

FROM THE COUNCIL MEETING

Council agreed to extend the Memorandum of Understanding with the Tambellup Community Resource Centre for the use of the CRC building, with a review to be undertaken in October 2016.

Council supported a proposal from the Broomehill Bowling Club to fund 50% of the cost of seven shade structures for around the greens at the Bowling Club. The funds are to be sourced from the Broomehill Recreation Complex Reserve and the future replacement of the shade will be the responsibility of the Bowling Club and/or the Broomehill Recreation Complex Management Committee.

TAMBELLUP SHOW

Congratulations are extended to the Tambellup Agricultural Society and all helpers on presenting a successful show once again. It was great to see so many people come together to celebrate our community, and the well-attended BBQ and fireworks were a fitting end to the day.

It goes without saying that the committee would greatly appreciate any assistance from members of the community in the lead up to next year's event, so if you are interested, keep an eye out for the date of the next meeting.

COUNCIL WORKS

In both townsites, the gardening crew is trying to get on top of seasonal grass and weed growth, with mowing, slashing and whipper snipping in full swing. Some spraying will also be carried out. Grading of firebreaks around the townsites will commence shortly to minimise the fire risk during the summer months.

The Royalties for Regions-funded Stormwater Harvesting and Waste Water Reuse projects are almost complete, with a solar pump system and security fencing being installed at the CBH dam in Broomehill. The pipeline to the Recreational Complex has been laid, and will be connected to an older line which runs up to the Complex dam. In Tambellup, contractors will be installing a line from the new tanks at the Oval to connect to the reticulation at Diprose Park. The Water Corporation has had some problems with the Water Treatment plant, and hopefully they will be sorted in the near future to allow the use of this water on the Oval during summer.

Water levels in some of Council's dams are reflective of the good falls experienced during the past month, and some are ordinary for this time of the year. Leading into summer, the Broomehill town dam level is similar to that experienced last year before the dam was extended. This dam waters Holland Park, the Broomehill Primary School, the Broomehill office garden, Sheridan's Garden and the rest stop. In Tambellup, the Jam Creek dam is at around 80% capacity and the No. 1 dam is only around 400mm off being full. Conversely the No. 2 dam is only at around 50% capacity. At present these dams water the Tambellup Sports oval and gardens and the Tambellup Primary School oval and gardens, however as indicated above, this will be extended to include Diprose Park in the near future.

Other tasks underway in the townsites include the repair of lighting along the pathway next to the railway line in Broomehill, the removal of trees on Tambellup West Rd in preparation for drainage works, and spraying of the ovals for broadleaf weeds, and fertilising

The construction crew has been working on a number of projects, with gravel widening on Tambellup West Rd underway in two sections and yet to commence on a third. Stabilising and sealing will be completed by mid November. Gravel patching of potholes has been completed on Beejenup Rd.

Tree pruning and mulching has been completed on Pindellup Rd and Nardlah Rd, and will then commence on Flat Rocks Rd.

The maintenance crew has been carrying out small bitumen repair jobs, and working on headwalls and town drainage. The maintenance graders have been working in the north east part of the Shire, and will be working their way south. During October grading was carried out on the following roads: Pallinup Rd, Nardlah Rd, Heron Rd, Norrish Rd, Gillespie Rd, North Batchelor Rd, Martinup Rd, Marshall Rd, Tieline North Rd, Curnow Rd, Thompson Rd, Beejenup Rd, Clinic Rd, Graham Rd, Fletcher Rd, Hillman Rd, Winspear Rd, South Batchelor Rd, Clayton Rd, Rae Rd and Toolbrunup Rd.

All residents are asked to take care when travelling in the vicinity of road works, please drive to the conditions and observe speed signage.

MOSQUITOES

Mosquito numbers within our Shire are always an issue. Council baits pools of water and will undertake regular fogging of the Broomehill and Tambellup townsites in an effort to reduce the mosquito numbers.

