

  - chronic respiratory conditions
  - chronic illnesses that required regular medical attention or hospitalisation in the previous year

  - impaired immunity
  - Children aged 6 months to 10 years receiving long-term aspirin therapy.

#### FROM THE MAY COUNCIL MEETING

Council welcomed the Wirrpanda Foundation to the May meeting, with David Wirrpanda, Troy Cook and Robbie Miniter conducting a Cultural Awareness Workshop for Councillors and staff. The workshop provided a greater insight into Aboriginal culture and history, and the impacts on past and present generations. While confronting at times, it is the conversation that everyone should have, and we thank David, Troy and Robbie for their time.

Council received the minutes from two meetings of the Bush Fire Advisory Committee (BFAC) and endorsed the appointments of key brigade personnel for the 2018-2019 fire season:

Council also endorsed the recommendation from the BFAC that when landowners with land holdings spanning across a brigade boundary intend to burn, a permit should be obtained from each of the relevant Fire Control Officers prior to commencing burning. It is anticipated that this measure will result in improved communications between brigades and landowners.

Council accepted the Interim Audit report as provided by Lincolns Accountants. The interim audit, which was completed in March, is undertaken prior to the end of the financial year to assess internal systems, controls and procedures which ensure the integrity of the Shire's data and confirm reliance on the financial reports.

Council endorsed the draft 'Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup Fire Break Order and Information Booklet 2018-2019'. This booklet will be distributed to all residents by mail in July.

### PENSIONER RATES REBATES

All pensioners are reminded that in order to claim the Pensioner Rebate in 2017/2018 the amount due on your rate notice needs to be paid (in full) before 30 June, 2018. We will require a copy of your pension card.

#### WORKS

While the farming community (and Shire dams) were keen for some rain, the near-perfect conditions during May allowed for the construction program for 2017-2018 to be largely completed. Works included sealing on Warrenup Rd, sealing of patches on Tambellup West Rd, sealing on Broomehill-Kojonup Rd and Gnowangerup-Tambellup Rd, and concreting of the washdown bay at the Tambellup depot. The survey and design works at the Nardlah Rd - Broomehill-Gnowangerup Road intersection have been completed and construction started late in May. At the Tambellup West Rd – Warrenup Rd intersection, construction to improve sight lines has commenced.

With most of the works crew being onsite on the construction projects, maintenance grading during the month was limited, however the following roads were graded: Birt Rd, Hassell Rd, Burridge Rd, Aylmore Rd, Witham Rd, Nazzari Rd. The maintenance crew also responded to numerous reports of trees falling across roads, as well carrying out pot hole patching, sign and guidepost maintenance and assisted with tree pruning in the townsites.

The parks and gardens team has taken advantage of the mild conditions to complete some tree pruning, as well as scheduled oval maintenance, repairs to reticulation systems and weeding of gardens in both towns.

Landscaping work has started at the Broomehill Complex, following consultation with the Committee. Dam levels are low, which is normal for this time of the year. We have been fortunate in the last couple of years to have received good summer and autumn rains to top them up, but this year? – bring it on, any time now will be great!

It is planned to get a head start on the mosquitos this year, with fogging to be commenced as soon as the rains arrive. Fogging will be conducted between 5pm and 7pm on days when conditions are suitable.

#### WASTE TRANSFER STATION - PRE PAID TIP CARDS

Residents are reminded that the yellow 2017/2018 Waste Transfer Station passes expire on 31 July 2018, and will not be accepted after that date. New passes valid for 2018/2019 will be distributed with rates notices for those residents who do not receive the kerbside rubbish and recycling collections, and prepaid passes will be available to purchase at the Shire Administration offices after 1 July 2018. For more information please contact the Shire.

The purpose of a Waste Transfer Station is to minimise the amount of waste going to landfill, and maximise opportunities for recycling. By sorting your load before you go to the Tip, and making sure your recyclables are clean and uncontaminated, you will be doing your bit to help our environment.



Since the Gnowangerup Pool opened this summer, in October 2017, a group of dedicated swimmers have been enjoying the Shire of Gnowangerup's early morning swimming schedule of meeting at the pool at 6am every Monday, Wednesday and Friday morning, and improving their swimming and enjoying the increased fitness that comes with swimming.



