## BUDGET

Council adopted the 2018-2019 Annual Budget at a Special Meeting held on 26<sup>th</sup> July 2018.

Local Government continues to operate in a financially challenging environment, with increased pressure from Federal and State Government to deliver more with limited resources. The Shire is the custodian of a large number of assets made up from Infrastructure (roads, footpaths, kerbing, signs) Drainage, Land, Buildings, Parks and Reserves and Plant and Equipment. When making decisions in relation to these assets, the Council is committed to the philosophy of renewal of existing assets before acquiring new assets. In addition, and only where possible, rationalising existing assets that are no longer used or do not meet the agreed level of services.

The Budget has at its foundation the aspirations of the Council and Community, providing details on specific capital projects that will be undertaken during the year as well as funding the ongoing services the Shire provides.

Council identified in its Long term Financial Plan that an increase in rate revenue of at least 5% per annum was necessary in order to continue to meet its obligations for provision of services to the community, maintenance of existing assets and creation of new assets. After lengthy discussion and review of competing priorities and demands, the Council has included a 4% increase in rate revenue from all UV (rural) and GRV (townsite) properties. This generates additional revenue of \$96,500.

Modest increases in rate revenue are necessary each year to ensure the Council is in a position to continue to provide the range of services and facilities the community has come to expect and enjoy.

The early payment discount of 5% will continue to be offered, as will payment by either the two instalment or four instalment plans.

There has been no increases in refuse and recycling charges levied annually on townsite properties. Refuse and recycling charges have remained at the same level since 2011.

## **Budget Highlights**

## Great Southern Housing Initiative

Council is participating in the Great Southern Housing Initiative. This project consists of development of Aged Appropriate Housing as well as Key Worker accommodation across seven Local Governments in the Great Southern Region.

The Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup has been successful in securing \$10,000,000 funding through the Building Better Regions Fund (BBRF), and the Shire of Kojonup has secured \$2,600,000 through the Regional Aged Accommodation Program (RAAP). This funding will see construction of some 79 housing units for independent seniors and regional employees across the seven Local Governments involved in the Initiative. Additional funding required will be provided by the participating Local Governments.

For Broomehill-Tambellup this exciting project will deliver four Aged Appropriate dwellings in Broomehill, two chalets at the Broomehill Caravan Park as well as two key worker dwellings in Broomehill and one in Tambellup.

The decision on the RAAP has only recently been made (June 30), and funding agreement documents are currently being executed, so final figures are yet to be determined.

The Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup's contribution is funded by monies already held in the Building Reserve and sale of existing older housing stock which results in a minimal impact on the Shire's budget. Notwithstanding this, a short term loan may be required as sale of existing housing stock may take several years.

## Road Construction

A road construction program of \$1,877,500 is planned for the coming year. Council is fortunate to receive funding from the Regional Road Group and Roads to Recovery program, which assists in meeting the costs in completing the planned projects. Regional Road Group funding is allocated on the basis that 2/3 in funding is provided by Main Roads WA and Councils are required to contribute 1/3. Roads to Recovery funding does not require a matching contribution.

The current Roads to Recovery program ends 30 June 2019 and while the Federal Government have assured continuation of this funding, the amounts allocated to the Roads to Recovery program beyond the end of the financial year are not yet known.

Upgrade of footpaths in the Broomehill and Tambellup townsites will commence during the year, and will continue in stages over the coming 4-5 years.

#### Plant Replacement

Council continues to strive to maintain a modern fleet of vehicles and equipment. To assist with attaining this objective, a 10 Year Plant Replacement Program has been developed and refined over a number of years. Optimum changeover times have been identified for plant and equipment, ensuring Council receives best value for money and to minimise the impact on annual budgets.

Funds are held in the Plant Reserve which is used to achieve all changeovers and purchases included in the Plant Replacement Program. Any savings realised throughout the year on plant and equipment changeovers is retained in the Reserve for future requirements.

