FROM THE COUNCIL MEETING

Following the closing of the advertising period and consideration of submissions received, Council determined to request the Minister for Lands to permanently close Kimberley St Broomehill and a portion of Old Nardlah Rd Broomehill, and recommend that the land be disposed to Cooperative Bulk Handling.

Council also reviewed a number of policies as part of the three year rolling review of the Policy Manual. Policies reviewed included Community Engagement, Customer Service, Internal Controls, Legislative Compliance, Risk Management, and Appointment of Acting Chief Executive Officer. A new Complaints Policy was endorsed by Council.

Council endorsed the draft designs produced by H & H Architects for the new executive residence to be built at 63 Taylor St in Tambellup.

TAMBELLUP SPORTS PAVILION UPDATE

Following Councils endorsement of the concept plans for the new Pavilion, the architects are now working to produce detailed designs and elevations which will be available for public inspection and comment late in October. While that work is underway, Council has considered the next stage of the project in terms of management of the new facility. It is intended that the facility will be managed by a committee, and prior to the completion of construction, the 'rules' for management need to be developed.

Council is seeking expressions of interest from members of the community who may be interested in assisting with this stage of the project. More information is included elsewhere in this edition of BT Times, and anyone interested is encouraged to contact Pam Hull at the Shire on 9825 3555 to register.

For anyone who might be interested but is wary of being on 'another committee' – this role is not a 'life sentence'! Once the building is complete and management processes are finalised, management will be handed over to the new Management Committee and you will have done your bit!

WORKS UPDATE

Despite the recent rains we have received, the water levels in dams that are used to maintain our parks gardens and ovals are not as high as we would like heading into spring and summer. While the Broomehill town dam has a reasonable amount of water at the moment, the Complex dam is down significantly. The CBH dam is catching water, and this is being pumped to the Complex dam. Water levels at the dams in Tambellup are fairly low for this time of the year. We hope some spring rain will help see the ovals through summer.

In direct contrast, the rain we have had is helping weeds to grow most prolifically. Parks and gardens staff are busy with the main task being weeding, spraying and mowing.

A number of dead trees were removed in Tambellup during August, and work will be starting soon trimming trees under power lines in the Broomehill townsite

The construction crew has been out in recent weeks repairing damage to gravel roads, incurred following periods of rain, which could not be rectified by maintenance grading. This included sections of Tie Line North Rd, Ngopitchup Rd, Flat Rocks Rd and Brassey Rd. Water pooling at the intersection of Gnowangerup Tambellup Rd and Great Southern Hwy will be rectified in coming weeks using Council's Jetpatcher.

With nearly all staff back on deck following a fair share of winter colds and flu's, maintenance grading has recommenced with the graders working their way towards the north eastern section of the shire. Roads graded during August included old Broomehill-Kojonup Rd, Eureka Rd, Jam Creek Rd, Tie Line North Rd, Stockroute Rd, Collins Rd, Bignell Rd, Mindora Rd, Hankinson Rd and Dartnall Rd.

The maintenance crew has been working on footpath repairs, bitumen patching and assisting with the pad for the new shed being constructed at the Shire depot.

CMCA NATIONAL RALLY

This year the Bloom Festival is preceding another significant event in our region, the Caravan and Motorhome Club of Australia National Rally to be held in Albany from 26^{th} October – 1^{st} November 2015. The event will see hundreds of participants with their recreational vehicles making their way to Albany during the weeks before and after these dates. Centennial Oval will be transformed into a giant campground for the duration of the rally, and the region will be a hive of tourism activity.

