correctly distribute the float, we had to make a trip to the bank to turn a \$50 note into two \$20 and one \$10 note, a fascinating

procedure that I thought until that moment only happened in Monopoly! By then, we had the right amount of float and were able to take what was left over back to the bank. I would like to thank Mercedeez from Tambellup Bendigo Bank for being so patient with us!

To finish off the day, I took some photos of my work and patiently persisted with the transfer of the photos from the SD card to my account. Overall, the day was a valuable insight into the events the CRC runs, how they run them and how they promote them, and what really goes on with the money given to the counter; much more complicated to sort out than it seems! I would like to thank Grace and Melissa for having me at the Tambellup CRC and being such welcoming and supportive people to work with. I wish them all the best for the school holiday program and the upcoming talks and workshops, and I look forward to helping them again soon.

DAY THREE: A Very Cloudy Classroom

For Day Three, I went back to school. And when I say that I mean Tambellup Primary School, where I spent the day helping in some of the classrooms! Going back to the place where I grew from Kindy to Year Six was a heartfelt experience, especially since I felt like I was still a learner, in that I was learning about the work that goes into early childhood and primary education. There were both teachers I'd known before and some new faces, but everyone was so supportive and welcoming, and I thank them for their guidance during their busy day.

I started the day off in the Pre-Primary class with Mrs. Gillies, Miss Coyne and Mrs. Green. The class consisted of just seven students, but they were all enthusiastic and curious young learners who looked forward to a day of exciting activities. While

Mrs. Green took them for some early morning literacy activities, Mrs. Gillies and I set up a circuit of three different activities to help support fine motor skills, number skills and social skills such as taking turns. It was great to see how the activities incorporated elements of play to help engage the students and make learning these essential skills fun and easy. With finger hopscotch, building LEGO cities, creating spinning top art and card games such as Memory and Snap all part of the circuit, there were plenty of smiles and commendations as the students successfully completed their activities. Just before recess, we taught the class a song to learn the days of the week – and I think we can all agree that the giant ladybird eating a tiny pizza in the music video is NOT a day of the week!

After recess, it was a time for a crafty delve into the class's science unit on weather, with a focus on clouds. Did you know that there are NINE different types of clouds?! When they are thin, it is sunny, and when they are thick, it will rain soon. Speaking of which, the class used collected condensation from an earlier lesson to model rain, while also learning simple experiment safety through the correct use of a pipette and the careful creation of shaving cream clouds. They then created clouds on paper using cotton buds, glue and glitter, then on another sheet of white paper, drew a cloud with white crayon and sprayed on blue ink to see their creation!



Their awe at the “magic trick” involving the “invisible cloud” was wonderful to see. After science, it was time to move on to HASS, where the class learned about our state Western Australia, building on their understanding of where in the world they live. They learnt about the “treasure hunting town” of Kalgoorlie, how Shark Bay got its name and how Tambellup is not far away from the big Stirling Range mountains! After playing “Pin Tambellup on WA”, a hilarious party game, they each drew something from WA that they had learnt about. Finally, just before lunch, the class watched a cartoon about how to tell the time as part of their Maths unit into time, then tried to independently sing the days of the week song. Being with the Pre-Primaries helped me learn about the structure of early childhood education and how activities support a wide range of learning for some of our youngest students.

After having a look around at lunch to see the new swings, I spent the rest of the day in an older class with relief teacher Mrs. Slater. The class consisted of Year Threes, Fours, Fives and Sixes, all together in the one room, a class of about ten students. This meant that learning had to be tailored to be understandable and relevant to all four of the year levels. The class was learning all about formal and informal language, and how we use each in different situations in both a written and spoken format, depending on who we’re speaking to and why. To show their understanding, the class got into partnerships to perform roleplays given to them on a card, and the rest of the class had to work out, based on the interactions, whether the situation was formal or informal. I went with one of the students and together we performed a scene where a person was buying food from a shop; we communicated in a formal manner to show the importance of manners and

etiquette in a shop setting and when interacting with unfamiliar people. The other roleplays involved talking to friends, teachers and grandparents, each showing how our language changes based on the circumstances of the conversation. To finish off the day, the class played silent ball in the classroom, and we could not express strongly enough the concept of “silent”; laughing is NOT silent! But everyone clearly had fun, especially after an exhausting day of NAPLAN testing. It was early close, so the bell rang at 2:30pm and everyone went home feeling satisfied and having learnt something new... including me!

