

The next meeting of Council will be held on Thursday <u>15th September</u> 2016 commencing at 4.00pm in the Tambellup Council Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend all Council meetings.

#### FROM THE COUNCIL MEETING

- Council discussed projects funded by the Country Local Government Fund 2012-2013 funding allocation. Planned works at the Broomehill and Tambellup Halls, and the Broomehill Administration Office have been completed well within budget, and a decision was required to reallocate the remaining funds from these projects. In consideration of the strict criteria that is attached to this funding, Council determined to seek approval from the Department of Regional Development to reallocate \$122,860 unspent funds to the Tambellup Pavilion upgrade project. Subject to approval, the total amount of funding allocated to the Pavilion upgrade from this source will be \$317,749. The additional funds will assist in offsetting costs relating to the Western Power charge to upgrade the power supply to the site, and also reduce the amount of the loan that Council will raise.
- Council granted a rates concession to the Tambellup Business Centre Inc. for the 2016-2017 financial year.
- Council supported an application from the Broomehill Recreational Complex Inc. to the Department of Sport and Recreation CSRFF program, for funds to assist with an upgrade of lighting at the Broomehill Oval.
- Council granted approval to Greening Australia WA to collect native seeds within the Shire, subject to conditions.
- Council reviewed its *Policy 4.1 Road Construction and Maintenance Minimum Standards.* This policy sets out the engineering requirements for the construction and maintenance of Council's road network.

#### WORKS

And still the rain comes! We are pleased to report dam levels are high, with the Broomehill Town Dam full for the first time since it was extended in 2014. This is great news for the Broomehill Oval heading into summer.

The construction crew has been working on gravel patching on a number of roads that required attention, and the maintenance crew has been fixing bitumen edge breaks and potholes prior to the grading of shoulders. The maintenance graders have been working in the mid west part of the Shire working south, with the following roads graded: Flat Rocks Rd, Nookanellup Rd, North Nookanellup Rd, O'Neill Rd, Palomar Rd, Jam Creek Rd, Ngopitchup Rd, Birt Rd, Warrenup Rd, Grahams well Rd, Paul Valley Rd, Crosby Rd, Nymbup Rd and Hilder Rd. Some grading days were lost during the month due to heavy rainfall.

#### RESTRICTED AND PROHIBITED BURNING PERIOD

All residents of the Broomehill-Tambellup Shire are reminded that the **RESTRICTED** burning period commences on **19 SEPTEMBER 2016** and continues until **15 APRIL 2017** inclusive. During this time you are required to obtain a permit to burn before lighting any fires.

The **PROHIBITED** burning period commences on **1 NOVEMBER 2016** and continues through until **14 FEBRUARY 2017** inclusive. The lighting of fires during this period is prohibited, however if residents need to do **PROTECTIVE BURNING** during the Prohibited Burning Period they must first obtain a permit from a Fire Control Officer and then observe all the conditions of the permit. **PROTECTIVE BURNING** is to be carried out between the hours of 6.00pm and midnight on the same day. No Protective burning is to be carried out after December 20 2015. Permits to burn can be obtained from your Brigade Fire Control Officer, or the Community Emergency Services Manager (CESM), Cindy Pearce.

All residents should assess the fuel loads on their property, and take steps to reduce this risk well before summer. Although spraying and slashing of tall grass is an effective treatment for reducing fire risk, if it is done too late in the season the dried grass still presents as a hazard. 






The dark thought, the shame, the malice, meet them at the door laughing, and invite them in.


Be grateful for whoever comes, because each has been sent as a guide from beyond.

#### Spring locusts alert for landholders

Regional landholders in the grainbelt are advised to inspect properties for locust activity and be prepared to implement control activities during spring.

The Department of Agriculture and Food is predicting significant numbers of Australian plague locusts (APL) will build up during spring in eastern and southern parts of the grainbelt.

Department Invasive Species acting director Malcolm Kennedy said hatchings were expected to occur from September.

Surveys by the department have indicated moderate density hatchings could occur in parts of Ravensthorpe, Jerramungup, Gnowangerup, Narrogin, Kulin, Yilgarn, Westonia, Mukinbudin and Nungarin shires. In these areas, some locust bands and loose swarms are expected to form.

Variable hatchings are also likely in other parts of the southern agricultural region and eastern Wheatbelt.

"It is vital that landholders control locusts by spraying paddocks at the right time to minimise damage to valuable pastures and crops where locusts emerge and feed," Dr Kennedy said.

"Locusts will hatch at variable times and landholders should be checking their properties from early September for signs of locusts to determine when to start spraying. Green crops and pasture are most at risk from locust damage."

Landholders who observed locusts on their properties in autumn need to be particularly vigilant as there are likely to be egg beds which will hatch in spring.

"The main activity will be seen in pastures - look for early hatchings and hatching egg beds in places where there are bare areas such as around dam banks, roaded catchments and along fencelines," he said.


While it is up to landholders to control locusts on their property, the department will assist with monitoring and surveys, and provide advice to landholders on the best control options and when to start spraying.

Landholders are also encouraged to use the department's PestFax Reporter app to report where locusts are found.

Registered chemicals are commercially available, and landholders are reminded of the importance of complying with label regulations, particularly withholding periods.

# Preparing Psychologically for a Disaster

#### Introduction

Most people in Australia live in areas of threat from natural disaster, whether it be from bushfires, floods, severe storms, droughts, cyclones or earthquakes. Pamphlets and brochures available from local council offices, emergency services and community groups provide helpful information on how to be prepared and what to do in an emergency situation to protect lives, home and property.