Rainwater tanks can become breeding sites for mosquitoes that can cause severe nuisance and carry serious diseases. The Department of Health has advised that the most common mosquito found to breed in rainwater tanks is a proven carrier of Ross River virus. To prevent mosquito breeding, guttering and piping should be self draining or fitted with drainage points. Water should not be allowed to pool under the overflow outlet or tap as these can become mosquito breeding sites. The tank should be a sealed unit to prevent mosquitoes entering. The inlet and overflow should incorporate a mesh cover to prevent access by the mosquito.

To stop mosquitoes breeding add a teaspoon of food grade paraffin oil (in small tanks up to 1,000 litres) to the water. (The amount needed will vary depending upon the surface area of the water. A sufficient quantity to produce a thin film over the water surface is all that is required.)

PROHIBITED BURNING PERIOD

All residents of the Broomehill-Tambellup Shire are reminded that the **prohibited** burning period commences on **1 NOVEMBER 2014** and continues until **14 FEBRUARY 2015** inclusive when the restricted burning period commences. Only protective burning can be carried out within this period, and conditions will apply. A permit to burn must be obtained from your nearest Fire Control Officer, or the Community Emergency Services Manager, Cindy Pearce as follows:

Best-selling author coming to Tambellup

Best-selling South Australian author Liz Harfull will visit Tambellup on Monday, **November 3**, to share stories about country shows and the mysterious and highly competitive world of show cooking.

The author of two national top 10 best-sellers will feature in a special Meet the Author event at the Tambellup Library to talk about her adventures writing *The Australian Blue Ribbon Cookbook*.

The book captures the stories, secret tips and first-prize winning recipes of show cooks from across the country, including Tambellup's own Roma Baxter.

"To be considered cooks had to be willing to contribute a recipe that has been used to win a first prize, and share their secret tips," Liz said.

"But I was also looking for people with an interesting story. For me as a writer, the focus is always the people and the traditions that make up life in regional Australia - the recipes are a bonus!

"Roma is very well known locally for her cooking skills, having catered for many community events. But what may not be quite so well known is the story of her early life on the farm, working as her Dad's 'right-hand man', and the challenges of raising a family in a two-roomed corrugated iron shed during the early years of her marriage to Robert.

"Roma cannot remember missing a single Tambellup show as a child. Her grandmother and mother were both show cooking enthusiasts, and she has carried on the tradition."

While Liz is in WA, she will attend the Upper Blackwood Agricultural Society's annual show at Dinninup on

Tuesday, November 4. Seven cooks from across WA who are profiled in the book, including Roma, will also be special guests at the show which is making a special feature of show cooking this year.

Liz said she had been overwhelmed by the response to the book and the resurgence of interest it was helping to generate, not only in show cooking, but country shows in general.

"People seem to have really connected to the stories and traditions connected with country shows, and this kind of cooking," she said.

"There are no celebrity chefs, no dietary fads and no recipes that require a trip to a specialty store before you can make them. Just simple, old-fashioned ingredients and know-how handed down through generations."

Released in April, *The Australian Blue Ribbon Cookbook* has been Allen & Unwin's number one selling title of the week in Australia, and in the top 10 best-sellers list for non-fiction.

Liz is also known to local readers for her 2012 best-seller, *Women of the Land*, which told the stories of eight women running their own farms, including Mary Naisbitt from Lake Grace.

Liz grew up on a small farm near Mount Gambier in SA, just across the paddock from the local showground. An award-winning journalist and rural communicator, in 2006 she walked away from corporate life to write books. Her leap of faith was rewarded two years later with the original *Blue Ribbon Cookbook*, which won a Gourmand World Cookbook Award in Paris in 2009.

"I still shake my head over writing a book about scones, fruit cake, and Anzac biscuits, and ending up in the culinary capital of the world," she said.

Today Liz lives in the Adelaide Hills, occasionally finding time to bake scones and make jam, while juggling a busy writing career.

The "Meet the Author" session will be held on Monday, November 3 at the Tambellup Library. Books will be available for purchase and signing.



Broomehill resident named as finalist in 2014 Seniors Awards

Six organisations and 14 individuals have been recognised as finalists in the 2014 WA Seniors Awards, including Broomehill's Nicolette Pratt.