The group has swum hundreds of kilometres over the summer and this culminated in the group heading to Kununurra on May 3rd to compete the 2018 Lake Argyle Swim.

Two teams, named 'Bangers From Gnangers 1 & 2'

competed in and completed the 10km Quad Swim in very respectable times of 3:54hrs and 4:03hrs, both teams finishing in the middle of the pack of the other 40 teams in their division. Some acknowledgment that almost one third of the team was from Tambellup possibly should have been noted in the team names, however with the nominations for the event being filled in around ten minutes there wasn't a lot of time to be creative. Next time....





Lake Argyle is an incredible backdrop for a swim. Its 703km2 surface area holds more than 10,000 gigalitres of water and is home to Australia's largest collection of freshwater crocodiles. There are currently 30-35,000 freshwater crocs in the lake, a fact not lost on some of the swimmers! The water temperature on the day of the swim was 27 degrees, and the air temperature was 37 degrees – absolutely perfect!

The swimmers each took turns swimming 5 minute 'sprints', alongside the boat carrying the other swimmers and a support kayak there to fight off any rogue crocs! With water visibility being less than 1m, it was a little daunting at times, especially when the dam banks were near, and the unseen crocs not far away.



Changeovers were made in the water, with a high five and then the retiring swimmer returned to the boat. All eight swimmers found the swimming relatively easy, despite the waves and water currents of the lake. We were greeted at the finish line with a cool glass of champagne, and then enjoyed an evening at Lake Argyle with a sit-down dinner for 700 people (the Kimberley's largest meal!)



The early morning swimmers would like to extend their gratitude to the Shire of Gnowangerup for allowing the pool to be opened to the public in the early mornings. We certainly could not have prepared for this event otherwise. Thanks also to Andre for all of his help making the pool available to us, and to everyone for their well wishes and support!

The historical association has undergone changes recently with a new committee being sworn in and a bright new future envisaged.



# Reading with Your Little Ones:

Young children are naturally curious and eager to learn new words and ideas. They enjoy silly, nonsense words and rhymes, and acting out stories.

- When you read together, cuddle up with your child on your lap. Remember to look at each other, as well as the book.
- Let your child lead the way. It's OK to skip pages or reread the same story again and again.
- Ask your child to point out things in the pictures. ("Where is the balloon? Can you find the balloon?")
- Ask your child to name things in the pictures and talk about them. (Point to the train and ask, "What is this?" Then ask, "What sound does a train make?")
- Use pictures to teach new words. ("See the trumpet? A trumpet is a loud instrument that makes music." Then pretend to play the trumpet.)
- Use the story to start a conversation. ("Look! The bears are baking cookies. Remember when we baked cookies?")

# **CRC updates** (



**The Future:** From July 2019, the funding allocation for the CRC program across the state will be reduced from \$13 million per annum to \$8 million following a review of all Royalties for Regions funded programs of which the CRC network is one such program. The CRC Service Delivery Proposal (2019-2020) from our single funding body, the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) has been met with mixed reviews from across the CRC network. I doubt that there are any CRC's that are happy with the proposal but, at least, no CRC's will be defunded at this stage so we must look on that as a positive. Under this new proposal, Tambellup would be offered Tier 1 funding which would be in the region of \$70,000.00 per year - previously we received around \$106,000.00 per year from DPIRD. This shortfall in funding will need to be looked at closely by our Management Committee as to how this will impact our services here in Tambellup. This could ultimately result in further reduced hours of opening, loss of staff and a greater reliance, once again, on volunteers - seems to be the catch phrase in rural communities - as if volunteers don't already give so much of their time!!

Under this proposal, CRC's will be expected to be open a minimum 25hrs per week and future focus would be on delivery and facilitation of government, health and/or community information services - CRC's will not be funded to provide social events, even though this has been a part of our delivery in the past. Upskilling of community, technology engagement and online service delivery will be a major focus.