With the extra traffic expected on major roads throughout the region, we would also caution all motorists to take extra time and care on the roads, exercise patience, courtesy and common sense, and make sure that we all get to where we need to go – safely! **RESTRICTED AND PROHIBITED BURNING PERIOD** All residents of the Broomehill-Tambellup Shire are reminded that the **RESTRICTED** burning period commences on 19 SEPTEMBER 2015 and continues until 15 APRIL 2016 inclusive. During this time you are required to obtain a permit to burn before lighting any fires. The **PROHIBITED** burning period commences on 1 NOVEMBER 2015 and continues through until 14 FEBRUARY 2016 inclusive. The lighting of fires during this period is prohibited, however if residents need to do **PROTECTIVE BURNING** during the Prohibited Burning Period they must first obtain a permit from a Fire Control Officer and then observe all the conditions of the permit. PROTECTIVE BURNING is to be carried out between the hours of 6.00pm and midnight on the same day. No Protective burning is to be carried out after December 20 2015.

Permits to burn can be obtained from your Brigade Fire Control Officer, or the Community Emergency Services Manager, Cindy Pearce.

Is your dog microchipped?

The *Dog Act 1976* provides that on and after 1 November 2015, the owner of a dog that has reached three months of age must ensure that the dog is microchipped.

How do I get my dog microchipped?

A veterinarian (vet), veterinarian nurse or a person with the relevant qualifications from a registered training provider is able to implant a microchip in your dog.

To find out how you can arrange for your dog to be microchipped, contact your regular vet or local government to obtain information on where you can take your dog to be microchipped.



My dog is old and unwell, is it still required to be microchipped?

A dog is exempt from the microchipping requirement if a vet issues a certificate stating that the implantation of a microchip in the dog may adversely affect the health and welfare of the dog.

Such a certificate cannot apply in respect of a dog that is under three months of age.

When will I be required to prove my dog is microchipped?

When you re-register your dog, you will be required to provide proof that the dog has been microchipped, by providing the local government with the microchip number.

How will microchipping my dog assist me?


If you lose your microchipped dog, it will make it easier for you to be reunited. The dog's microchip can be scanned by the ranger or a vet, which will reveal the owner's contact details.

If your dog is impounded and it is discovered that it has not been microchipped, you may be liable for a fine. As a result, it is in your best interests to ensure your dog is microchipped.

What happens if I do not get my dog microchipped?

A person who fails to ensure their dog is microchipped on and after 1 November 2015 is liable for a fine of up to \$5,000.

TAMBELLUP SPORTS PAVILION REDEVELOPMENT

As members of the community will be aware, Council is working towards the redevelopment of the Tambellup Sports Pavilion. This has been a long running project, and the success of a number of recent funding applications has ensured that it is now firmly on the agenda. Council has endorsed the <u>concept</u> design for a new facility, and detailed plans and elevations will be available for public inspection and comment in the near future. The Tambellup Sports Pavilion Advisory Committee was established in 2014 to provide Council with initial direction for the project. The committee, with representation from all sporting clubs and community groups in Tambellup, has enabled the project to be communicated to user groups, and subsequent feedback on concept plans to be received. We thank all representatives for their assistance and input to date. With the development of more detailed plans underway, the project is moving to the next stage. We are seeking

up to six community members, who will assist Council in this next phase of the development by:

- Assisting with development of management processes
- Promoting the project within the community

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- Disseminating information to community groups

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SHIRE OF BROOMEHILL-TAMBELLUP LOCAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

The Committee is responsible for preparing and maintaining the Local Emergency Management Plan, which sets out arrangements to be implemented in the event of an emergency situation.

One area which has recently been reviewed by the Committee is that of resources available within the Shire to assist in an emergency, and specifically the availability of portable sheep and cattle yards. We are hoping to compile a list of farmers from all areas of the Shire who may have these available if an incident occurred in their area.

This situation occurred in 2013 when a stock truck rollover on Great Southern Hwy near Peringillup resulted in several hundred sheep wandering through the bush and on the road. The Cunningham family generously loaned their portable yards, and the sheep were able to be contained before being transported to their destination.

A reminder that if the ambulance is required you must ring $\ensuremath{\mathsf{triple zero}}$

Precious time is lost if you try to contact volunteer ambulance officers at their home for the ambulance. The volunteer may not be available for the call, not in town .

