

The next meeting of Council will be held on Thursday 16th July 2015 commencing at 4.00pm in the Tambellup Council Chambers. Members of the public are welcome to attend all Council meetings.

FROM THE COUNCIL MEETING

Council considered a request from Co-operative Bulk Handling, for the permanent closure of Kimberley Street, Broomehill and a portion of Old Nardlah Road in Broomehill, with the land to be disposed of, to Co-operative Bulk Handling. Council is required to advertise the proposal for comment.

Council declined a request from the Gillamii Centre in Cranbrook for a financial contribution of \$20,000 per annum for a period of three years, to enable the Centre to continue to deliver services and develop projects of local priority.

Council declined a request from the State Library of Western Australia Foundation for a financial contribution towards the Foundation's 'On the Homefront' appeal, to enable the digitisation of Western Australian newspapers published from World War 1 and beyond.

Council granted approval to Greening Australia WA to collect native seed from Council managed reserves and road reserves within the Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup subject to conditions.

Council has accepted a quote from H & H Architects for design and contract management services to construct a new executive residence at 63 Taylor St, Tambellup. Council will utilise Reserve funds for this project.

GRAVEL ROADS IN WINTER

All residents are reminded that following periods of rain, gravel roads change. Slippery patches may appear, and water may be on the road in low lying areas. Residents are reminded that they should drive to the conditions.

WASTE TRANSFER STATION – PRE PAID TIP CARDS

Residents are reminded that the green 2014/2015 Waste Transfer Station passes expire on 31 July 2015, and will not be accepted after that date. New passes valid for 2015-2016 will be distributed with rates notices for those residents who do not receive the kerbside rubbish and recycling collections, and prepaid passes will be available to purchase at the Shire Administration offices after 1 August 2015. COUNCIL WORKS

With the end of the financial year upon us, most of the scheduled works program has been completed. Recent works included the installation of kerbing on Tambellup West Rd, which has been backfilled with gravel and compacted, works at the intersection of Gnowangerup-Tambellup Rd and Great Southern Hwy which have been completed, and gravel resheeting and culvert headwall works on Nardlah Rd which, at time of writing, were nearly complete. Funded works proposed for Pallinup Rd will be carried over to next financial year.

Maintenance grading has been interrupted during June due to dry weather and staff illness. The graders are still working in the south eastern section of the Shire.

The rain to date has been welcomed by parks and gardens staff, who aside from keeping on top of mowing and weeding in both towns, have been able to plant established jacaranda trees at the Broomehill Skate Park. These should look a picture when they eventually flower.

Even with the rain, water is never far from the mind, and maintenance of systems is still a significant activity through winter. Most recently it has been noted that the Complex dam has developed a leak, caused by the pump pressure tank rusting out and creating a large hole in the dam bank inside the pump shed. The water has channelled through weak spots in the dam bank before leaking out some distance from the shed. Options for repairs to the dam have been considered.

Issues have been experienced with the Tambellup West Rd standpipe not working in recent weeks. A new pump has been fitted and it is now operating correctly.

COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Council elections will be held in October this year, with three positions on Council becoming vacant. If you have ever considered serving your community through this avenue, and would like to find out more about the role, you are encouraged to contact any of the serving Councillors, or alternatively, the Chief Executive Officer, who can provide more information.

TAMBELLUP SPORTS PAVILION UPDATE

Just a brief update – we have recently been advised that an application submitted to the Great Southern Development Commission's Regional Grants Scheme has been successful, with \$200,000 being allocated to the Pavilion upgrade project. We are extremely grateful to the GSDC for their ongoing support of local projects.

This amount brings the confirmed funding to \$1.4 million, still a way short of the initial estimate of \$3.2 million required. Aside from working with the architects to identify ways in which the cost of the project can be reduced without losing functionality, Council will be applying to various funding programs as they are announced to reduce the shortfall. At present an application is being developed for the National Stronger Regions Fund Round 2, and while this is an extremely competitive national program, we will keep everything crossed for a successful outcome. Thank you to those sporting clubs which have provided letters of support to accompany our application.