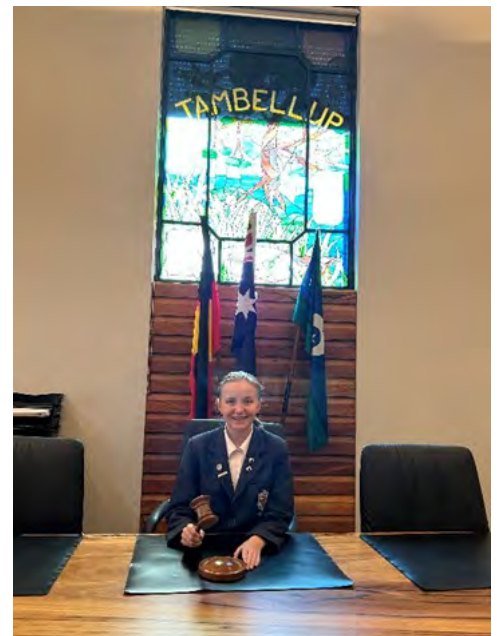
Overall, the day was a window into primary school education and how teachers structure learning and activities to cater to the needs of students. It helped me better understand how early childhood lays down the foundations for later learning, and how classes with multiple year levels can thrive with the right approach. I would like to thank Mrs. Gillies, Mrs. Green and Miss Coyne for guiding me in the Pre-Primary class and Mrs. Slater for guiding me in the Year 3-6 class. I couldn’t wait to return to the school I knew and loved on Friday.

DAY FOUR: Order in the Cupboard!

Day Four was my only day spent at the Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup. They are the government council for the towns of Tambellup and Broomehill, and during the day I learnt just how many services they provide, from registering a cat or dog to distributing numberplates. However, my day spent at the Shire was mostly helping with background and behind-the-scenes tasks – small jobs that there often isn’t much time to do. Fortunately, with an extra set of hands available, this gave the staff the time they needed to help people throughout the day.

Before the workday began, I was

given a tour of the building, where I got to see the court-style meeting room and beautiful stained-glass window. I then helped to raise the flags outside the building, before the adventure really began. I started off by removing the binders from old past meeting documents, before organising them in boxes in order of size to be kept for future agendas. This led me into organising the entire cupboards, putting stationary and filing in a tidy manner so that we could clearly see what we had plenty on and what we needed to buy more of. This included assessing every pen and sorting them into colours, tracking down the lost staplers and trying to get paperclips off strong magnets! But after some solid time bent down in front of the cupboards, they were all spotless and we knew where everything was! It was then time for more organisation, where I spent time organising the pamphlets, brochures, booklets and fridge magnets/merch on the waiting room desk. There was information on everything from fire safety and fighting weeds to tourism and driving advice. I took information from DFES about creating a fire action plan – including two fridge magnets – and an Act Belong Commit journal. It reminded me of just how vast the issues that the local government cover are.



I then went with Jo on a quick walk down to the post office to collect the council's mail, where I was introduced to an adorable little dachshund. Afterwards, we walked over to the general store to buy some more milk for the kitchen. Upon returning to the Shire hall, we went to the "dungeon", or the file storage hall, to place some documents that we would sort out later in the day. Upon returning, I had to sort out some envelopes, placing stickers on the front and stamping the back. While doing this, we listened to the radio, where a blend of old and new favourites kept us entertained; between the Backstreet Boys and the Saja Boys, there was something for everyone. I then had to do some more stamping in their deposit books; the whole experience made me appreciate stamps more than I ever had before. Before I knew it, it was time for lunch, where I sat and ate in the dining room and found out that a council member was once a music teacher at Great Southern Grammar! Her son was one of the first students to pass through from Kindy all the way to Year Twelve. We really do live in such a small world!

After lunch, I went into the room with the numberplates for a stock count, where I checked how many numberplates were left since the last count in October last year. There were only two Tambellup numberplates left for general vehicles! Then I helped top up on



food in the dining room, which was a much messier task than expected! Chocolate chip cookies crumbled to pieces, cocoa beans spilled everywhere, and the Milo had gone rock solid and we couldn't get it out of the tin! But at least we had the milk now; that was all that mattered.

And finally, to finish off the day, we returned to the "dungeon" and sorted our files into the vast shelves of labelled folders. Seeing the system that was used to organise information on paper was fascinating. Finally, to finish off the day, we took down the flags, braving some cold and wintry weather.



Overall, it was a day of simple jobs, but I knew that those jobs made a huge difference. I learnt about local government organisation and how they manage files and information, and all the work that goes on behind the scenes to keep Tambellup running smoothly. I would like to thank Jo, Pam, Sophie, Karen and everyone else from the Shire for having me and being such supportive people to work with. I look forward to working there again soon.

DAY FIVE: Class Dismissed... For Tennis!