Mrs Pratt (66) was nominated in the Intergenerational Senior Award for 'outstanding seniors who work with children and young people aged under 25'.

She is a grandcarer of five grandchildren – all girls – aged between four and 16. Mrs Pratt and her husband have been caring for the five girls for three years, after having previously raised a son of their own.

"It's hard work as children can be demanding at times, although I am really pleased with their development. They have improved greatly at school and have received trophies and medals for their sport," she said.

Local Member Terry Waldron MLA congratulated Mrs Pratt on the announcement and thanked her for her important contribution to society.

"What an honour to have a local resident named as one of only 14 individuals across the State who are finalists in the 2014 WA Seniors Awards," Mr Waldron said.

"These awards remind us of the value, skills and knowledge that seniors, like Mrs Pratt, bring to our communities and of the difference they make to the lives of those less fortunate, the younger generations and as carers of family members, including grandchildren."

The awards begin a series of celebrations leading up to Seniors Week, which is from 9-16 November, with the Seniors Awards ceremony on November 8. More than 80 community organisations and local governments have received State Government grants totalling \$82,000 to hold regional and metropolitan events to recognise seniors.

The finalists were described by Seniors and Volunteering Minister Tony Simpson MLA as leaders and role models, and Mr Waldron agrees with his sentiments.

Mr Waldron also encouraged local seniors to pick up their copy of the new Seniors Card Discount Directory 2014-16. Copies of the directory are available from his Narrogin office.

"I understand that WA has the most generous Seniors Card scheme in Australia and that discounts from more than 500 businesses and details on State Government concessions and rebates are included. Each senior over the age of 60 who holds a WA Seniors Card can access \$1000 of savings."

Tambellup health facility upgrades

Plans for the refurbishment of Tambellup Health Centre are getting closer to finalisation following recent staff and community briefings.

A community meeting was held over lunch at the Tambellup Community Resource Centre on Wednesday 17 September to outline the proposed upgrades and changes to Tambellup Health Centre, which will be upgraded as part of the \$565million Southern Inland Health Initiative (SIHI), funded by the State Government's Royalties for Regions program.

WA Country Health Service's Operations Manager Ruth York said the sessions were important in showing community and staff how plans had evolved from the earlier service and conceptual planning phases.

"Our main focus with these works is to support emergency care and primary health, enhance the safety, security and comfort of patients and staff, and to ensure the reliability of services."

"We are expanding and upgrading the treatment room, and will develop a new allied health room to support services delivered by physiotherapists, occupational therapists and other visiting specialists. All new rooms will also be fitted with Telehealth capability.

"Many other improvements will actually go unseen, such as the upgrade of fire safety measures to ensure we continue to provide a safe environment for patients and staff."

Ruth said the briefings were a good opportunity to share the progress of the project with the community.

"The timelines for Tambellup Health Centre, Gnowangerup Hospital, and Kojonup Hospital have been brought forward and construction is now expected to commence in December 2014. This is fantastic news for these communities and we're very fortunate to be well-positioned to progress with the earlier timeframe."

Information about the progress and proposed scope of works for Katanning Hospital will be available in the near future.

Broomehill Historical Notes

Quite a few years ago Shirley MacDonald began to work through the diaries of her Grandfather, Thomas Norrish (TN) which he wrote when he first came to Eticup to take up farming and the diaries of William Henry Graham (WHG) who was also one of the first pioneers of the Eticup district. Shirley collated all the information both in alphabetical and chronological order. There are many wonderful pieces of information and anecdotes in these diaries and we are proud to share them with the community each month.