We will be calling a meeting of the Tambellup Sports Pavilion Advisory Committee in the near future, to consider the next draft of plans for the Pavilion, and to progress the management side of the new facility. The current committee consists of representatives from each of the sporting, social and recreation groups in Tambellup, along with Council representation. It is acknowledged that the committee is large, and that there may be some groups who may have a general interest in the project but not necessarily a specific interest. In order to be more efficient in progressing the project, it is intended to reduce the size of the committee to a more manageable size. All groups will be consulted in this regard.

Running alongside this will be the formation of the Management Committee. The Management Committee will be responsible for the future management of the new facility, in line with successful models evident in neighbouring communities. This will include managing the use of the Pavilion by local clubs, members and visitors, and the hiring of the Pavilion to local residents and groups. It is proposed that the Management Committee will be an incorporated entity, with responsibility for managing the bar and associated activities for all users of the facility.

The Advisory Committee is aware that there are people in the community with knowledge and experience in business planning and management (think: farmers, business people......) who are not currently on the committee. If this sounds like you,

Or someone you know, and you are interested in being involved in this capacity, we encourage you to contact Joanne or Pam at the Shire to discuss. This doesn't need to be a life sentence, however it is imperative that the basis of the planning is sound to ensure a secure future for the facility.

The future viability of the new facility depends entirely on increased use and effective management. Council is keen for the community to take ownership of the new facility, to see it become a community hub for all groups.

COMPULSORY MICROCHIPPING FOR DOGS

All members of the public are reminded that from 1 November 2015 it is compulsory for all dogs to be microchipped.

Amendments to the Dog Act 1976 made in November 2013 provided that from 1 November 2015 the owner of a dog that has reached three months of age must ensure that the dog is microchipped.

A dog is exempt from the microchipping requirement if a veterinarian issues a certificate stating that the implantation of a microchip may adversely affect the health and welfare of the dog. The certificate cannot apply in respect of a dog that is under three months of age.

When a person registers their dog, they will be required to provide proof that the dog has been microchipped by providing the Shire with the microchip number.





Broomehill Historical Notes

Quite a few years ago Shirley MacDonald began to work through the diaries of her Grandfather, Thomas Norrish (TN) which he wrote when he first came to Eticup to take up farming and the diaries of William Henry Graham (WHG) who was also one of the first pioneers of the Eticup district. Shirley collated all the information both in alphabetical and chronological order. There are many wonderful pieces of information and anecdotes in these diaries and we are proud to share them with the community each month.

Wiese, E – Visited Sunnyside on 20th October 1898 and on 23rd November. TN, while in Narrogin, walked to Wiese's farm and commented "He had a splendid crop."

Wilhelm, R – Shearing at Goblup in 1895 and called again on Christmas Day with the two Beecks. On 30th December he was at Goblup to see the land to be "rung" (ring barked).

Wilkes – On 8th September 1879, TN was advised that young Wilkes

Wilkes – On 8th September 1879, TN was advised that young Wilkes had hanged himself and on 11th February 1882, the Wilkes boy brought word that Josiah Norrish's son had died by drowning.

Wilkins, Red – Thomas Lott arrived to take over Goblup on 30th October 1883 with his man, Wilkins, one wagon and one dray loaded with rations. On 18th November, Wilkins walked with Thomas Lott and TN over to TN's new house, Sunnyside. On 25th December that year, TN saw Wilkins at the Half Mile Pool.

Wilkinson, Frederick – Shepherd for TN during 1879. In May 1879 Douglas and Drury made a lambing yard at the Salt Well for Wilkinson, TN sent an iron tank of water to Fred's station and Sam Smith carted hurdles for the lambing. On 5th June 1879, TN drafted 191 dry ewes from Fred's flock to take to Goblup and give to Drury and Joe Louther, who had been helping with lambing at Wilkinson's camp and returned to Goblup. The next day Fred shifted his lambs to Tree Wells. He brought his sheep in on 3th July and on the 9th TN tailed the lambs – 629. On 11th August TNB and Mrs Norrish went in the carriage and took Fred's things to Three Wells. Fred was back in October for his sheep to be washed and shorn and TN settles with him on 13th November 1879.