**Now:** Proposed funding offers aside, the CRC is ticking along quite nicely at the moment as we strive to provide the best services that we can. We continue to be contracted by the Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup to provide Library services to the Tambellup community so please pop in and speak to our library officer Sheree Beaton for any library requirements. Beth Schlueter and Alice Gallagher, as acting co-managers of the centre, are doing their best to continue with all other services - printing, publishing, laminating , coordinating workshops /information sessions etc. so come on in and see if we can help you with anything.

#### CRCs ARE THE ANSWER: RUNDLE

Member for Roe Peter Rundle says the Regional Development Minister's plan to pit Community Resources Centres against each other to fight for funding will ultimately fail regional communities.

Mr Rundle's comment comes as last week's State Budget confirmed the Community Resource Network will have 40 per cent of its funding slashed from 1 July 2019.

Labor's proposed two-tier funding model, announced last month, will see some CRCs lose more than half their operational funding, with the Minister preying on those that have said they will no longer be sustainable under new arrangements.

"The Minister is on the record saying CRCs that want to increase funding under the proposed new arrangements could do so at the expense of another centre's allocation," Mr Rundle said.

"She is attempting to divide and conquer individual centres by saying there is room for negotiation but additional funding will only come at the expense of another."

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development will finalise a review of the Network mid-year; a review which did not commence until after funding cuts were outlined. CRCs have until 20 May 2018 to respond to Labor's proposed two-tier funding model.

In Parliament today Mr Rundle referred to the recent discovery that the Wandering CRC had been incorrectly categorised, a mistake that would have seen them given less funding, and asked what the Government would do to ensure there were not more mistakes like this.

"In his response the Premier demonstrated his lack of knowledge on this issue, and continued to demonstrate his disregard for the vital role CRCs play in their communities," Mr Rundle said.

Mr Rundle urged the Minister and her Department to closely consider feedback from centre managers, saying harsh funding cuts to 105 CRCs across WA had left a bitter taste in the mouth of many regional communities.

The Nationals WA Leader Mia Davies said the McGowan Government undervalued the role CRCs play in maintaining healthy, connected communities and providing a shopfront for vital State and Federal government services.

"Across WA they provide services for youth, the elderly, people living with disability, professional development, traineeships, employ hundreds of people and are supported by more than 1000 volunteers," she said.

# AGM - Voting and Election Procedure

# Voting rights as per TCPA constitution:

(1) **Ordinary members,** are aged 18 and over, do not have voting rights (unless they are elected to an Executive Committee position) but are entitled to speak at general meetings. Ordinary members must be affiliated with an affiliated clubs or user group.

(2) **Social members**, who are not members of an affiliated club or user group but are regular users of the facilities. Social members do not have voting rights (unless they are elected to an Executive Committee position) but are entitled to speak at general meetings.

(3) **Junior members,** are aged 17 or under, do not have voting rights but are entitled to speak at general meetings. Junior members must be affiliated with an affiliated club or user group, and be nominated by a parent or guardian.

# Election of Executive Committee Members as per TCPA constitution:

(1) The business and affairs of the Association will be managed exclusively by a Executive Committee consisting of; (a) One delegate from each of the Affiliated clubs/user groups;

(b) up to two community delegates; and

(c) up to two additional Affiliated club delegates; and

(d) one Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup appointed delegate.

(2) The Office Holders for the Association will be chosen from the nominated delegates and shall include:

(a) A Chairperson; (b) A Secretary; and (c) A Treasurer.

- (3) The remaining nominated delegates shall be ordinary committee members.
- (4) The maximum number of committee members shall not exceed 11 members.

# Nomination of committee members as per TCPA constitution:

# (1) Affiliated clubs/user Groups Delegates:

(a) Affiliated clubs/user groups will conduct their own elections to determine **two representatives** (delegate and proxy) for the committee and provide the names of these representatives at the AGM

(b) Nominations must be received in writing to the secretary at least 7 days before the AGM

(c) All delegates and proxies must be a member of the club they are representing and be appointed by their club as the recognised delegate

# (2) Community member delegates

(a) At least 28 days prior to the AGM the secretary must publicly advertise on a notice board based at the Tambellup Community Pavilion a request for nominations for community member delegates.