Treasure, Edward - An expiree who did very well. He took up land at Martinup, where Sam Swift is believed to have built the original homestead. WHG refers to him in 1862 when he came to Eticup for his horses, getting the rest of his rum and letting WHG know that his fillies had been seen at Wagin Lake. On 17th February 1863 Treasure married TN's younger sister Anna Maria who bore him 12 children. During 1863 and 1864 WHG did chaining for treasure on several occasions. On 18th May 1880, Treasure paid Mrs Hiscock's fine to avoid sale of her possessions (her husband had been found guilty of grog selling). At a sale at Martinup in November 1881, £726 worth of goods were sold and later that month treasure joined John Forrest and his survey team for a few days. In January 1886 Edward Treasure became very ill at Kojonup. By 26th he was in a coma and TN sat with him until 1 o'clock. He died at 10 o'clock on the 27th and was to be buried as soon as a coffin could be made. Dr Rosselloty examined him and ordered an inquest which was not held until 13th February. The verdict was death by drink with no blame attachable to others. On 6th July 1898 TN drove from Warkalup to Kojonup to see L.F. Van Zuilecom to try to settle the division of Edward Treasure's property between his family. There was much dissention and the matter was not settled until midday next day. TN thought one of the daughter's had been very unreasonable. In mid-1886 Anna Treasure was married again – to P.C. Richard House but remained at Martinup running the property with the help of her eldest son J.J. (James).

Treasure, J.J. – Eldest son of Edward and Anna Treasure of Martinup. He married Emma Jane Carpenter, daughter of Charles Carpenter of Eticup. He helped farm at Martinup and was a carting contractor to the mining districts during the goldrush and took up property at Kojonup. His much younger brother, Thomas Levi, aged 7 at the time of Edward Treasure's death, is recorded as having inherited Martinup from his father. Perhaps it was when his mother Anna died in 1908. Thomas Levi sold Martinup to Wheeler & Arnott but his nephew Ken regained owndership.

Trimmer, Arthur – Member of roe's expedition to Albany which travelled well east of Ettakup Pool on the southbound journey and in sight of the huge rock now called Heron Rock. On the northward journey, the men camped at a spot they named Scamper Creek, west of Ettakup Pool and not far from Nookanellup. In 1836 he married Mary Ann spencer, daughter of Sir Richard Spencer of Albany and sister of Edward May Spencer who in the 1850s took up land in the Eticup area, including freehold Location 12. It has been accepted that Arthur Trimmer spent some time at Eticup, but his own property was much further south in Pootenup area, and by the time the house (just south of Ettakup Pool) became known as the Trimmer Place, it was owned by his daughter Sophia – later Lady Campbell, who had inherited from her Uncle Edward Spencer.

Trimmer, Mary – Wife of Arthur Trimmer and daughter of Sir Richard Spencer. She lived at Eticup (at the Trimmer place) from late 1860s to the early 1880s. Her daughter Sophia (Lady Campbell in 1881), whose property it became in 1869, spent time there but it is not clear whether she was visiting from Albany or from nearby Goblup. When TN's bride Christen Ann Wray arrived from Albany in February 1872, Mrs Trimmer was one of the only three white women in the immediate area. The others were Mrs Garrity at Green Hill and Mrs Graham at Fairfield. In May 1878 when the birth of her 5th child was imminent, Mrs Norrish sent a message to Mrs Trimmer who immediately set off on foot across the paddocks while Sophia and the messenger went to catch a saddle and horse. In September 1883 TN visited Mrs Trimmer at Albany. In July 1886 Mrs Trimmer was staying at Goblup with her daughter when she became ill. Randle Warburton (Lady Campbell's overseer) came to Sunnyside to borrow a half bottle of brandy for Mrs Trimmer and on 25th July Sophia started for Albany with "poor old Mrs Trimmer" who was very ill. She died in Albany on 25th August 1886. Sophia's brother, Edward Algernon (Algy) Trimmer probably spent time at Eticup with his mother and he was staying at Goblup in October 1886 when Dr Rosselloty visited him; he died soon afterwards and was buried in the Eticup Cemetery – the first burial there.

Heritage sites in Mt Barker and Broomehill to be restored

Regional heritage sites will be bolstered by State Government funding announced today, as part of its 2014-15 Heritage Grants Program.

Twenty of the 31 sites announced to share in more than \$1million worth of grants are located in regional WA, including two projects in the Wagin electorate - the former Jones' buildings, at Broomehill and the St Werburgh's Chapel. Mt Barker.