Williams, Edward – Called at Goblup in June, July and October 1879 and again in February 1880. TN saw him at Chester's hut on 11th May 1880 and a few days later he called at Goblup with two other men, one of whom named George, TN engaged.

Williams, Frederick – Arrived at Goblup on 26th October 1882 to shear, having finished at Camballup the day before. He came from Albany on 23rd September 1883 to shear and on 28th accompanied TN in the trap to Garrity's to get the cask of rum for the shearers. He stayed on after shearing helping George Francis cart slabs and cut and cart rafters for the stable. He went tamar hunting with Johnny. And he went with TN, Jack the Sailor and George Fox to get rushes to thatch the stable, and shifted Wilson's flock to give to William Peters. He is believed to have been Hannah Williams' brother and on 1st February 1884 started for Albany with TN, sister Hannah and two of TN's daughters.

Williams, Miss Hannah - Left Albany on 11th March 1882 with TN to be teacher to the Norrish children; they reached Goblup on the 13th. She started the children's lessons on the 15th and her "box" was picked up from Fairfield on the 17th. Miss Williams accompanied the family on all outings and on 17th December 1882 returned to Albany with TN and Mrs Norrish's sister, Mary Jane Wray - apparently for Christmas with her own family. On 17th November 1883, she moved into the new house, Sunnyside, with all of the children except the youngest William, and with the maid Emma Knapp. Mrs George Thomas (nee Charlotte Nelson) was also with them. On 1st February 1884, TN started for Albany with Miss Williams and his two elder daughters, Hannah and Norah; Hannah Williams apparently finishing up, as Miss Ralston took over in July. On 21st January 1889 Miss Williams came to Sunnyside to stay for a week. The 1889 and 1890 diaries are not available and it is possible that she stayed on or returned as entries in December 1890 suggest that she may have been teaching at the Eticup School; TN gave her a cheque in exchange for cash on 22nd December 1890 and five days later took the school books over from Miss Williams.

Inquiry into PATS echoes need for framework overhaul

Two Nationals MPs have welcomed a parliamentary inquiry report into WA's Patient Assisted Travel Scheme (PATS) tabled in the Legislative Council today.

The report highlights a list of deficiencies in the current PATS scheme and put forward 21 recommendations on how the State Government can improve and modernise it

Member for the Agricultural Region Martin Aldridge MLC said the report took into account and directly addressed many suggested improvements a Parliamentary National Party (PNP) submission to the inquiry raised.

"They include increasing fuel and accommodation subsidies for those patients that receive specialist medical services under PATS and the type of medical service that will be covered by PATS in the future," he said.

"Recommendations 13 and 14 suggest the 100km eligibility ruling is scrapped in favour of a system that better responds to the health needs of regional patients."

Mr Aldridge expressed his satisfaction that the inquiry recommended subsidies for accommodation, road and air travel offered by PATS be urgently revised to reflect contemporary market conditions.

"I also believe it is imperative that the PATS scheme includes support for accessing allied health, dental and broader mental health services, another finding made by the inquiry," he said.

In November 2013 Mr Aldridge moved a motion calling for a parliamentary inquiry into PATS, while at the same time recognising the important role it plays assisting regional people to access specialist medical care.

Subsequent to the motion the Public Administration Committee initiated an inquiry into the scheme in February last year

Member for the Mining and Pastoral Region Jacqui Boydell MLC, who sits as a member of the committee, said the report put other aspects of the scheme in need of reform under the microscope.



"Importantly the inquiry recommended fuel and accommodation subsidies are revised annually to ensure they are in line with actual costs," she said.

"I hope this inquiry's findings help strengthen the standard and modernity of PATS in WA to meet requirements outlined in the National Healthcare Agreement 2012 such as equitable access to public health and emergency services irrespective of geographical location."

Royal comfort in store for WA regional road coach passengers

Replacing the fleet of Transwa road coaches thanks to a \$15.1 million Royalties for Regions investment will give passengers absolute travel comfort, according to Member for Wagin Terry Waldron MLA.