The ambulance cannot be dispatched to the emergency unless the request goes through the State Operations Centre (SOC) so even if you phone a volunteer privately they cannot attend unless they get the call from SOC.


So if you need the ambulance stay calm, ring 000 and answer their questions and take their advice.

Earthquake Information

Western Australia is vulnerable to a range of natural hazards such as Bushfire, Storms, Floods, Earthquakes and Cyclones.

Currently all Local Governments are taking part in a State Risk Project looking at local hazards and risks for their area. Earthquakes are one hazard that has been identified across the region. We as a community probably know very little about earthquakes and don't foresee them as a risk. Western Australia has the highest incidence of earthquake in Australia. Most earthquakes occurring in this area range between 1.9 and 2.8 and while many are not felt due to their depth they do occur and it makes good sense that we as a community are aware of the ways to minimise the impact on people and property. Only guakes registering over 3.0 are reported to the local Emergency Service agencies as this magnitude can cause minor damage. Information on recent earthquake locations can be found on the Geoscience website. Information on earthquake safety and what to do during and after an event can be located on the DFES website or contact the Community Emergency Services Manager Cindy Pearce on 0417 071 567.





There have been a number of blocks of land close to town sites that have been covered with long dry grass during the summer period.

Local fire fighters raised concern last year with the Bushfire Advisory Committee regarding the length of this grass and the impact it would have on fighting a fire as well as fire fighter safety if a fire was to start on one of these blocks. Council considered recommendations put forward by the Bushfire Advisory and the following change was implemented

to limit grass height on land under the following zonings.

Extract from the 2015 / 2016 Fire Break Notice

Land Zoned Residential, Town Centre, Industrial (Townsite Land)

During the period from 31st October 2015 to 15th April 2016 inclusive you shall have fire breaks in the following positions:

On land which is 4000 square metres (one acre) or less in area, you shall remove all flammable material from the whole of the land, except living standing trees.

Land which exceeds 4000 square metres

Land which exceeds 4000 square metres (one acre) or more of area clear fire breaks not less than 2 metres completely surrounding and not more than 20 metres from the perimeter of all buildings, haystacks and fuel storage area situated on the land.

The height of all grass on the land is to be less than 150mm in height.

Land Zoned Rural Residential /Special Rural (Townsite and Suburban Areas)

During the period from the 31st October 2015 to 15th April 2016 inclusive you shall have fire breaks in the following positions:

Clear fire breaks not less than 2 metres completely surrounding and not more than 20 metres from the perimeter of all buildings, haystacks and fuel storage areas situated on the land.

Minimise fire hazardous material to the satisfaction of the Chief Fire Control Officer by stocking, slashing or other means. The height of all grass on the land is to be less than 150mm in height. Properties will be inspected and orders may be issued.

Property compliance is required by the 1st November.

Local Fire Break Contractors have been notified of the changes to assist them in their works program. If you require further clarification or details please contact your local Fire Control Officer or Cindy Pearce the Shires Community Emergency Services Manager on 0417 071 567.

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The aim of the program is to facilitate the establishment of trials, demonstration sites and associated learning activities in targeted locations across the South Coast in the key soil health areas of soil biology, soil acidity, soil erosion, water repellence and managing nutrient additions.

The previous Southern Incentives - Southern Soils round funded seven projects across the south coast region that investigated innovative practices and adoption of new sustainable farming practices.

Three of these projects focused on soil acidity, a major issue for agriculture in Western Australia. Effectively managing soil acidity is one of the most important jobs a farmer can do to maintain productivity on their farm.

- Other successful projects included:

 investigation of soil pH management on-farm in the Tenterden area through establishing a trial that examined different methods of lime incorporation;
 an assessment of a direct soil survey method for the creation of high resolution maps of soil acidity and nutrition;

- and nutrition; a study using precision agriculture technology over broadacre paddocks to map and plan strategic pH management on-farm in the Esperance region; Monitoring the effect on soil biology and nutrition of different fertiliser strategies on re-sown pastures after single and double rotation blue gum plantations; and The development of case studies of farms transitioning from blue gum plantations to cropping and grazing.