Local Member Terry Waldron MLA said the funding would assist private owners to restore and conserve their State Registered heritage properties.

A grant of \$9,840 was awarded to St Werburgh's Chapel, Mt Barker and the former Jones' buildings, at Broomehill, received \$12,762 through the program.

"The Wagin electorate is home to many iconic heritage sites that should be maintained and recognised for generations to come," Mr Waldron said.

"I congratulate the latest grant recipients for taking important steps to restore and conserve their heritage properties for the benefit of the local community and visitors alike."

Recipients are required to match grants dollar-for-dollar to carry out restorative work on their

Mr Waldron said the history at the two local heritage sites was intriguing.


"I understand that St Werburgh's Chapel in Mt Barker was built in 1873 and is one of 32




The State Government's Heritage Grants Program will provide almost \$1.3million this year, including a special allocation of \$275,883 towards 12 Stirling Terrace buildings in Albany, which are being revitalised for the Centenary of ANZAC commemorations.


Since the funding program began in 1996-97, 690 heritage projects have been awarded grants totalling more than \$15.8million.

Private overhead power lines

Power lines which transport electricity from your main switchboard and meter to your home or other buildings are private power lines. This includes the pole where the network operator's overhead service cable is attached and/or the switchboard/meter box is located.

If you have private power lines or a private power pole on your property, it is your responsibility to inspect and maintain them. Keep trees and branches clear of the power lines. This will help prevent power interruptions and reduce the possibility of electrocution or fire.


This is not a new requirement. It has always been the property owner's responsibility to maintain all electrical equipment they own.


What overhead power lines are we talking about?

All private poles, wires and pole-top fittings located on the owner's property are his/her responsibility. The following diagrams show some common private power line arrangements.

Inspections of private overhead power lines and poles

It is important that you inspect your private power lines and poles (including stay-wires, fittings and all other components) at least once a year to check for any visible signs of deterioration. Never climb a pole, approach the wires, attempt any electrical repairs yourself or cut any vegetation near an energised power line. Contact with live wires can kill!

It is recommended that you:

 safely remove any vegetation on the ground close to the base of all power poles and under the power lines;

- check that trees and branches are at least two metres away from power lines. If they are not, arrange for tree pruning by a competent vegetation control contractor. Check the Yellow Pages or contact the Tree Guild of WA for a list of trained contractors;
- check wood poles for obvious defects such as poles which are cracked, damaged, rotting, attacked by white-ants/termites and ask your white-ant/termite inspector to treat (if required) the area around the poles;
- inspect steel poles regularly (eg every year). Steel poles, even if galvanised, are subject to rust and should be checked above and below ground for defects; and
- check all poles for leaning, brackets pulling away from poles/buildings, damaged stay-wires, split cross-arms broken strands in wires, damaged insulators or wires hanging much lower than others in the same section.

If you come across any of these defects during a visual inspection, immediately arrange for further inspection or repairs by a licensed electrical contractor.

Life expectancy of wood poles

Australian Standards indicate a life expectancy of up to 40 years above ground and 25 years below ground for hardwood poles. However, the life expectancy of wood poles can vary significantly depending on their uses, species, climatic conditions and soil conditions.

If your poles are hardwood, such as jarrah, it is recommended that you replace all those which have been in service for more than 25 years. The difficulty in detecting internal deterioration and rotting in hardwood poles makes age-based replacement the only reliable option.

Alternatively, if your poles are softwood, such as treated pine, it is recommended that you seek information from the manufacturer or your supplier (if known) about the life expectancy. You should then replace those poles that are older than the indicated serviceable life.

If your poles are made of sawn timber, you should immediately replace them. Sawn timber is not suitable for power poles as it is more prone to rot and structural deterioration, with a high risk of early failure.

Groundline reinforcement using galvanised steel stakes can also extend the life of wood poles. Such an option should only be considered if the reinforcement work is performed by an asset management company specialising in such activities

My power poles need replacing. What are my options?

a. Underground

If the private power poles or lines on your property exceed their serviceable life, it is recommended that you consider replacing them with an underground cable.