Major items scheduled for changeover in 18/19 include the Isuzu truck TA017, Isuzu truck TA386, Caterpillar tyred roller BH005, 2 Toro mowers, John Deere Gator and the light fleet. A service hoist and an oil supply/disposal system and storage will be installed in the workshop at the Tambellup Depot

## Transfer Stations

The community has raised on numerous occasions the difficulties in disposing of rubbish from 240 Wheelie Bins into the skip bins at the transfer stations. Council has made an allocation of \$20,000 to purchase and install bin lifters at both the Broomehill and Tambellup transfer stations.

#### Parks, Gardens and Reserves

\$55,000 has been included to improve the drainage at the junior playground in Diprose Park which floods during periods of heavy rain, and install shade over this area. This project was deferred in 2017/18 and will be complete this year.

A request was received from the community for Council to consider an extension to the surface of the basketball court in Crawford Street to make this a full sized court, and improve the lighting for night use. This will enable this facility to be better utilised. Grant funding will be sought to assist with completion of this project.

The community has expressed interest in developing 'community gardens' in Broomehill and Tambellup. Council has allocated funding to assist the community groups get established, with in kind works and materials.

## Tambellup Caravan Park

Council purchased the former bowling club in Tambellup in 17/18, and has set aside \$10,000 to investigate development of this land into a Caravan Park.


## Holland Track

In recognising the importance of encouraging visitors to our Shire, the Council has allocated \$20,000 towards design of a 'Holland Track Interpretive Centre' and bring together other existing tourism plans for the Shire.

## Topics

### FROM THE JULY COUNCIL MEETING

Council and staff held a budget workshop on 19<sup>th</sup> July 2018 to go through the draft budget and make amendments prior to adoption. The workshop provided an opportunity for all Councillors to gain an understanding of the content of the document and how funding is allocated to the various programs and activities, and discussion about priorities for the coming year.

Following the workshop, Council held its Ordinary Meeting. The following matters were discussed:

- Council considered and endorsed an amendment to its policy that deals with the appointment of an Acting Chief Executive Officer during periods where the Chief Executive Officer is absent for five days or more.
- Council considered and endorsed an amendment to its policy that deals with the use of Shire equipment by community organisations and Council staff.
- Council received the annual report on progress towards the outcomes of the Disability Action and Inclusion Plan. This report is submitted to the Disability Services Commission to inform their Annual Report.
- Council received the Shire's reviewed Workforce Plan, which outlines the resourcing required to deliver the outcomes of the Community Strategic Plan over the next four years.

### TOWNSCAPING

Shire staff have recently planted grass trees in the garden nibs on Crowden St. These were supplied by Fremantle business Replants.com who 'rescue' grass trees from development sites where bushland is being cleared for residential and commercial development.

While these, and the others planted at the Pavilion and St John Ambulance Sub Centre are settling in, and to give them their best chance at surviving the transplant, they should remain undisturbed. **Please don't break the leaves off – these are vital for the plants ongoing health.** 





#### WORKS

The strong winds we have experienced over recent weeks have kept the maintenance crew busy, with trees and branches requiring removal from roads across the Shire. This has tied in well with the roadside pruning that is underway at the moment, mainly in the Broomehill area. Other routine tasks at this time of the year include pot hole repair and patching, and maintenance of road signage and guideposts. Staff have also installed a new drainage sump at the corner of Norrish and Crowden St, and concrete steps to the oval in Tambellup.

With all funded road construction jobs completed at the end of the financial year, the construction crew has been focussed on grading of bitumen edges, with Broomehill-Kojonup Road, Flat Rocks Road, Fairfield Road, North Greenhills Road and Tieline Roads completed to date.

A machinery demonstration day was held at the Tambellup Depot on the 10<sup>th</sup> July. This was well attended by works staff from neighbouring Councils and provided dealers an opportunity to showcase new and improved technology on the various items of plant utilised by Councils.