When someone offers their help, take it. You won't know what you want from them and you won't know what to ask for, but know who you have around you that can be there when you do figure out what you need. And please. Have your moments. We all have them.

There will be times you hate the position you are in, there will be times you will be begging for this all to be over, there will be times you feel you cannot do it anymore. This doesn't mean you love or care any less. It just means you are human.

It isn't fair that you are caught up in this vortex. It isn't fair you have to watch this happen. It isn't fair. None of it is. It is OK to hate on the world every now and then. Lean into your anger and sadness because once your moment is over, you'll once again have the strength to keep on hoping and keep on keeping on. You can do it.

WAFARMERS Central Great Southern Zone Meeting Report:

Only seventeen members and guests, including transport operators and business people from Katanning attended the meeting held on 3rd August. The number was disappointing considering the opportunity to hear and question speakers from Main Road, Paul Bond, Overseer of Heavy Vehicle Chain of Responsibility - all investigations go over his desk; Larry - Manager of Road Inspectors and Martin Troy in charge of implementation of Ag Equipment regulations. They all spoke on current regulations and how they affect farmers and truck drivers. Over the years significant numbers of agricultural machines have operated on the roads without the required MRWA permits, leaving operators exposed to potential prosecution.

From discussion, it would appear most of us are breaking the law in a number of areas. Main Roads is in the process of amending regulations. With the substantial increase in weight and mass of tractors, many are outside the regulations. Opportunity was given and taken for many questions which hopefully will assist Main Roads in having regulations that are suitable to today's agriculture and attendees to be more aware of what they need to comply with. Summary:

Check the Main Roads Agriculture website and National Transport Commissions 'Load Restraint Guide' on Department for Planning and Infrastructure website: or purchase the booklet 08 94276404 (\$13 with postage.) This edition is 2004. The revised edition is expected in 2 years. Read your permits very carefully.

Take 'Reasonable Steps' to restrain/secure your load so that, bar turning your vehicle over, it will not leave the vehicle.

Discussion on **Chain of Responsibility** was concerning. Responsibility for contractor's workers and supervision were questioned. Best advice was to record that you have instructed, questioned etc your workers and contractors to ensure their part of the C.of.R. is covered. Ignorance is no excuse. The **Farm Safe** Tick off list is useful. As harvest approaches farmers will be investigated.

The use of **signage** is encouraged. (Packet of Signs for Shearing Sheds are available from AWI Health and Safety website for \$25).

General discussion during the meeting prior to the Main Roads presentation included WAFarmers CEO Stephen Brown outlining the new all inclusive **insurance package** on offer to members (see WAFarmers at Dowerin and Newdegate Field Days). The Grains report included discussion on the possible **sale of Fremantle Port**. The meeting was split on a motion regarding supporting transparent **cost base receival fees**. Stephen reported the new format of **newsletter** from Head Office was getting positive feedback.

AgConnect members (up to around 35) are reminded if they wish to participate in the **AGTiki** bus tour on October 10th, they need to contact head office asap as spots are filling. Unfortunately, this date does clash with the Pre Harvest Ball in Katanning.

Better consideration needed for volunteer emergency services personnel tionals WA Member for the Agricultural Region Martin Aldridge MLC has welcomed the

findings of an Auditor General report on Support and Preparedness of Fire and Emergency Services Volunteers in WA.

The report, published last Thursday, assessed if the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) effectively recruits, prepares and supports fire and emergency s

Mr Aldridge said the report demonstrated a need to pay critical attention to facts and figures relating to the State's volunteer force as well as the wellbeing, training and support of more than 20,000 individuals volunteering across about 800 emergency services groups.