The benefits of an underground cable are:

- it is far safer than an overhead line. It eliminates the risk of starting a bushfire and the risk of electrocution through contact with farm equipment is minimised;
- an underground supply is far more reliable, not affected by weather or vegetation; and
- it does not require maintenance.

Please discuss this option with your licensed electrical contractor. In some cases, you may be able to negotiate a discount by digging the trenches yourself. Before digging, check for other underground services that may be present.

b. Pole replacement

Should your overhead power lines need substantial repair and you decide to continue with overhead power lines, you should use new steel poles and insulated wires. Regulations will be amended to require this. Wood poles and bare overhead wires will then no longer be allowed. Ask your electrical contractor for advice.

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Travellers' Tales 8, by Anna Wright

After I left Richmond, with a promise to return, I went back to Winton and spent another five days working on Matilda's Ulna. I developed a minor case of RSI, and has mentioned to the Palaeontologist at Richmond that I was keen to do some prepping at the lab there. So I backtracked as the direct road had been roughened up by some recent rains.

Camping at Richmond again, same neighbours, same camp site. I started at the lab, working on an ammonite, then began the two week fantastic experience working on Wilson, the Ichthyosaur. Wilson was found by the Wilson family in July. He has a complete skeleton head, and the rest was still to be revealed. It was really exciting, uncovering vertebrae and ribs, and then some bones I needed picture reference to identify. Working with Tim was fantastic. I am going back there for as long as they will have me next year.

While I was there, I was working with this other lady. Her name was an unusual one, and I happened to comment that I once knew a person with that name. Tim made the comment that wouldn't it be funny if she was the same person. I asked her for her maiden name, and lo and behold, she was the same person. I hadn't seen her for about fifty years! We caught up on family history.

Sadly, I left Richmond and headed for Mount Isa, making my way back to Western Australia. I had a run in with the Centerlink supervisor there, which left me feeling very jaded. Fortunately, the caravan park I chose was quiet, comfortable and friendly, however, the swimming pool was like ice. It was a 34 degree day! The trip to the Isa was beautiful, with jagged rocky outcrops covered with a variety of flowering wattles. I wanted to take photos left right and centre, however, there were no pull offs where I could. One of the most spectacular places, I was caught with the decision to overtake a road train or try and stop for the photo. I chose the latter and managed to then overtake the road train before the overtaking lane petered out.

Camooweal. A dry, deserted outpost just inside the Queensland border. Very unfriendly. I stopped at the servo to use the facilities only to be confronted by a very large sign that informed me I couldn't use them unless I purchased something from their store. I didn't want anything, so I took a stroll around the town and used the facilities in the local park. Funny thing outside the pub – pairs of thongs lined up at the footpath. No cars nearby, just the thongs.

I finally made it to the Northern Territory, the only state I hadn't ever visited. The scenery gradually changed, becoming more lush that the Queensland side of the border. Just past the Barkly Homestead, I came across a caravan on it's roof, still attached to the ute (right way up and seemingly undamaged) that was towing it. I had to wait until I got to Ceduna to find out the complete story attached. The ute driver was passing a road train, the cross winds were horrific (I wouldn't have attempted it), and the third trailer of the road train crashed into the caravan as they went past, tipping it over. The RAC NT version was on its way from Tennant Creek to sort out the problem.

I spent the night at Three Ways, the decision point of the trip. Do I go north to Kakadu, Darwin and then come across the top end, do I turn south and go via the Great Central Highway, or do I turn left and go via the Nullabor again.

The left decision was made for me with reports it was already very hot and humid and threatening an early wet season up north. I figured I could check the area out next winter, so turned left and headed to the Alice.

Tennant Creek was an interesting break. I toured the mine site there, the overland telegraph station, and the hall of fame hand prints in the footpath. Gosh Jon English has massive hands! The next stop on the highway was the Devils Marbles. Again a rather lengthy stopover, wandering around these intriguing natural features, taking photos and just enjoying the general atmosphere. A bit further on I stopped in at a pub cum roadhouse and read the history of the area.