By June 2017, Transwa's ageing fleet of 22 road coaches will have been entirely replaced and an additional new coach added to the fleet.

Mr Waldron said he was excited about the replacement program, which would provide passengers with the best in travel luxury, including state-of-the-art seating, on board entertainment and USB charging ports.

"Travel times between destinations in the Wagin electorate and the rest of the State can sometimes draw out so it is important Transwa offers passengers the best customer experience possible," he said.

"That starts with comfort and I'm assured the new coaches will be second-to-none in that department"

Mr Waldron said road coaches provided an affordable travel alternative to those who could not drive or didn't have access to a vehicle.

Transwa services much of the southern half of WA by road, stretching from Kalbarri in the north, east to Meekatharra and Kalgoorlie and south to Esperance and Albany.

Last year it catered for about 200,000 boardings. Collectively the fleet travels 3 million kilometres annually, or roughly 8500km per day and each coach clocks up about 130,000km per annum.

Many destinations in the electorate are serviced by Transwa including larger and smaller centres such as – Arthur River, Borden, Brookton, Broomehill, Dumbleyung, Katanning, Kojonup, Mt Barker, Narrogin, Pingelly, Tambellup, Wagin, Williams and Woodanilling.

The new buses will be jointly delivered by Volvo Bus Australia and Spanish manufacturer Irizar. And each coach will also comply with the Disability Discrimination Act 1992, ensuring they are accessible to all.

Regional Development Minister Terry Redman said the State Government was committed to supporting the people of our regions and connecting towns through public transport.

"Connecting communities through public transport will help build a stronger economy and better quality of life in the State's regions," Mr Redman said.

Royalties for Regions delivers State's second rescue helicopter

The State Government's new rescue helicopter will increase access to life saving emergency services across the state, according to Nationals Member for the Agricultural Region Hon Martin Aldridge MLC.

The helicopter, unveiled this morning in Bunbury, will provide life-saving services to the Western Australian community operating out of the Bunbury Airport.

Mr Aldridge said the helicopter would work with the existing Perth-based helicopter and would service the South West and Great Southern and further afield if tasked.

"The addition of this new chopper will not only provide additional safety for people in southern parts of the State, it also frees up the existing helicopter to provide greater emergency services to the Mid West and Wheatbelt," Mr Aldridge said.

"The two services will work in conjunction with one another to deliver critical medical care 24 hours a day, every day of the year."

The new helicopter is funded through Royalties for Regions and will respond to incidents including road crashes, emergency hospital transfers and search and rescue operations.

Mr Aldridge said the new service would drastically increase the area of the State covered by the service

"The helicopters each have an operating radius of 500km before they need to refuel," Mr Aldridge said.

"This means the service can now respond to more than 95 per cent of the State's population."

Mr Aldridge worked closely with the RAC and his Nationals colleagues in the lead up to the 2013 State Election to ensure this vital service was delivered.

First announced in the 2013 State Budget, the delivery of this helicopter means Royalties for Regions continues the program's recent focus on emergency services in the Agricultural Region.

Regional Grants Scheme funds of \$1.35 million allocated to 11 local projects

The highly anticipated continuation of the Royalties for Regions Regional Grants Scheme (RGS) has committed \$1.35 million towards 11 community projects in the Wagin electorate.

- Shire of Kulin to employ two new full-time staff members for Camp Kulin (\$150 000)
- St John Ambulance WA Lake Grace for the Lake Grace Sub Centre New Building Development project (\$110,340)
- Town of Narrogin for the Narrogin CBD Townscape Plan Comprehensive Review (\$27.772)

Royalties for Regions has invested almost \$100 million through the RGS. Funding is administered by individual Regional Development Commissions.

Mr Waldron congratulated successful applicants in the Wagin electorate and thanked the boards of the Great Southern, Wheatbelt and Peel Development Commissions for their guidance in recommending projects suitable for funding.

In 2014-15, a new Royalties for Regions grants program – the Community Chest Fund – was established alongside the RGS to allocate one-off grants of up to \$20,000 to support small, locally-driven community projects