The Parks and Gardens crew has had their hands full with weed control, oval maintenance, mowing in the townsites, and repairs and maintenance to reticulation systems in both towns. Some landscaping work has commenced at the Broomehill Complex, and in consultation with the Complex Committee, will be ongoing. Planting of the garden beds adjacent to the Broomehill Hall has commenced and street tree pruning has been ongoing. Dam levels are slowly increasing, with Broomehill Town Dam at 50% capacity, Tambellup West Dam (No 2) at 90% and Jam Creek Dam at 30%. We look forward to more rain in coming months boosting these levels to sustain our ovals through the summer.

In line with the new financial year and budget requirements, work has started on gathering prices and information for items listed in the Ten Year Plant Replacement Program. Submissions for the next round of funded road construction projects have been compiled and forwarded to the Regional Roads Group for consideration for the 2019/2020 year.

## SNAP SEND SOLVE

The Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup is trialling the 'Snap Send Solve' app, which is a free app that easily allows you to report issues to the relevant authority – in this case, the Shire. When downloaded to your mobile device, it allows you to take a photo of the problem, make notes, add contact details, record the exact location, and then send – this generates an email which is sent to the Shire for actioning.

We have had a couple of instances in recent weeks after strong winds where residents have used the system to advise of fallen trees. The benefit of this system is that the ability to provide a photo of the issue allows the Shire to determine the best course of action without necessarily having to go out and inspect first – for example, does the tree require a chainsaw or a loader to remove from the road? This in turn saves time and resources.

The Shire is keen to trial this system and we encourage residents to download the app through either the App Store or Google Play. # Tambellup CRC Roundup



# VISITING AUTHOR IN AUGUST





As of the 1<sup>st</sup> of August, as a result of a joint review between the State Library of Western Australia and representatives from the Public Libraries WA Group (PLWA), what can be requested via the Public Libraries Inter Library Loans will be changed.


Due to these restrictions, the following items cannot be requested on Inter-library loan:


- No items less than twelve months old both fiction and non-fiction
- No junior fiction or YA items some exceptions for YA graphic novels over 12 months old
- No Audio books or DVDs

There are exceptions for people with special needs including disabilities and culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds (CALD).

A frequently asked questions sheet is available at the library or online. Impacts of the changes will be reviewed over the next 12 months. Albany Public Library will endeavour to adjust our purchasing to anticipate items of need where possible.

# ADVANCE NOTICE – ROAD CLOSURE BROOMEHILL-KOJONUP ROAD

Main Roads will commence replacing the Wadjekanup River Bridge from 16 July 2018. The bridge is located approximately 13 km west of Broomehill on Broomehill – Kojonup Road. Works are expected to be completed by end September 2018.

Broomehill – Kojonup road will be **closed** to all heavy vehicles for the duration of the works and road users should consider alternative routes.

Access will be maintained for local traffic however, the road will be closed between Simpson Road and Holly Siding Road and again, alternative routes should be considered.

Western Power is investing \$1.1 million in the Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup to upgrade power supply in the area. Crews will replace 26 poles and 8.9km of overhead power lines over the next 8 weeks. During this time you may notice an increase in heavy vehicles in the area and a crew member will contact you if we need to access your property.

# Timing

This work will begin in August and the whole project will continue until April 2019 with work beginning west of the railway line in the town of Tambellup. From time to time our access to the network, adverse weather and emergencies may impact our work schedules.

# Power Outages

Our number one priority is to keep the community and our crews safe. When it's not safe to work on live lines we will need to interrupt your power supply but we will let you know ahead of time. Due to the nature of the work required, some customers may experience multiple planned power interruptions. It's our goal to get the job done quickly, safely and with the least impact to you.

During August there will be 9 power outages required to carry out this essential work to upgrade your power supply. Affected locations include:

- 1 August Pole replacements on Tambellup West Road
- 14 August Pole replacements on Tambellup West Road
- 15 August Pole replacements and overhead line replacements on Taylor & George St
- · 21 August Overhead line replacements on Garrity St
- · 22 & 23 August Pole replacements on Taylor & Henry St customers will be affected both days
- · 24 August Overhead line replacements on Parnell St
- · 29 August Overhead line replacements on Tambellup West Road
- 31 August Overhead line replacements on Henry St

Affected residents and businesses will receive notification of these outages shortly and our crews will do their best to minimise any disruption on the day.