"Volunteer emergency services personnel are a hugely valuable asset to regional communities, stepping up to assist others during catastrophic events," he said

"These men and women often put their own lives on the line to ensure the safety of others and for that reason alone, State and Local Government need to improve record keeping and information associated with this dedicated force."

Mr Aldridge said it was particularly important DFES developed specific volunteer policies and procedures to ensure best practice management of issues like training, fatigue and communication.

He added that as the State's lead emergency services agency, it was incumbent upon DFES to improve its relationship and data sharing with local government-managed volunteer groups.

"The report found DFES had made considerable progress in identifying how it recruits prepares and supports its volunteers, but there are still many improvements to be made in the area of data collection and communication," he said.

Similarly, the report identified a trend of declining volunteer group numbers, especially in regional areas, which is a great concern in the context of emergency response capacity.

Mr Aldridge said a Nationals WA-devised policy to support emergency service groups through allocating them \$2000 Emergency Services Volunteer Fuel Cards should be implemented as soon as possible.

"This commitment will be funded by Royalties for Regions, providing an incentive to volunteers by reducing fuel costs shouldered by emergency service volunteers as well as offering a small thankyou for the vital role they play in protecting our communities," he said "Along with DFES implementing recommendations made by the Auditor General's report, our

community safety network could be significantly strengthened by this investment.







Great Southern hospital upgrades completed

- Upgrades at Kojonup Hospital and Tambellup Nursing Post completed
- First of 26 small hospital and nursing post upgrades in Great Southern and Wheatbelt

• Part of the Southern Inland Health Initiative's Small Hospital and Nursing Post

Refurbishment Program

Two significant milestones have been reached as part of the biggest investment in country health in the State's history, the Southern Inland Health Initiative, with the completion of two health service upgrades at Tambellup and Kojonup. The two health services have been transformed into contemporary, integrated health services that will enhance the way health care is delivered to the people of Kojonup, Tambellup and the surrounding districts.

Several months of planning and community consultation were undertaken before construction started in May this year. The Tambellup Nursing Post and Kojonup Hospital refurbishments were funded by the State Government's Royalties for Regions as part of the half a billion dollar Southern Inland Health Initiative being delivered by the WA Country Health Service.

The refurbishments will enable better delivery of high quality health care and improved patient comfort and safety. They address essential infrastructure requirements to facilitate the delivery of contemporary models of care – including fit for purpose GP consulting rooms and reliable telehealth services.

The upgrades modernise the facility, improve patient safety and provide employees with a contemporary work place which should improve staff attraction and retention.

The refurbished Tambellup Nursing Post includes an expanded treatment room, improved waiting area, an additional multipurpose consulting room, a new meeting room and a refurbished allied health room.

Changes to Kojonup Hospital include an upgraded main entry, a new multipurpose consulting room with separate entry suitable for telehealth appointments, a new communications room and a refurbished kitchen.

The two facilities will soon be renamed to better reflect their contemporary roles within the community. The Tambellup Nursing Post will become the Tambellup Health Clinic and the Kojonup Hospital will become the Kojonup Health Service.

The refurbishment of Gnowangerup Hospital, also part of the Small Hospital and Nursing Post Refurbishment Program in the Great Southern, is expected to be completed in October.

This includes an additional emergency treatment room, upgraded ambulance bay, a multipurpose consulting room, upgraded physiotherapy room and a refurbished kitchen.

Interclub an Inspiration

Spectators at the 5th Round of the South West Interclub Championships hosted by Cranbrook Districts Motorcycle Club Inc on Sunday 2nd August 2015, were impressed with the venue presentation and racing standard. 123 motocross riders turned out to compete from seven motorcycle clubs as far away as Bunbury and Collie. It was a great opportunity to showcase the club, to the public and the motocross fraternity.



The Motorcycling WA South West Interclub Championships currently consists of seven clubs being, Albany, Bunbury, Collie, Cranbrook, Denmark, Manjimup and Southern Capes (Busselton), and all participants must be a bona-fide member of one of the clubs nominated in the application. Riders compete for the South West Region Champion title, at seven competitive events held at each of the member clubs during the race season.