Alice Springs was not as I expected it. It seemed like a very large, overgrown country town. I checked in, decided not to do the Central Highway, as I had heard reports that it was rather rough in places, so booked on a tour to Uluru and Kata Tjuta (The Olgas) and the West MacDonnell Ranges. The latter was the first tour. I wish I had a decent camera, but I have just got to be happy with my phone shots. We had a wonderful day, taking in several gorges and the Finke River, and finally calling in on a camel farm on the way back to the Alice.

The Uluru trip was a marathon. 18 hours in all, 9 hours getting there and back, with nine hours sightseeing and then doing the champagne and barbecue watching the sunset – along with about 2000 other tourists! I got some amazing photos as the sun set, changing the colour of the rock. It was definitely the way to go. Our guides told us all the Aboriginal Creation stories, showed us the specific markings in the rock related to these stories, and gave us a natural and bush food excursion. If you go to the Alice, do the tour with Emu Run tours. All food was provided. We just had to take our own water. I saw some rare acacias, tasted wild beans and thrips, watched birds catch snakes and lizards, and marvelled at the stories we were told of the creation of the area with relation to the stars.

The long haul then started. I headed south and reached South Australia. While photographing wildflowers, I fell over in a bull dust hole, hurting my wrist, ankle and butt. The trip then slowed as I was too sore to drive great distances. I pulled in to the Marla Roadhouse that night, along with half the population of the Stuart Highway. Meal of the night was Barramundi, so I indulged. It was 100% better than the one I had up in the Gulf. Next morning I headed off for Coober Pedy, and had intended getting further, however the soreness wouldn't allow it. I did a grocery shop and then found a camp for the night. I found Coober Pedy a rather depressing place. I suppose the opal mining must be very productive, however, the living accommodation didn't reflect this. The views around the Breakaways were fabulous. The whole place brought back memories of scenes from Priscilla, Queen of the Desert!

Next day, I headed for Woomera and Roxby Downs. Woomera is now a ghost town, however the government are placing homeless families there in the housing in and attempt to re-establish the town. There is a rather good display of rockets and space junk that has come back to earth in an open museum in the centre of the town. Roxby Downs, the town for the Olympic Dam Uranium Mine was a bustling metropolis in comparison. Only trouble, the caravan park is run by Aspen, and cost an arm and a leg to stay there. I went out to the Olympic Dam site the next morning, but looking at the q

Security queue at the gate, decided not to do the public viewing. I looked at the Oodnadatta Track, a super gravel highway, and weighed up the options of going that way or head back the way I had come and do the next destination, the Flinders Ranges, via bitumen. I took the bitumen, calling in at Andamooka on the way. It was a town that we were threatened with when I was at Teachers' College as a possible first posting. I thought it was a rather "cute" town, a bit better looking than Coober Pedy. I walked the open museum of the dugouts, and was surprised they were still occupied up until the 1980's. One was Jack Absalom's fathers dugout, where he lived in the winter months while mining for opals. I reached my destination in the Flinders Ranges by late afternoon. Willow Springs station. This was the old stamping ground of a friend who had etched his name and the date before leaving the area in the 1950's. The station was looking very lush, boasting 4,500 head of sheep and 40 head of breeding cows. I saw three big red kangaroos and about 30 emus, but no sheep or cattle! I had a lovely night camped out under the stars with no one around me then went and checked the hut and the etching the next morning. The owners had suggested a trip for me, saying it was suitable for two wheel drive, through beauty spots in the Ranges. Well, 2 wheel drive!!! No way. I took about 4 hours to do a 30 km stretch. Yes, it was beautiful, and the wildlife was plentiful, but I was very relieved to get out without any breakages.

I am now on the straight stretch home. I told my son I wouldn't be driving off and checking out new and interesting places. I don't think he believed me. I have already done one diversion. Maybe there will be more. At the end of it, I am going to park the wheels for a few months, do some painting and patchwork, and generally just RELAX!!!