Without a much larger group of committed people who will be very active in







## Free mammograms for TAMBELLUP women

If you are a woman aged 40 or over you can access the FREE screening mammography service in Tambellup. BreastScreen WA's mobile service will be located at Tambellup Shire Hall, Norrish Street from 6/08/2018 to 8/08/2018.

Breast cancer is the most common life threatening cancer for women and one in eight women in Australia will develop breast cancer in their lifetime.

Having a screening mammogram (breast x-ray) every two years significantly increases the chance of a woman surviving breast cancer and reduces the amount of treatment required. More than 75% of breast cancers occur in women over the age of 50. Research shows that screening is most effective for this age group.

BreastScreen WA's Medical Director Dr Elizabeth Wylie, said screening mammography was the most effective method for early detection of breast cancer.

"Screening every two years is vitally important to increase the chance of a breast cancer being detected when it is too small to feel or be noticed. Finding a cancer at this early stage often means that the breast cancer is small and more treatable".

"A free screening mammogram is one of the best things that women can do to look after their health. Breast screening saves lives and only takes 20 minutes," said Dr Wylie.

Screening mammograms may detect 70-90% of breast cancers.

Any woman with a persistent change in a breast should see her doctor immediately.

The mobile service will then be moving to Gnowangerup and Lake Grace.

BreastScreen WA encourages women to make an informed decision about having a mammogram. For more information please visit the BreastScreen WA website www.breastscreen.health.wa.gov.au

## **CHIMNEY AND FLUE FIRES**

You may be thinking about organising your flu shot, but are your chimneys and flues ready for winter?

Each winter, fire fighters attend many house fires due to ash, soot and combustion residue that has built up inside chimney flues.

This residue can ignite causing a fire. In most cases you will see flames shooting out of the top of the chimney!



To make sure your chimneys are ready, we recommend you:

Check the heater, fire place brickwork, chimney and flue *before* lighting your first fire of the year to make sure it is clean.

☑ Look at purchasing some additives you can put in your fire while its burning that can help reduce residue build up (check out your local hardware store).

☑ If your fireplace chimney is brick, check that the surrounding brickwork has not cracked. This can reduce the chance of a fire creeping through the course in back wall.

Ensure that your wood heaters are installed and maintained by a qualified operator.

☑ House fires can cause extensive property loss and damage. Most of these are accidental and preventable – so take action now to minimise your risk.

To the Editor

I am in need of help from your readers. I have emailed you because I am told that the area of Tunney falls within several shire boundaries.

My story is.....

My Great Great Grandmother Elizabeth Hutton Nee Churchill remarried after her husband's death. She married Thomas Norton. In 1871 they had a son Samuel John Norton.

According to family stories, in about 1880 Thomas Norton was travelling with Samuel near Kojonup. They stopped to camp by a stream for the night at a place called "Tunney". The people who lived there (their name not recorded) asked young Samuel up to their house for the night to play with their children. Thomas Norton agreed but said that if Samuel wasn't back at camp by a certain time in the morning he would leave without him. When Samuel arrived early the next morning his father had left without him. The family he had spent the night with raised him with their own children.

According to family notes, Elizabeth was inconsolable when Thomas returned without Samuel. He refused to collect Samuel and they separated. Elizabeth's son from her first marriage Thomas Giles Hutton located Samuel and they stayed in contact. Thomas Giles Hutton visited Samuel when he was in hospital just prior to his death. Samuel Norton never married. Samuel died in the Kojonup District Hospital on the 22 July 1932. In the West Australian paper dated 30 July 1932 his death as recorded:

I have tried to find out where Samuel was buried and the name of the wonderful family who took him in without success. I have written to your paper in the hope that among your readers maybe there is someone who can tell me more about where Samuel now rests and about the kind family who took him.

#### MAKING SENSE

Part 3

by "Fossil"

Two features are apparent when we look at the current landform of Broomehill-Tambellup. The immense age of the Yilgarnia Base can be seen clearly in the uplifted sedimentary layers of our nearby Stirling Ranges. At the top of Mt Toolbrunup a measurement of 2,800 million years is surpassed only by the Shields northern boundary in the Pilbara.