My fifth and final day at Tambellup was another day spent at the primary school. For the morning until recess, I returned to the

Pre-Primary class, who had Mrs. Slater as a relief teacher for the day. They started off with some exercise activities, running some laps of the courts and doing some fitness activities in the classroom. Then it was time for their first handwriting lesson, where they learnt how to correctly write both lowercase 'a' and capital 'A'. Following this, they sat down and watched two stories being read to them, both about a girl named Carla who liked to be unique and do things differently to everyone else, teaching the class about how everyone is different and our differences are what make us who we are. Then they did some phonemic awareness activities, manipulating words and breaking them into sounds and syllables. After a fun brain break, they learnt about final phonemes, or the last sounds in words. They sang a fun song and then cut out and glued pictures into different 'scrapbooks' based on the last sound in each picture. The time had flown, and it was time for recess. It was my last time in the pre-primary class, so I bid our little learners farewell, confident that they had enjoyed their time with me in the classroom.

After recess, I was welcomed into Miss McPartland's Year One and Two class. Upon arriving, I was captivated to discover that a student in the class was wearing a shirt with my name on it! It was wonderful to see that my mark had been left on the school, even after three years away. The first thing the class did was watch the animated storybook version of The Gruffalo to support their learning into visualisation; up until that moment, they hadn't actually seen a picture of the Gruffalo and had to draw him



based on the description of him in the story. Some of the drawings were very accurate...and scary! Then the class went outside to practice their item for their assembly: a performance of Possum Magic set in Tambellup! Everyone played their characters so well, and the narrators did a wonderful job of reading the story. After coming back inside, I read the students a few chapters from their class novel, *The Twits* by Roald Dahl.

Then the class moved onto Maths, where we played a game where we had to count to 100 using only even numbers. I was even one of the winners! Then the class split into groups for their Maths rotations. I went out in the corridor with one group and together we placed all the even numbers on a number line, learning to count forwards and backwards in even numbers. To finish off my time in the class, I went through their end-of-day routine with them and awarded Dojo Points to students who did the routine correctly.

During lunch, after a brief discussion into the newest kids' movie at the cinema, *GOAT*, which was comedically about a goat playing basketball, I found out that the school runs whole-school Phys Ed after lunch on a Friday. Mrs. Slater and I had been put in charge of it that week, so we took some items out of the very tidy sports shed to make five activity rotations: tennis drills, skipping with ropes, a ring toss game, spikeball and a basketball throw game. I was put in charge of the tennis group, where I taught younger students fundamental racquet skills and aided older students in being encouraging role models to their younger buddies. We practised bouncing a ball on a racquet, balancing it on a racquet, hitting it against the wall, rallying and serving. It was important to make sure everyone was included and could progress at their own pace. At the end of the hour, everyone helped to pack up and the principal, Mrs. Eley, commended everyone on their effort in school that week. We finished off the day with a hilarious game of Chinese Whispers, before dismissing all twenty-eight students.

Overall, the day was a look into a variety of levels of primary school education and helped me understand the ways that teachers make learning fun for younger students. It also showed me ways that the whole school can come together in a positive environment and how, what it lacks in size, it makes up for in its values. I would like to thank Miss McPartland, Mrs. Slater, Mrs. Gillies, Mrs. Green, Mrs. Pike, Miss Coyne, Mrs. Norris, Mrs. Eley, Chaplain Greg and the rest of the staff at Tambellup Primary School for having me and being such a welcoming group of people to work with, considering I was twelve years old the last time a lot of them saw me!

Update from the committee

2025 wrapped up on a high with another successful harvest, lupin auction, and a fantastic Christmas party, thank you to everyone who contributed. We auctioned 525 tonnes of lupins (2.1 t/ha) at an average of \$418/t, generating a total of \$219,450, an excellent result. V&V Walsh also won the adjustment auction and have since run 840 wether lambs on the lupin stubble over summer, with any profits to be returned to the Community Crop. We sincerely thank them for their generous support, along with all those who assisted with checking the sheep over the summer months.

On 17 April 2026, we held our AGM, which saw a fantastic turnout. Members reflected on the year gone by and began planning for the year ahead. We also celebrated the soon-to-be-launched caravan park and committed to contributing \$10,000 annually towards the Tambellup St John - Sub Centre, allocating \$5,000 for ongoing maintenance and \$5,000 into a reserve fund for future replacement. This initiative aims to ensure our community is not placed under pressure or at risk of losing this essential service.

We also welcomed "the Dans"—Daniel Nazzari and Daniel Willmott to the committee, and farewelled Stuart Witham and Rhys Brown, thanking them for their time, dedication, and valuable contributions over the years.