- (b) Written notice of a nomination must be received by the secretary at least 7 days before the AGM;
- (c) The written notice must include a statement by another member in support of the nomination;
- (d) If the nominations equal the number of vacancies the delegates will be duly elected at the AGM.;

(e) If more members have nominated than are available positions, the members at the meeting must vote in accordance with procedures that have been determined by the committee to decide who is to be elected to the positions;

(f) Each member present at the meeting may vote for one member who has nominated for the position;

(g) A member who has nominated for the position may vote for themselves.

# Broomehill Historical Notes

#### <u>The West Australian Monday August 13 1888</u>

DISTRICT NEWS Kojonup

The long talked of change in the mail service has a t last taken place. The royal mail left here on Thursday morning last on her first trip to Eticup to await the arrival of the mails from Albany. We will now have weekly communication between Perth and Albany. This event is well worth noticing, as it brings us a step nearer to the long wished for time when we will be able to dash along in the iron horse to the tune of twenty-five miles an hour. Talking of the changes reminds me of the bad arrangement that has been made in the placing of mail horses between Williams and Eticup. For instance, the Williams team runs to Barron's, only 11 miles, and the next set of horses travels 19 miles to the 131 station, where fresh horses are procured to run only 11 miles, where they change again to run 18 miles to Kojonup. The whole of the road on the previous stages is in very good order, but the unfortunate Kojonup horses have to go through Eticup to the line without any change whatever, a distance of 33 miles and over, being inferior bush track, in fact quite boggy and almost impassable during the wet season. Most people would think that this is where a change of horse would be required

instead of at short intervals on the macadamised road.

#### <u>The West Australian Friday October 5 1888</u>

On Tuesday last Mr Robert Hamdorf arrived in Perth as the representative of some 23 farmers of York's Peninsula, South Australia. The men who have commissioned him to proceed here are substantial freeholders who are desirous of finding out whether Western Australia offers an opening for their labours. Mr Hamdorf came overland from Albany, and was especially pleased with the land at Eticup, and believes that with the stump-jumping plough much of it could be put under cultivation at once. Of other tracts as seen along the line, he also expressed approval. He intends, we believe, to thoroughly examine the settled districts of the colony before returning to South Australia to present his report.

Driving the Last Spike

#### (From the Albany Mail)

...We arrived at the 90 mile tanks at 11.45 and watered the iron horse. Nothing of importance until we got to Eticup, but as we came very near to the Central Station a flock of sheep took it into their heads to cross the line. Battle, murder and sudden death we prayed to be delivered from, but as those unfortunate sheep were transferred into mutton, the process could not have been painful, though sudden. The carcasses remained on the line, but the heads flew like projectiles from a gun, several yards across the line. By the bye, in going through the country nothing is more annoying than to find the places we have heard of as townships are nothing of the kind. Mt Barker consisted as far as we could see, of a name, a police station and a blacksmith's shop, with the glimpse of a public house in the far distance. We make an honourable distinction in the case of Eticup. Eticup has streets, and aristocratically named ones too. Having mentioned this dignity we shall leave Eticup, and run along as we did on Thursday to the Central Station at Wagin Lake, and eventually to the 121 miles, 31-34 chains, where the line will be united....

That the port of Albany will benefit largely by the construction of the Great Southern Railway is very generally believed, judging by the experiences of what has been accomplished by the projection of railways in other parts of Australia. The following paragraph, appearing in one of the Albany papers on the 17<sup>th</sup> of this month is certainly encouraging: - On Thursday evening the largest train-load of sandalwood ever brought into Albany arrived for the ship *Ebenzer*, now loading at the W.A. Land Company's jetty. 24 out of 25 truck load, weighing about 210 tons, belonged to Messers J & W Bateman, of Fremantle, who are completing the cargo of the *Ebenzer*, under the able management of Mr E Tunney, who arrived here with the wood. The total load, amounting to about 240 tons was brought in from Eticup

# MAKING SENSE Part 2 by 'Fossil'

Undoubtedly the major defining moment for Australia was the past period when the super continent of Gondwanaland separated into five major entities and hundreds of thousands of smaller islands, all surrounded by water – except Peninsula India. It was a period, spread over maybe 200 million years, when Earth's bottom half was reshaped and repositioned, largely from within – Volcanoes.