A recent European based expedition identified what is believed to be a giant jellyfish type creature in the upper sediment and a solitary fish fossil has also been found lower down - both on Toolbrunup. This in turn leads to our second overriding feature - water.

But was it seawater or freshwater? Wisdom would suggest the latter.

The Yilgarn Shield is believed to be one of only five continental cores making up the earth's crust - the building blocks. Once substantially deeper than we see today, their sediments eroded and added to their margins - in our case the Bremer Basin and the prime mover for Broomehill-Tambellup - the ancient Coblimine River or (Paleo Channels).

A recent WA Government departmental paper shows the Coblimine as terminating roughly halfway between Broomehill-Tambellup at Peringillup, and after this its course is uncertain. No doubt the progressive uplift of the Stirling Ranges at some stage became a factor in the river's course into Gondwanaland. The term progressive is used because it seems likely the Stirling's - Moonies Hills - Flat Rocks uplift may not have been a singular event, and this in turn influenced the drainage course, perhaps even over several millions of years. Quite unlike the present Gordon-Frankland to Nornalup drainage pattern.

In 2015 the Department of Water announced the discovery of an ancient Paleo Channel of fresh water flowing into Torbay - in places up to 3km wide and 25kms long with a spur heading toward the western end of the Porongurups at Mt Barker.

Some eight kms north of Mt Barker, and close to Albany Highway, a swamp can be seen at high elevation - further through Kendenup and Lake Matilda and northward a similar swamp near Grahams Well at Flat Rocks - just maybe the Coblimine did flow into the Kalgan-Torbay system. King Georges Sound suggests a very large volume of water was once flowing.

Our previous "part 2" spoke of Madjenapurdap Lagoons close to Tambellup townsite and heading toward Toolbrunup and Camel Lake in a south easterly direction. Was this a consequence of the Stirling Moonies Hill uplift? To this writer, the sequence makes sense.

Also it would seem making sense is the large volume of sediment, mainly silica sand, coming against the uplift to the south and west, being trapped between Peringillup and Cranbrook and eventually being deposited by prevailing winds, with the present day Gordon River at precisely the westing margin.

Remarkable is the only word to describe the fact that hardly a barrow load of sand is to be found on the western side of our Gordon River - there are minor exceptions where water has cut a new course. It would seem that though flowing in most years it is really a series of separated pools - odd ones up to a mile long and up to 4 metres deep.

Prior to mid 1940's, most pools were fresh and right up to 1947 marron, fresh water perch and gilgie were caught at Kylobunup close to Tambellup. The river pools are undoubtably being fed from near surface fresh and saline streams which, together with seasonal rainfall runoff, maintain reasonable pool levels. Currently at approximately 1600m<sup>5</sup>/m which is consistent with many farm saline relief bores. Some Landcare bores which have been flowing under siphon for the past 18 years are showing signs of becoming fresher - in one case from 1400m<sup>5</sup>/m down to 800m<sup>5</sup>/m - the message from this evidence being we should be attempting to keep the pools flowing. With technology advancing are such a rapid rate in early 2000' our river pools and substantial near surface saline resources could yet prove a very important boost to farm viability.

Ironic in the sense that a little over 100 years ago Tambellup's enigmatic surveyor engineer, James Crawford, told the visiting Premier of Western Australia, that the district had the potential for it to be a "Garden of Eden" because of the freshwater river - doubtless he thought Broomehill and its Twonkawillup pool likewise.

Realistically though, for a moment, what are the chances of our river becoming fresh water again - or for the need to be so? You may recall that earlier in this series we were talking about mother earth having the ability to adapt and recover an in this segment the sedimentary layers exposed on Mt Toolbrunup with its jellyfish like fossil and its fish. Well, just for the record, buried in archives is a record of a core sample taken from the Gordon River near the old Tambellup West bridge - successive layers of fresh and saline sediments - "been there before" - "Making Sense".