Motocross riders can take part in this series from the age of 4 years. However, they can only race competitively for points from 7 years provided they have completed "kick start training". This training is a requirement for all junior riders aged 7 - 16 years. That is the rider must, pass a theory test on the basic competition rules, and prove their riding ability to a Motorcycling WA accredited coach each year.

This interclub has 13 different race classes catering for all ages and abilities from novice to ladies and veteran riders. During the day each race class completes one round of practice then three rounds of competitive racing. Depending on your race class the rider will ride 3 – 5 laps of the track. As you can imagine this makes for a busy schedule, requiring many volunteers to make the day run smoothly. Motorcycling WA have strict race day guidelines requiring the following officials Race Steward, Clerk of Course, Race Secretaries, Bike Scrutineers, Bike noise tester, First Aid Officer, Scorers, bike sweepers and Flag Marshalls. Thank you to everyone from all clubs who volunteered and congratulation's to the following motocross riders representing Cranbrook DMCC who received medals, Kylan Black, Dale Wyland, Neil Preston and Caleb Mills.

Joining this series gives Cranbrook DMCC notoriety on the WA motocross circuit and inspires the club to move to the next level in applying to Motorcycling WA to hold a state event. A state event would attract more riders, and also more riders to the interclub (usually held two weeks prior) as they use the event as a practice.

Are you feeling inspired to race your bike? If so join us on Saturday 19th September for Cranbrook DMCC Club Day. This is a competitive event where riders will compete for an end of season trophy. Don't forget for those riders on a budget who just want to have fun there are the same number of non-competitive races. Note non-competitive riders do not use the new start gates. Pits open at 7am, motorbike examination and rider sign on 7:30am – 8:45am, and riding starts 9am. Please remember that every rider needs to participate with flag duties, so bring along a volunteer helper. Canteen available and spectators welcome. See website cranbrookmx.com for more information.

Broomehill Historical Notes

Quite a few years ago Shirley MacDonald began to work through the diaries of her Grandfather, Thomas Norrish (TN) which he wrote when he first came to Eticup to take up farming and the diaries of William Henry Graham (WHG) who was also one of the first pioneers of the Eticup district. Shirley collated all the information both in alphabetical and chronological order. There are many wonderful pieces of information and anecdotes in these diaries and we are proud to share them with the community each month.

Withers, Rev Joseph – Anglican Rector at Williams whose Parish included the Eticup area. From late 1879 to January 1887, TN records regular visits, about once a month, but the 1887 diary is not available so the latter date does not indicate the end of his Ministry at Eticup. Visits on Sundays would include services at Fairfield or Goblup or, later, at the Eticup church. There were occasions when he failed to turn up and TN once wrote "We are never certain when he will come." He failed to arrive at Goblup on 22nd June 1884 for the christening of May Eunice Norrish and Mrs Whitton's child (possibly Edward) although he did come to Sunnyside the next day and baptised May Norrish. On 17th November 1886, he went with TN and Patrick Garrity to the "school" to select a spot of land for a burial ground. This was very likely just before Algy Trimmer's death when he was known to be very ill. On 3rd January 1887, Mr Withers went to Eticup School and examined the children. Joseph married Mary Alice Gregg in Mount Barker in 1887; she was his second wife.

Woback – Arrested in January 1865 but offence unknown and he got away from Constable Preston on the road. On 1st February, WHG recaptured him and took him to Kojonup. On 18th February, Duncan returned from Albany and said that Woback got three years.

Woods – On 6th April 1907, TN and Mr McCallum went to a meeting at Woods' place at Ugenup to discuss joining the Katanning Branch of the Farmer's & Producers' League. Fifteen men attended.

Woods - Unidentified. Employed by Josiah Norrish at Tambellarup in December 1883 and responsible for starting a fire by throwing a match. Some wheat was burnt but most saved by a wind change.

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


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