The area we call home, Broomehill-Tambellup, prior to this disruption was, once drained, the Yilgarn Block with water flowing south and slightly east. The area is a large repository for water or swamp. Today we call it the Bremer Basin. From Walpole to Jerramungup and Porongurup to Woodanilling – this large basin was fed by a complicated network of drainage channels draining from the northeast - the major paleo channel we today call the Coblimine River – odd remnant pools can still be found – one the Norrish Family at Tambellerup called the Washpool and others at Peringillup and to the east of Broomehill and further through Lake Dumbleyung to Harrismith. This large so called swamp may have been lacustrine (fresh to brackish water) though further south may have been invaded by shallow sea water after Gondwanas break up.

There are many pointers around, particularly southeast of Broomehill, and North, South, East & West - shell bed, petrified wood, lignite coal, sedimented sand, spongelite, dolerite dykes, evaporite deposits (dolomite), the dominant Stirling Ranges and Madjenapurdap Lagoons. These lagoons, some may call billabongs, located to the southeast of the Tambellup town site, comprise a total of nine elongated ancient channels appearing to trend toward Toolbrunup and, in most cases, surrounded by sand mounds. It remains unclear whether the ancient Coblimine from the northeast may have abruptly changed direction to the southeast or alternatively the southwest through Moonies Hill. Certainly the presence of a large quantity of transported sand over an equally large area between Tambellup and Cranbrook suggests a substantial depositional event has occurred – but was it water? Or maybe a combination of water, ice and wind.

Western Australia and more particularly the Yilgarn Block is largely devoid of mountains in this period of time. All mountain ranges are related to weakness where the earth's crust is thinnest and have been thrust upward. An xcursion to Bluff Knoll in the Stirling Ranges reveals the sedimentary layering of Earth's crust and is still visible after possibly 30 million years. Our dolerite dykes are largely inert magma forced upward rarely above the earth's surface as the weakness has cracked. Likewise the Flat Rocks, Moonies Hills area, Fairfield, Chilicup, Dartnall, Yeedabirup Rock, Spring Hill and a number of lesser known high points in the Shire.

In 2016 the Western Australian Department of Mineral Exploration released an updated geology map of the whole state. It clearly shows a remarkable series on nine near parallel faults extending from the Stirling Axis to the Darling Scarp and beyond. Now called the Bremer Graben, the significance of which will undoubtedly attract further study as scientists try to discover why and how very large bodies of fresh water are expelling into the southern continental margins and also off the west coast. The question remains, just where this water is coming from and how it is getting there.

One third of these fault lines traverse the Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup and their influence beyond their margins is probably of substance. Coincidentally, the major fault appears to align with Madjenapurdap Lagoons.

Two of the faults appear to realign to the east as they reach the Stirling Axis trending from north westerly and the Darling Scarp – one almost a straight line from south Moonies Hill to just south of Gnowangerup. The second and seemingly the more significant of the nine faults from the axis at Toolbrunup to between Tambellup and Peringillup – Yeedabirrup Rock – Moodiarrup – Boddington – the Darling Scarp and possibly northward to Shark Bay (the Madjenapurdap one).

The area between these two faults is considered seismically active of low intensity with its centre almost equal distance SW of Broomehill and NW of Tambellup townships - its influence stretching from the Shire of Woodanilling to the Shire of Cranbrook. The last shake recorded in mid-2007, and the most recent 'boom' heard at Moonies Hill in late 2016.

Interestingly, there has been speculation that both seismic events may have their origin in water movement below basement. Granitic basement rock appears to underlay the entire Yilgarn Block. It is also known to be fractured and faulted. Drilling in 1969 revealed that within the Shire, at least, the upper 1 - 10m can also be decayed – some drillers refer to this as rotten granite. One drill hole in the Dartnall area encountered  $10m^3$  of decayed granite, the drill dropping to basement and saline water and at 30m depth.