As well as information on physical and practical preparation, it is very helpful for people to know how to prepare psychologically before a natural disaster and how to cope emotionally during or after a disaster. Knowing ahead of time how a disaster situation might be experienced can help to decrease people's anxiety levels and overall psychological responses. Being psychologically prepared when a disaster is threatening can help people feel more confident, more in control and better able to make effective emergency plans. It can also help to reduce the psychological distress and longer-term mental health problems that can result from the trauma of being involved in disasters.

Of course, the first and vitally important part of psychological preparation for an emergency situation is to be physically prepared with a practised emergency plan. Making all the necessary physical preparations and having a household emergency plan that is well known and practised by everyone will increase the sense of being in control when the emergency begins.

This information booklet outlines the importance of being psychologically prepared and provides the steps to take for psychological preparation when a natural disaster is threatening.

#### The importance of being psychologically prepared

Being directly involved in any potentially life-threatening emergency situation can be genuinely terrifying. People often don't have prior experience of being in natural disasters or knowledge of just how stressful this can be. When people are under severe stress they are usually not able to think as clearly as usual and this can affect decisions and reactions. These are normal, although not always helpful, responses to a possibly life-threatening situation.

When people have a better understanding of their own likely psychological responses in natural disaster warning situations this can help them to feel more in control and better able to cope. Being psychologically prepared can assist people to think more clearly and reduce the risk of serious injury and loss of life or property. Being cooler, calmer and more collected can also be very helpful to family members and others who may not be as well prepared psychologically for what is happening. Of course, it is unrealistic to think that people can be fully emotionally prepared for such stressful and confronting situations as severe natural disasters. However, being psychologically prepared can help in coping with the stress of the unfolding situation and can help to reduce the distress after the disaster has passed. This does not mean that people can be fully prepared for anything that may happen or that being psychologically prepared means being emotionally 'bullet-proof'. Being psychologically prepared also includes having realistic expectations that an emergency situation such as a bushfire or cyclone event can very quickly become unmanageable, unpredictable and life threatening. Being able to anticipate that such a situation could occur can help people to 'let go' when necessary and leave the situation to the expertise of emergency services.

#### What does being psychologically prepared involve?

Once the household emergency plan has been set and practised and the necessary physical preparations have been made, we can turn our attention to psychological strategies for managing the stress of a threatening natural disaster. Psychologists use a term called 'stress inoculation' to assist people to prepare themselves psychologically for emergencies, which in other words means planning to be better protected from stress by working through the likely psychological reactions beforehand and learning strategies to cope. These strategies 'inoculate' people against being overly anxious or overwhelmed by their emotional responses, and will help prevent being caught up in unhelpful thinking in an emergency situation. Obviously this approach will work better with some disaster events that may be more frequent and to some extent more predictable, but the psychological principles can be applied for any emergency.

The way people feel in highly stressful situations is strongly affected by the way they cope with the signs of physical arousal (e.g., racing heartbeat, shortness of breath) and the thoughts that they are having (e.g., 'I can't cope'; 'We're going to get badly hurt'). These reactions and thoughts can make people feel anxious, hopeless or even angry, and while these feelings are understandable, they are not very helpful in an emergency situation. Being psychologically prepared means that these natural reactions to stress can be anticipated and managed to help people feel more in control and confident.

There are three main steps to being psychologically prepared for a threatening natural disaster:

- 1 Anticipate the anxiety and concerns that will arise.
- 2 Identify uncomfortable or distressing thoughts and feelings that may cause further anxiety.
- Manage the responses so that the ability to cope remains as effective as possible.

#### A I M: The three steps to being psychologically prepared

- ANTICIPATE that you will be feeling worried or anxious and remember these are normal, although not always helpful, responses to a possible life threatening situation
- IDENTIFY what the specific physical feelings associated with anxiety are and whether you are having any frightening thoughts that are adding to the fear
- MANAGE your responses using controlled breathing and self-talk so that you stay as calm as possible and can focus on the practical tasks that need attention

...15. Papers will be laid before you embodying further important proposals for Railways on the land grant system. The additional projects are, from Colonel McMurdo and others for the construction of a line from Beverley to Eticup and thence to Eucla. ...

#### Eastern Districts Chronicle (York) Friday 2 Nov 1883

...The members of our local police force have donned their summer uniform, which consists of white helmets and Holland suits. Another murder is reported from the south. No particulars are yet to hand. The fatal affray is said to have occurred in the vicinity of Eticup. Whatever are we coming to? ...

#### Eastern Districts Chronicle (York) Friday 9 Nov 1883

#### MI SCELLANEOUS MEMORANDA

... We are given to understand that the rumour which has been current here for some days past to the effect that another murder has been perpetrated at Eticup, is entirely without foundation. ...

#### The West Australian Thursday 6 March 1884

#### OCCASIONAL NOTES

The Eticup correspondent of the *Albany Mail*, dating a fortnight back, sends it the following information: - "A heavy thunderstorm passed over here at 2am on Monday morning the 4<sup>th</sup> March, which lasted about 2 or 3 hours, filling up all the tanks and a great many of the small waterholes, but at the North-East, it was still heavier than down here. At one of the tanks belonging to Mr Van Zuilecom, the flood washed the slabs covering it about a mile and a half down the creek, besides overflowing a great many of his other tanks, and wells which were guite dry. All the sheep left up Northwards are now again able to return. The thunderstorm and lightning which accompanied the storm was very loud and vivid, and the heaviest experienced in the district for some time past, but it seems to have cleared off now and fine weather set in."

It is stated on the authority of the Anglo-New-Zealander, that a Syndicate of London capitalists have made proposals to the government of Western Australia relative to the construction of a railway on the land grant system, from Bunbury, the principal port of the southern districts of the colony via Kojonup (a town about 134 miles S. of Perth) and Eticup (a village 190 miles S) to join the Beverley and Albany Railway. The estimated cost is £300,000.


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

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
